Spur Man Killed Friday

Jerry Nelson McGee, 32 of Spur, was killed by an electrical shock Friday morning when he and a co-worker Milton Ray Bohannan were using a truck hoist to lift a utility pole when the pole came in contact with live over head wires.

McGee, a foreman for Dickens County Electric Cooperative, received a fatal electrical shock Friday morning when he and co-worker Milton Ray Gohannan were using a truck hoist to lift an utility pole when the pole reprotedly touched live wires overhead.

McGee was a native of Roaring Springs. He married Lana Rape April 12, 1970, in Hereford. They moved to Dickens County in 1971. He was a Vietnam veteran and a member of Baptist Church.

Frustrated Anti-Gun Lobby Turns to Senator Kennedy

The old Rogue Theater building and the former City Bakery Shop sold to the State of Texas Tuesday morning in public auction when none of the biders present were able to match the \$2,148 bid set by the court for the collection of back taxes.

The buildings, vacant for about 20 years, were part of the Graham Estate. The Bakery has most recently been used by the local chapter of the 4-H Club as a rifle range sponsored by the National Rifle Associa-

The 4-H Club had hoped to equal the bid set by the court but were unable to match the

The buildings are subject to be redeemed by the previous owners within the next two years, however the State does not have to wait for two years to reauction the buildings.

If the state does sell the property the former owners still have the option to redeem the buildings for two years.

Gun control advocates, frustrated by President Carter's lack of action, are turning to Sen. Edward M. Kennedy to alunch another battle for tougher federal restrictions on handguns.

Kennedy aides say the

Massachusetts Demo-

crat plans to introduce a bill that would ban the manufacture and sale of the small, easily concealed handguns used most often in gun crimes. Although details of the Kennedy proposal are still being drafted, the major thrust resembles legislation drawn up by the Carter administration more than a year ago

abandoned. Carter promised during his election campaign to seek new legislation to curb the proliferation of handguns, despite continuing and vigorous opposition from the National Rifle

He added, however, that "I think to pursue it aggressively in the Congress would be a mistake. But we will cooperate with the Congress."

Noting that Congress last year killed a much milder Treasury Department proposal to require serial numbers on new handguns, Carter ob-served, "I think that indicates the attitude of





A new concept in perennial weed control in Texas cropland is being met with enthusiasm. The concept is a fall application of herbicide on perennial weeds.

Dr. John Abernathy of Texas A&M has been instrumental in promoting the concept of a fall treatment, and explained its advantages. "A fall application strikes the weeds while they are in their most susceptible stage. Sugar and carbohydrates are no longer feeding the foliar plant, but are traveling back to the root system, where a kill can be achieved."




