Fines Assessed For Sign Damage

Ben Charles Grundy pled guilty in County Court Tuesday afternoon before **County Judge Billy Whitaker** on charges of distruction of public property. Grundy and Timmy Brooks, who will face similar charges, were in the county sheriff's custody Monday and charged with damaging highway signs in the county. Grundy faced a Class A misdemeanor charge for damaging one sign. He was fined \$50 plus a court cost of approximately \$50 and agreed to pay the damages of \$38.34.

Brooks, who with Grundy was accused of damaging 13 highway signs Sunday, Jan. 21, is expected to be charged with the distruction of most of the signs, according to the sheriff's office. However,

the county clerk's office said Tuesday that charges were still pending against Brooks. The signs had been hit by at least two vehicles, and **Texas Highway officials and** State Troopers found tire tracks, chrome, or paint fragments at each sight. Cost of replacing or

repairing the signs was not high because most of the signs could be pushed back upright, due to muddy or loose ground.

Judge Whitaker said he was interested in seeing that the distruction did not happen again, as he assessed the fine on Grundy. A Class A misdemeanor charge is when the damage is more than \$5. and less than \$200. It can carry a penalty not to exceed \$2000 or not to exceed one year in jail, or both.

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
FARM ECONOMIC SITUATION CLOUDY

Inflation and a mild recession are several of the roadblocks facing farmers and ranchers in 1979, says a marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural **Extension Service.**

Dr. Carl Anderson expects overall economic growth to slow to 2 percent or less in 1979, down from nearly 4 percent in 1978. "This will bring on a mild recession during mid-year. The economic slowdown will likely curtail buying of higher priced cuts of red meats and will encourage the use of ground beef, meat substitutes and poultry," he contends. "Mill use of cotton may also decline.

"Inflation and the high cost of energy eill continue to hamper economic growth in the United States and will expecially keep agricultural producers in an economic bind," believes Anderson. "The President's wage and price standards are not expected to be effective unless they are bolstered by considerable economic restraints by monetary authospending.
