Church To Have **Christmas Play**



Traffic Accidents Estimated At 71

Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety said today that "it is tragic that so many men, women and children will become victims of motor vehicle accidents during the Christmas and New Year

He added, "Based on past holidays experience, we believe many of the traffic accidents during the holiday will involve either speeding or drinking.'

Bell called on motorists to cooperate in law enforcement efforts to hold speed down during the holiday. He also urged morotists to work with officers to eliminate

the serious threat posed by drunk drivers.

Major Bell noted that law enforcement agencies will be cooperating in an all out effort to make the streets and highways safe, and in addition, he said the Department of Public Safety would be working with the news media, trying to focus public attention on accident dangers during the

Deaths so far during 1977 are running more than 10 per cent higher than 1976, and are made even more tragic because they could have been avoided.

Cotton Report

Trading decreased slightly this week as prices declined an average of 50 to 75 points. Growers continued to offer their cotton freely but many were reluctant to accept bids. Demand was moderate for all qualities with mixed lots containing mostly 32 and shorter staples selling for 41.00 to 42.50 cents per pound and lots containing mostly 33 and

longer staples bringing 44.00 to 45.50 cents. Growers continued to receive a average of \$62 per ton for cottonseed. About 48,000 samples were classed at Memphis for the week ending Friday, December 9. This brings the season's total to 149,000 compared to 116,000 as of this date last year.

Grades changed little from the previous week with white grades again acocunting for 32 percent of the samples and light spotted grades accounting for 68 percent. The predominant grades were 32 with 44 percent, 42 with 22 percent, 31 with 18 percent and 41 with 11 percent. Staple 32 remained the predominant length with 58 percent followed by 31 with 28 percent. Micronaire readings were in the desirable range of 35-49 on 89 percent of the samples tested. Six percent miked 34 and lower and five percent miked 50 and above. Average pressley for the week was 86,000 pounds per square

Program Given On Famed Boys Ranch

An interesting program on Cal Farley's Boys Ranch was presented Monday night, December 5 for the American Legion and Auxiliary at regular monthly meeting and covered dish supper of the two organizations.

Speaker was Mrs. Ward Rattan, who showed colored slides of the ranch, founded by the late Cal Farley, which was provided a home for more than 2,000 homeless boys since it was founded in 1939 at Old Tascosa.

Mrs. Rattan showed many interesting scenes of activities of the boys, and their surroundings. She had slides of some of the older buildings which have since been replaced by new, modern structures, including the new chapel and new dormitories, and the memorial park where Cal Farley and his wife, Mimi are buried. When Farley and other Amarillo businessmen located the home on part of the Bivens ranch, the old courthouse was used for the boys' living quarters.

A school was added later, and for the past 16 years, Garland Rattan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ward Rattan, has been superintendent of Boys Ranch School. He and his wife, Shirley went to the ranch as teachers and dorm parents, 21

years ago. They have two sons, David and Chris. Mrs. Rattan included in the slides, some which she made

Mrs. Wimpee was a member of the Assembly of God Church.



traffic accidents in Texas during the combined Christmas and New Year weekends will claim 71 lives.

He noted, however, that some of the deaths could be prevented if motorists would drive carefully and participate in the state's "Light the Way for a Safe Holiday" program.

Speir said 41 deaths are likely to occur in the Christmas period from 6 p.m. on Friday, December 23, through midnight Monday,

December 26.
Another 30 traffic fatalities are estimated for the New Year holiday which extends from 6 p.m. Friday, December 30, through midnight Monday, January 2, 1978. The "Light the Way for a

Safe Holiday" program calls on all motorists in Texas to drive with their low-beam headlights turned on in the daytime, as well as night, during the Christmas and New Year week ends.
"We feel this 'Light the

Way' program, particularly with widespread participa-tion on the part of drivers, will serve as a very meaningful reminder to others to drive safely," Speir

The DPS director observed that traffic deaths in Texas are currently running about 11 per cent over 1976, with much of this increase caused by the fact that three out of four motorists are violating the 55 mile speed limit.






