## Group Seeks Time To Save Building

"The population of the earth doubled between 1930 and 1975; to destroy any building, except under very special conditions of emergency, is therefore a crime against humanity, past, present and future."

The above quotation from a recent issue of "Preservation News" about a new book "Form Follows Fiasco: Why Modern Architecture Hasn't Worked," is contained in a letter from Dr. James W. Kitchen of Texas Tech, professor of Park Administration and Landscape Architecture, in reply to questions concerning the possibility and feasibility of retaining the old Matador High School building.

A committee of local residents is bidding for time from the Motley County Independent School District to explore the possibilities of the restoration and maintenance of the building through Federal Grants.

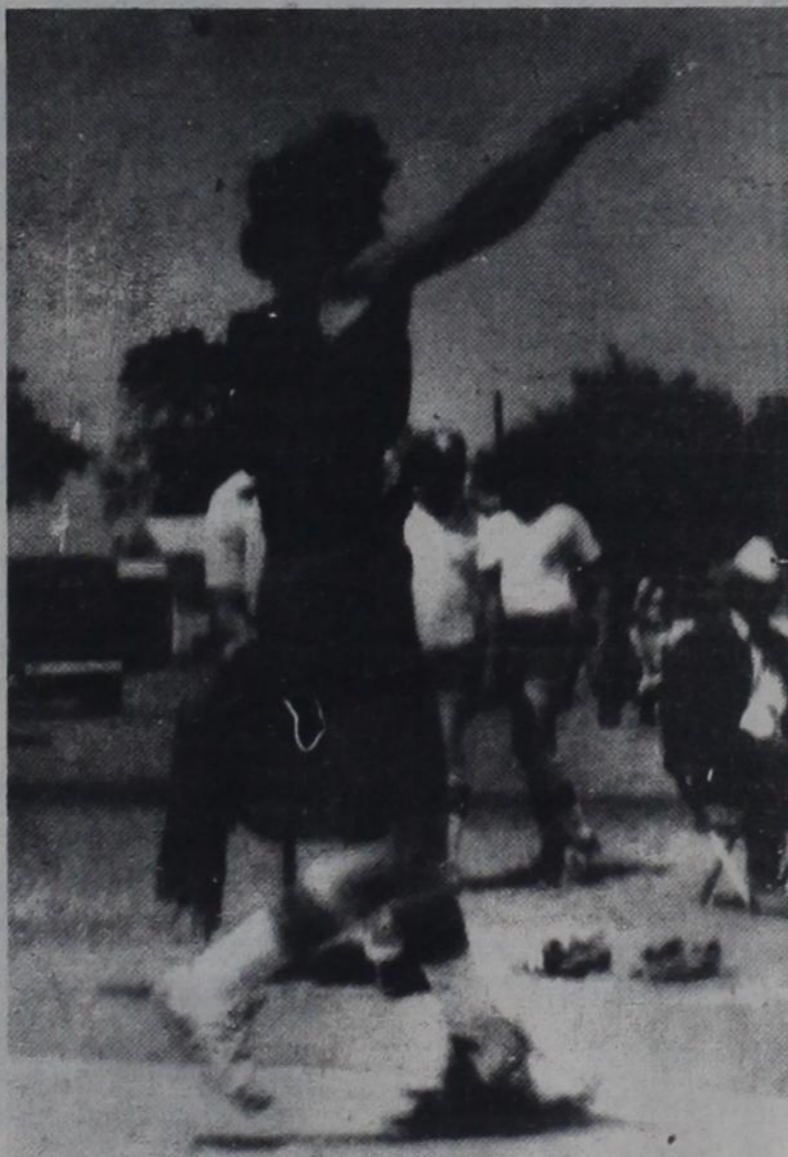
In a letter distributed this week "To the registered voters of Motley County," the committee asserted, "We have not solicited, will not solicit, nor do we approve of soliciting pledges."

This was in reply to a letter mailed last week by the Motley County ISD, posing the question, "If you will help finance this project, how much money would you pledge?"

The committee working to save the building, countered: "We have asked only for a postponement of the demolition of the old high school building for a reasonable time of at least 6 months to permit the exploration of all possibilities of the future use, maintenance, and restoration of the building through Federal Grants. We feel that the building has great possibilities for such future uses, which will be beneficial to the community and to the entire county. Any other motive attributed to us is without basis. . . we consider the letter sent by the Motley County Independent School District to be a misrepresentation of our motive.

"We are only asking for TIME to explore the possibilities of the building with experts such as Dr. James Kitchen of Texas Tech, professor of Park Administration and Landscape Architecture, who has offered his help."

## Emergency Loans Available To Farmers

WASHINGTON, March 31 -- Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland announced today that farmers in eight Texas counties are eligible for emergency loans through the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) to re-establish normal farming operations because of adverse weather conditions which caused them substantial losses in 1977 and 1978.

These counties are Briscoe, Clay, Collin, Deaf Smith, Hays, Jack, Knox, and Motley.

Reports received disclosed that farmers suffered damages and losses to crops and/or cropland from drought, hail, high winds and heavy rains at different periods throughout 1977 and in the first two months of this year. All counties had damages and losses to crops. Motley county farmers reported some farm homes were damaged.

## Granddaughter Dies In Car--Truck Crash

Mr. and Mrs. Fred C. Bourland returned home Friday from Tucson, Arizona, where they attended funeral services for their granddaughter, Mrs. William Marquez, 27, who was killed Thursday morning, April 13, in a car-truck collision.

Mrs. Marquez, the former Jamie McCarty, and four other passengers were riding in the car when it reportedly was struck by a big truck. One of the passengers was thrown from the car. The others were killed instantly.

Services were at 10:30 a.m. April 15, in the Brints Chapel in Tucson.

Mrs. Marquez is survived by her husband, and a baby daughter, Maghan Kathryn, 16 months old, of the home; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. P. McCarty of Battle Mountain, Nevada; two brothers, Mike McCarty of Tucson, and Paul McCarty of Reno, Nevada; and her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred C. Bourland Sr., of Matador, Texas.

Mr. and Mrs. Bourland were accompanied by their sons, Fred C. Bourland Jr., of Richardson, Texas and Thomas Bourland of Lubbock (uncles of the deceased woman) and members of their families, in attending the funeral. Also attending from Texas was an aunt, Mrs. Tanzy Turner of Plano, together with an aunt by marriage, Mrs. Albert McCarty of Manzanillo, Mexico.

Mrs. Marquez will be remembered by many friends here, having visited her grandparents on numerous occasions.

## 440 Relay Team Sets Track Record

The Motley County High School girls finished with a good performance at the Regional Track meet at Levelland last Friday and Saturday. Out of 64 teams from Region I, Motley County finished in 3rd Place with 42 points, valley was 2nd with 46 and Miami won the Regional Championship.

The girls Mile Relay team (Linda Palmer, Cindy Johnson, Pamela Pitts, Ann Moore) ran 4.33.0 for their fastest time during this season.

In the 200 Meter Dash (220 Dash), Glouris Sims placed 6th with a time of 26.8.; 100 Yd Dash, Sharlene Smith placed 2nd and qualified to go to State in the 100 Dash, with a time of 11.1.

The 800 Meter Relay (880 Yd), the team placed 3rd with a time of 1:48.7 behind Valley who posted a time of 1:48.6. Members of the 800 Meter Relay team are Brenda Campbell, Ann Moore, Gwen Calvert, and Sharlene Smith. The event in which the Motley tracksters did well was the 400 Meter Relay (440 Yd) team who broke the old record set by New Deal in 1972 with a time of 50.2. The Motley County girls ran a 50.00 for 1st Place and a trip to the State Finals in Austin. This will make the second year the 400 Meter Relay team has qualified for the State meet. Members of the relay team are Ann Moore, Sharlene Smith, Gwen Calvert, and Glouris Sims.

## Notice Clarifies Hospital Crisis

A notice to the people of Motley County, from the Motley General Hospital Board clarifies the proposed increase in taxes. The information is as follows:

"PLEASE NOTE - This increase in taxes applies only to the Hospital taxes. For example, if your hospital tax for last year was \$8.00, it would become \$16.00 under the new rate."

A letter was mailed last week informing the public that the hospital is in severe financial difficulty, and that the hospital might be closed without additional financial support from the public.

It was proposed that "The only feasible alternative . . . is to raise the evaluation of approximately double the present rate (of taxes) for the county."

Many persons interpreted the notice as applying to all the levied taxes, whereas it referred only to the assessed hospital tax.

"The increase in taxes is not on the total tax, but only on the hospital tax," the Hospital Board is emphasizing. "The Hospital District uses for taxing purposes, the valuation established by the Commissioners Court and the Tax Assessor of Motley County."

The 7th Annual Bob Wills Day will be held this Friday night and Saturday, April 28 & 29 at Turkey.

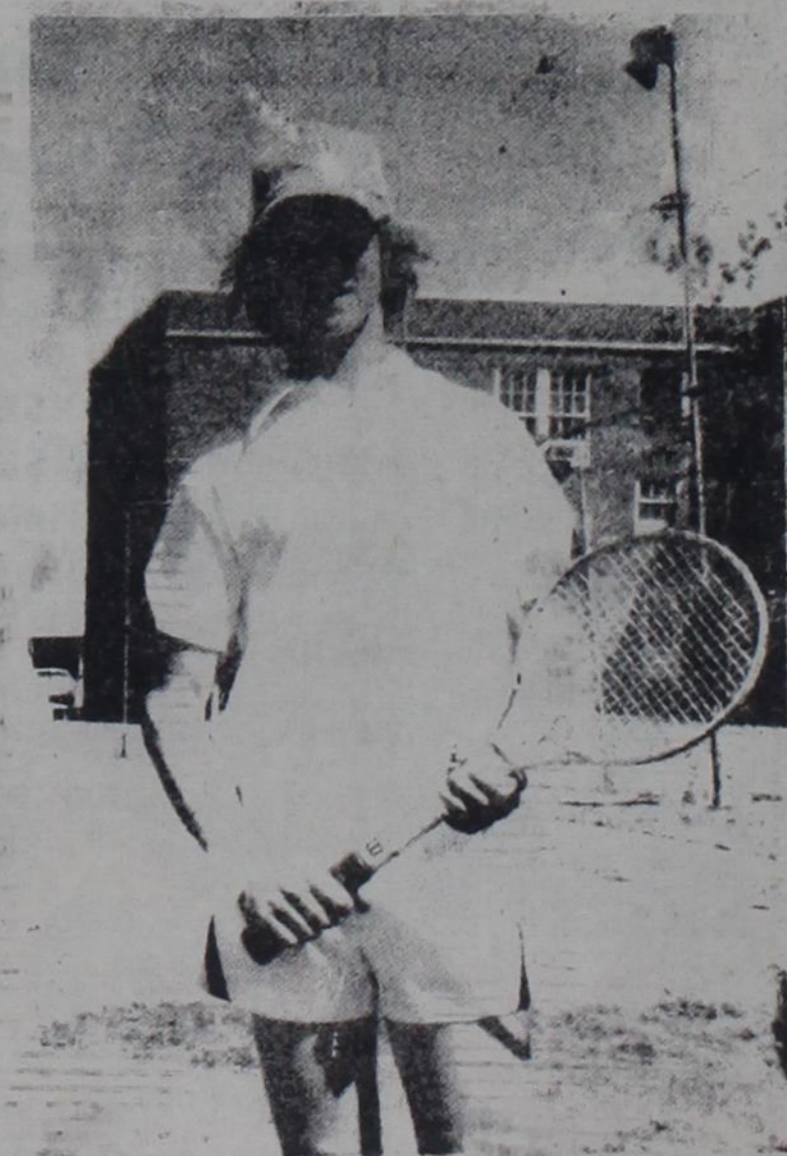

The parade will start at 10:30 Saturday morning in downtown Turkey followed by a barbeque at 11:00 a.m. in the Bob Wills Center.

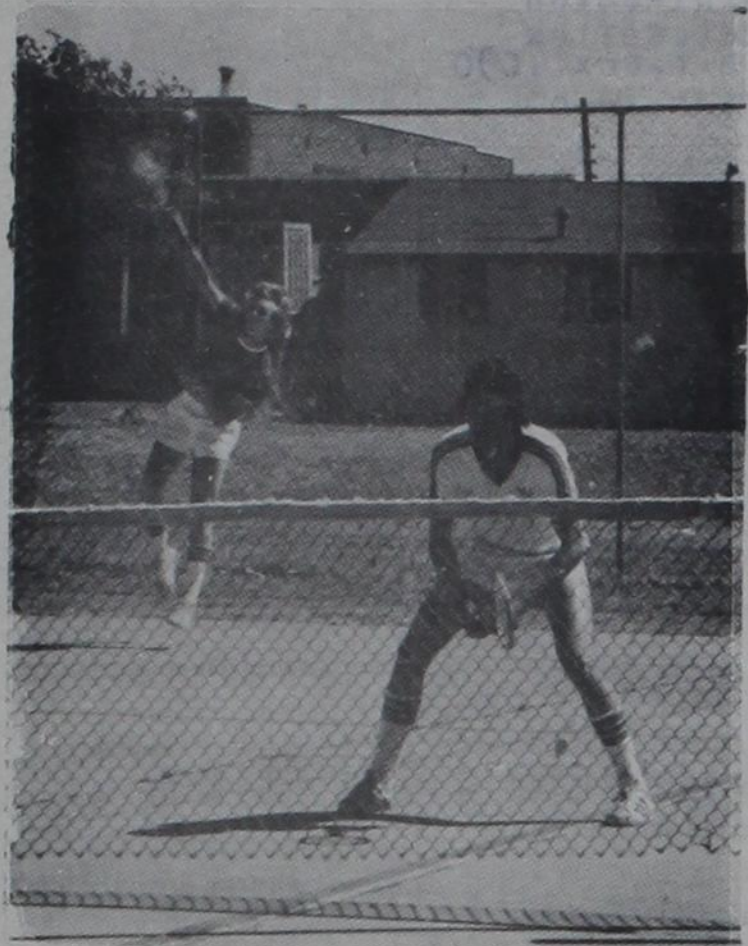

### Job Opportunities Excellent For Bilingual Teachers

Bilingual teachers are not standing in line for jobs. In fact, employers are practically standing in line for bilingual teachers, according to Dr. T. W. Rigby, director of bilingual education at Baylor University.

"There is a chronic need for bilingual teachers in the U.S.," he said. Last year the Department of Health, Education and Welfare requested 77,000 bilingual teachers and less than 10 percent of that number were produced.

The government defines a bilingual student as one with limited English speaking ability and whose home language is other than English.

The purpose of bilingual-bicultural education programs is to provide the student with courses in his home language until he can

in 1963, are subsidized by the federal government in schools with 20 or more bilingual students.

Since Texas is populated with more Spanish speakers than any other state, 238 of 254 counties are eligible for governmental subsidy of kindergarten through third grade.

The only wall standing between a bilingual teacher and a job in Texas is "being too choosy about where to locate," Dr. Rigby said. "All the way from the Valley (Rio Grande) to San Antonio there is a great need."

Bilingual teaching on the elementary education level requires a bachelor of arts or bachelor of science degree with certification in bilingual-bicultural teaching. The teacher must achieve at least eighth grade fluency in the "target" language for certification.

Teaching on the college or adult level requires a master's or doctoral degree and "lots of language experience," Dr. Rigby said.

The college curriculum includes basic education courses as well as bilingual-

bicultural courses in linguistics, cross-cultural studies and instructional methods. "The teacher should be aware of cultural differences as well as language obstructions," Dr. Rigby said.

"Support" courses in sociology and culture-oriented psychology would also help the teacher understand the cultural heritage of bilingual groups, Dr. Rigby added.

Depending on the size of the bilingual population in a given school, methods of teaching may vary from traditional classroom to individualized one-on-one systems, Dr. Rigby said.

Base salary for bilingual teachers in Texas with a bachelor of arts degree and no experience is \$8,460. The salary is raised for each year of experience to 17 years at \$13,250. Teachers with a master's degree start at \$9,020 and can earn \$14,380 with 19 years experience. Above base pay differs among school districts.

Higher salaries usually accompany the "adult level" bilingual positions, Dr. Rigby said. "All sorts of jobs are available" in

diplomatic service, business administration and continuing education. Publishing companies need bilinguals to assist in the research and preparation of testing materials, Dr. Rigby said.

The need for more bilingual programs and educators is likely to increase in Texas as more people seek economic opportunities in the U.S. and particularly in the South, Dr. Rigby said.

Texas may expand bilingual programs by Spanish-English in a year, he said. "There very strong contingents that we're not very far from French-English bilingual programs in the Beaumont and Port Arthur area where there is a concentration of French speakers," Dr. Rigby said.

If current educational trends remain the same, bilingual educators continue to find the economic law of supply and demand working in their favor.

Her father was mayor of Olney, giving her an early brush with politics which were to play such a major role in her life 25 years later.

After graduating from the Olney public schools, Bitsy attended Stephens College. She transferred to the University of Texas and graduated with a degree in social science and also met a student leader named John Hill.

The couple were married in Olney in 1946 and resided in Houston while John attended law school in Austin. In Houston, she helped her husband establish a law practice and a political career while she reared their children and took part in civic affairs. Their children and Melinda, born in 1947; Graham, in 1949; and Martha, in 1952.

Her husband's first government service in Austin, Secretary of State in 1966-67, came at a time when their

children preferred to remain in Houston to complete their high school education. John commuted between Austin and Houston.

By the time John won a race for attorney general in 1972, the children were out of high school and Bitsy moved to Austin to join her husband in his new career.

Bitsy's life in Austin is divided among her primary interests of assisting her husband's political career, contributing to Austin civic affairs, and enjoying her children and four grandchildren during visits at the family ranch near Dripping Springs. Her civic activities have included heading the 1976 Travis County American Cancer Society drive and serving on the advisory board of the "Meals on Wheels" program for senior citizens.

## Save The School (From Page One)

In his letter, Dr. Kitchen presented these facts concerning the project:

"As pointed out in the meeting, I'm not for saving the school just to be saving the school. The community must consider all the implications, projected uses, costs of operation and many other factors to make a decision final and one which all members of the community can live with in the future.

"If the decision to eliminate the school is a final judgment and consensus of the community, then the democratic process has functioned. It is my recommendation that if the decision is not yet final, that more time be utilized to consider alternative actions.

"Has the community actually determined:

1. What would be the proposed uses of the school? What groups would actually move their programs from present meeting places to the school?

2. What would be the cost of renovating the school to accommodate proposed uses? Could renovation be accomplished in a phased process to allow time for raising of necessary capital through local, state or national funding sources?

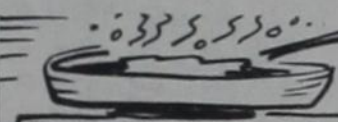
3. What would be the replacement costs of such a structure? If population in the county were to increase, would the school building serve an educational function again, or would a new structure be required?

4. What have other communities in Texas done with adaptive uses of old school buildings and how have other communities faced with the same limited resources accomplished restoration and implementation of adaptive uses?

"Some of the questions can be and probably have already been answered by the community; however, the Texas Historical Commission in Austin could provide you with additional answers about other structures in rural communities.

"Hopefully, at some future date, I'll again have the privilege of meeting with your committee. Your committee and the communities of Matador and Roaring Springs would present an excellent opportunity for a class project. Upon completion of the class project in Turkey, we will forward a copy of the work to you for your perusal."

In the meantime, letters and donations continue to arrive from former residents, who in former years taught or attended school in Matador.

### Emergency Loans (From Page One)

FmHA emergency loans based on losses caused by specified disasters are made at varying rates. Amounts of up to \$225,000 offsetting actual production loss bear three percent interest, and additional amounts within the farmer's actual loss are loaned at five percent. Amounts in excess of loss needed to restore production or make major adjustments in the farming operations are loaned at five percent. Amounts in excess of loss needed to restore production or make major adjustments in the farming operations are loaned at a higher rate.

Emergency housing loans based on damage to the farmer's primary residence and personal household effects are available under a variable scale of interest rates.

Loan applications may be filed in FmHA county offices serving the designated counties. Check the local telephone directory listing under U.S. Government (USDA) to find the exact location. Applications for physical losses are authorized until Sept. 28, 1978, and for production losses until April 3, 1979.

Information on other USDA programs may be obtained at the agricultural service centers which are also listed in local telephone directories under U.S. Government.
