Ben Charles Grundy pled guilty in County Court County Judge Billy Whitaker on charges of distruction of public property. Grundy and public property. Grundy and Timmy Brooks, who will face similar charges, were in the county sheriff's custody Monday and charged with damaging highway signs in the county. Grundy faced a Class A misdemeanor charge for damaging one sign. He was fined $\$ 50$ plus a court cost of approximately $\$ 50$ and agreed to pay the damages of $\$ 38.34$.  Governor Clements made State Address to a joint session of the 66th Legisla ture today. There were no real big surprises in his talk but a few new items I haven't heard him mention before. One of his lead statements was: "No one can deny the role of the Legislative Branch of Texas Government in making our state the envy of the entire nation" We were happy
nized this fact. nized this fact The second item Governo Clements made that is worthy of mention is the
following, "The Sunset Law
passed during the las
session of the Legislatur was a major step. It was major not only in terms of how it can be used to eliminate useless state agencies, but also in the sense that it was a recognition of the fact that
our Government our Government has been drifting away from account
ability." ability."
A special committee made up of 4 Senators and 4 Representatives did a bang ap job on reviewing agencies affected by the Sunse Legislation over the last
several months. They did an several months. They did an
indepth study of some 26 , indepth study of some 26 ,
mainly State Regulatory Agencies, over the past Agencies, over the past pleased that a new standing committee was formed in
the House of Representathe House of Representa-
tives called Government Organization. I was also happy that Speaker Bill
Clayton appointed me to this Clayton appointed me to this
Committee which will be Committee which will be
looking at some 176 separate agencies over the next few years. The special Sunset Committee recommended that 6 agencies be abolished
and drastic changes be and drastic changes be
made in the structure of the others.
The Governor also called
for a Constitutional Amend-
ment that would give the
Governor budget execution powers to carry out the will of the Legislature. Many
students of Texas Governstudents of /Texas Government have recommended
this change for years. Texas Government is presently run by the Legislature going into session every two years to approve a budget for the
various state agencies and then turn the agencies loose to run themselves without answering to anyone
The Governor called on
the Legislature to develop a the Legislature to develop a plan for a single appraisal my opinion, this won't get off the ground. We need to
devote our attention to new devote our attention to new

Inflation and a mild recession are several of the roadblocks facing farmers marketing economist with marketing economist Extension Service.
Dr. Carl Anderson expects overall economic growth to low to 2 percent or less in 1979, down from nearly 4 ercent in 1978. "This will
ring on a mild recession during mid-year. The conomic slowdown will likely curtail buying of higher priced cuts of red meats and will encourage the use of ground beef, meat substitutes and poultry," he contends. "Mill use of cotton may also decline.
"Inflation and the high cost of energy eill continue to hamper economic growth in the United States and will expecially keep agricultural producers in an economic oind," believes Anderson. The President's wage and rice standards are not expected to be effective
unless they are bolstered by onsiderable economic resraints by monetary authoities and in government pending.
"Effects of a high rate of inflation are particilarly evere on agriculture,
