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

The acquisition depends on negotiation of a definitive agreement and approval by shareholders of both con-cerns and the Interstate Commission. Commerce Burlington 'said that an applicaton will be filed with the ICC before the end of the year. Under current law, the ICC must make a decision within 31 months. In the past some mergers have taken decades because of opposition from other railroads. The Frisco has 4,700 miles of track serving nine central Southeast and Southwest states. It also owns slightly more than 50 per cent of the stock of New Mexico & Arizona Land Co., Phoenix, Ariz

Burlington Northern serves 19 Western and Midwestern states and two Canadian provinces

The two railroads interchange freight at St. Louis, Kansas City, Dallas and Fort Worth. One result of the combination would be to provide a route from the rich low-sulphur coal fields of Montana to the heart of the industrial South at Birmingham, Ala. Faced with contracting supplies of na-tural gas, the utilities and steel mills of the Southeast are expected to depend more in the future on coal. The merger also would give the Burlington a longer haul on its coal and grain as well as a rail route all the way to the Gulf of Mexico.






