Mr. Jim Jones was a murderer, Marxist, God hater, absolute dictator and Satanist who "wanted to believe he was God' (Los Angeles Herald Examiner 11-21-78) of his communist church which was situated in a procommunist country, Guyana; which is a way-stop for Russian aircraft ferrying Cuban troops and supplies to Angola and Ethiopia for further conquests in Africa. In 1977, with about 1,200

followers Jones left California for Guyana. After the assination of Congressman Ryan and associates Novenber 18, 1978 Jones ordered the mass murder of some 900 followers. Most of them were derelicts, ex-cons ex-dope addicts and dropouts of society who were easy prey of the occult.

aware that a \$5,000 grant received from SPAG would not be available unless used in the immediate future. The funds are to be used in obtaining a meeting place for the senior citizens organization.

Several other local organizations have evidenced that they would use the school facility, if available. A number of concerned citizens have been working toward this end since it was learned early last year that the school board was planning to demolish the building and use the grounds for parking space. Former residents, principally among the ex-students ranks, sent generous contributions for use in retaining the building.

At this point, the school board is requesting an estimate of the amount which would be needed for the proposed repairs, which include the roof, auditorium, plumbing and wiring of the lower floor. The plans do not include the use of the second floor. The extension of two months was granted by the board, to obtain the estimates, and also to devise means of raising the necessary funds to match possible government grants that are being sought.

Eclipse Expected Monday, **Blindness Warning Issued**

Barring overcast skies, on Monday morning February 26th, panhandle residents will be able to observe the last eclipse of the sun in North America this century, according to Arthur Schneider, Director of the Don Harrington Discovery Center, Amarillo, Texas. Although partial for this area, the eclipse will be total in the northwestern section of the United States and

central Canada. The moon's shadow first strikes the earth in the North Pacific, about 1000 miles west of Vancouver, at It then swiftly moves eastward, striking land at the mouth of the Columbia River, between Washington, and Salem, Oregon near the path of total eclipse. The shadow continues to sweep eastward and then slightly northward, passing over Butte, Missoula Helena, and Great Falls, Montana. At 10:40 a.m. CST, the shadow moves into Canada near Crosby, North Dakota From there it is into the wilderness of northern Ontario, Hudson Bay, Baffin Island, and finally northern Greenland.

Astronomically.

conditions for viewing the eclipse are similar along the path of totality. The sun will be positioned fairly low in the southeast, with totality lasting only 21/2 minutes.

The panhandle of Texas

will experience a partial exlipse with 70-75 per cent of the solar disc eclipsed by the moon. The event begins about 9:08 a.m. CST with a dark notch appearing on the upper right of the sun's face. Around 10:18 a.m. CST greatest eclipse will take place. Although nearly 3/4 of the sun will be blocked by the moon and the sun's total light may be dimmed, it is extremely dangerous to look directly at the sun. 

the unprotected eye. One method of totally safe viewing is the pinhole projection method

In a darkened room, facing south, a small hole in a window shade will cast a pinhole image of the solar crescent on the floor or opposite wall. In a similar manner this type of projected solar image can be produced inside a large box with one end having a small nail hole in it. The box acts as a shade allowing the image to be more easily seen inside the box. Remember, in each case the PINHOLE UTILIZED FOR PROJECTION AND IS NOT USED TO DIRECTLY OBSERVE THE SUN.

A variation of the pinhole projection technique is to use a flat mirror and project the solar image on a shaded wall of a nearby house or other structure. In order to see the sun properly, this image should be projected 30 to 50 feet away. Again, do not reflect the light directly into anyones eves.



President Carter's Nomination Draws Sharp Opposition

President Carter's nomination of Norval Morris to head the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration has drawn sharp opposition from the National Rifle Association.

The one-million member association's opposition to the appointment of the dean of the University of Chicago Law School came in a letter from Neal Knox, executive director of the NRA Institute for Legislative Action to Senate Judiciary Committee chairman, U.S. Sen. James Eastland (D-Miss.), and to U.S. Sen. Strom Thurmond (R-S.C.), the ranking mino-

Knox characterized Morris' views on outlawing the private ownership of firearms as "extreme." and told the Judiciary leadership, "to have Prof. Morris direct an instrument of such massive influence and power as LEAA is totally and irreversibly unacceptable to

cited Morris' ten-year crusade aimed at "categorically denying private citizens the right to keep and bear arms" and his total diadain for the proven effects of such criminal justice tools as stiff mandatory sentences as a deterrent to criminal activity.

"On countless occasions, in testimony before various government panels, in publications and in the press, Prof. Morris has called for physically disarming our law-abiding citizenry," Knox added. Further, Knox said that polls have indicated that nearly half the total households in America have at least one firearm. "A huge segment of our population has a direct, personal stake in this man's views and in this appointment. But Prof. Morris has also predicted the ultimate disarming of the police,"

said Knox. In a recent publication Morris modified his position to allow some sports clubs to keep member firearms in "arsenals."

'When a man who enjoys Prof. Morris' reputation as an authority on law can advocate the use of hidden monitors 'capable of searching anyone passing through a door or along a footpath' for firearms and then states 'there can be no right of privacy in regard to armament,' one wonders if so cavalier an attitude in denying rights to firearms owners might not, at some future date, be extended to others, say the press, for example, or minority groups or to those espousing a different political philosophy," said Knox. 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


