Leon Watson Named **New Tribune Editor**

Leon Watson, 1971 graduate of West Texas State University, has been named as editor of the Matador Tribune, Publisher Ray Freedman announced this week. With a degree in journalism, Watson has served as editor of newspapers in Levelland and Friona, and has been a sports and police reporter, circulation manager and advertising manager. He also worked as a special feature writer for a weekly newspaper in Lubbock.

He is a 30-year-old Lazbuddie product, and comes here from Friona where he owned and operated a printing shop. After graduation from WTSU, he spent three years as a private investigator for Pinkerton Detective Agency. He joined the National Guard and rose to the rank of first lieutenant, serving as an Infantry company commander at the Lubbock Armory.
