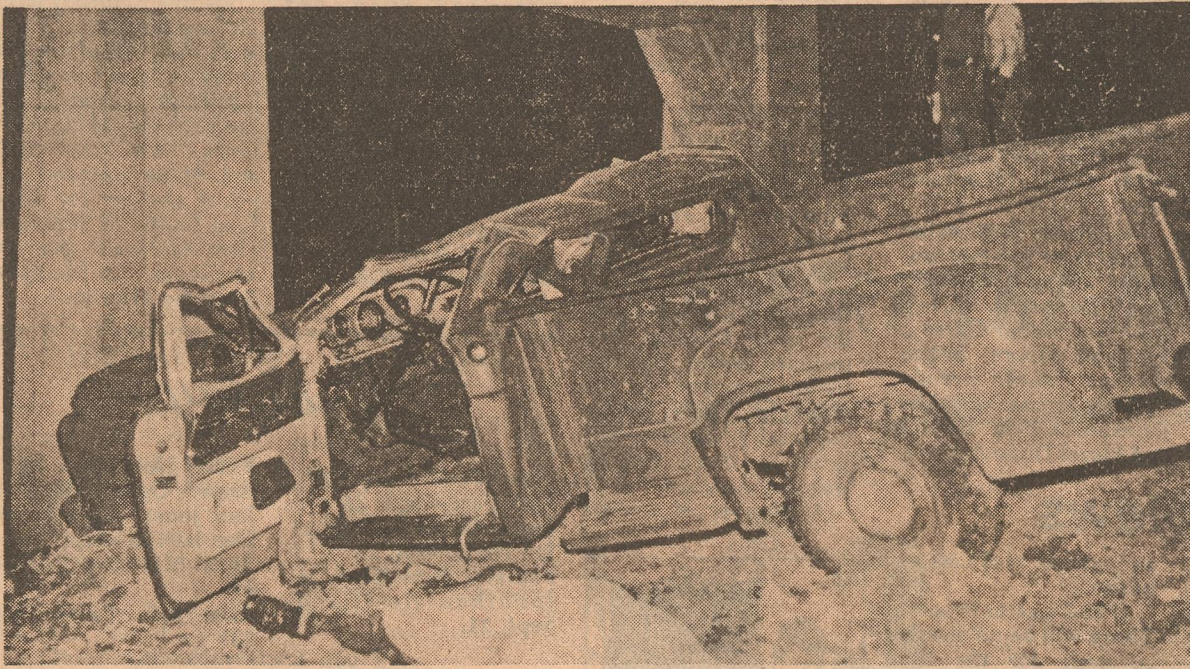

Dead were John Dee Rogers, 52, the driver, and John Henry Morgan, 36. (Vernon Special)

Former Residents Killed In Crash

Two former Matador men were killed instantly Tuesday, Sept. 11, when their pickup truck fell through an open section of an overpass which was under construction at Okalunion, near Vernon, Texas.

Pronounced dead at

the scene were John Dee Rogers, 52, and John Henry Morgan, 36. The men were said to have been on their way to Fort Worth to deliver a load of scrap iron. Investigators said the driver, Rogers, went the wrong way up the overpass ramp and

entered the area under construction. The overpass was not completed. Rogers is remembered in Motley County as the man who was riding with Sheriff Jinks Wilson on November 12, 1976 when the sheriff was

fatally shot. Rogers was wounded by the gunman that same day.

Services for Rogers were Saturday in First Baptist Church of Matador with L.F. Phillips of Childress officiating. He was a native of Bogota and lived in the Matador area for several years. Burial was in East Mound Cemetery.

Morgan's body was taken to Waco for burial. Survivors of Rogers include his widow, Julie; a son J.R., his mother Loucile Rogers, and a brother Leryo Leroy, all of Fort Worth; four sisters, Louis Sneed, Clementine Ownes, Ada May Rogers, and Viola Jean Kincaid, all of Fort Worth.

The Texas Department of Health will hold an Immunization Clinic in Matador on September 26, from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the Motley County Courthouse.

Immunizations will be available without charge to persons of all ages. Persons under 18 years of age must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. All persons should bring any immunization records available.

A Multiphasic Screening Clinic for adults will be held in Matador from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on September 24th. This clinic will also be held at the Motley County Courthouse.

Area Livestock Raising Subject of Abilene Talk

Livestock production in the Rolling Plains of Texas will be the subject of a mini-conference to be held September 27 at the Abilene Christian University Student Center in Abilene, according to Jerry L. Cummins, Motley County Extension Agent.

The conference, co-sponsored by the Rolling Plains Economic Program and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will begin at 1:00 p.m. with a welcome by Dr. Keith Justice, Professor and Head of the Abilene Christian University Agriculture Department. Presiding over the conference will be the R-PEP Chairman Gary Mathis of Stamford.

Seminars on horse, sheep, swine, and beef cattle production will follow Dr. Justice's welcome, according to Cummins.

The horse seminar will feature discussions on

the economics of owning and using ranch horses by B. F. Yeates, TAEX Horse Specialist. The nutrition and feeding management of horses will be covered by Dr. Doug Householder, TAEX Horse Specialist.

In sheep production, the outlook for this type of endeavor will be given by Robert H. Kensing, TAEX Area Economist. Sheep health will be examined by Dr. Percy Turner, veterinarian; and feeding and marketing will be covered by Jamie Kothman, feedlot operator at Menard.

Discussions on swine production will be introduced by Floyd Borchardt, R-PEP Vice Chairman. John Thurganger and David Graf, swine producers, will explain their swine operations and health programs. Ken Horton, Secretary of the Texas Swine Producers Association, will give a report on the associa-

tion's promotional efforts.

The beef cattle seminar will be chaired by Rick Perry, Chairman of the R-PEP Beef Cattle Task Force. Use of accounting records in ranching will be explained by Norman Brints, TAEX Area Economist-Management; and Dr. Whitney

Rounds, TAEX Area Livestock Specialist, will tell about beef cattle analysis using programmable calculators.

Question and answer sessions will be held following each of the seminars. The afternoon session is expected to end at 3:30 p.m., says Cummins.

Steers Gore Matadors With Last Minute Thrust

The Motley County Matadors' hopes to squeeze out another victory were shattered Friday night when Rochester Steer Halfback Chad Glower galloped 75 yards on a punt return for a touchdown.

That score came with 9:05 left in the final quarter and broke a 6-6 deadlock. The Steers went on to beat the Matadors 22-6.

The Steers scored first on the second play of the second quarter when Pep Nicholson plunged in from the one, after a stubborn MC defense denied the Steers paydirt two previous plays. The point-after-touchdown failed and the score stood 6-0, with 11:28 left in the first half.

MC quarterback Julian Zabielski rolled around right end, picked up a first down and then was cut down by the Steer defense. With 10:08 left in the first half, Zabielski

left the game with a sprained knee and saw no more action that night.

"When we lost Julian we lost our ability to throw the ball," Coach Gene Griffin said Monday. "That hurt us bad. It is doubtful if Julian will be back this week but may be back for Sudan."

MC's only score came at the end of the third quarter, after a nine play drive which covered 30 yards. With just six seconds left in the third period Matadors running back Harvey Lee went around left end and scored from three yards out. The PAT failed and the score was tied 6-6 as the final period started.

MC held Rochester on the next series of plays but the Matadors had to punt also. That's when Glower scampered for the 75 yard TD. A pass to Mark McGhee was good for the extra points and Rochester stretched its lead to 14-6. The Steers final score

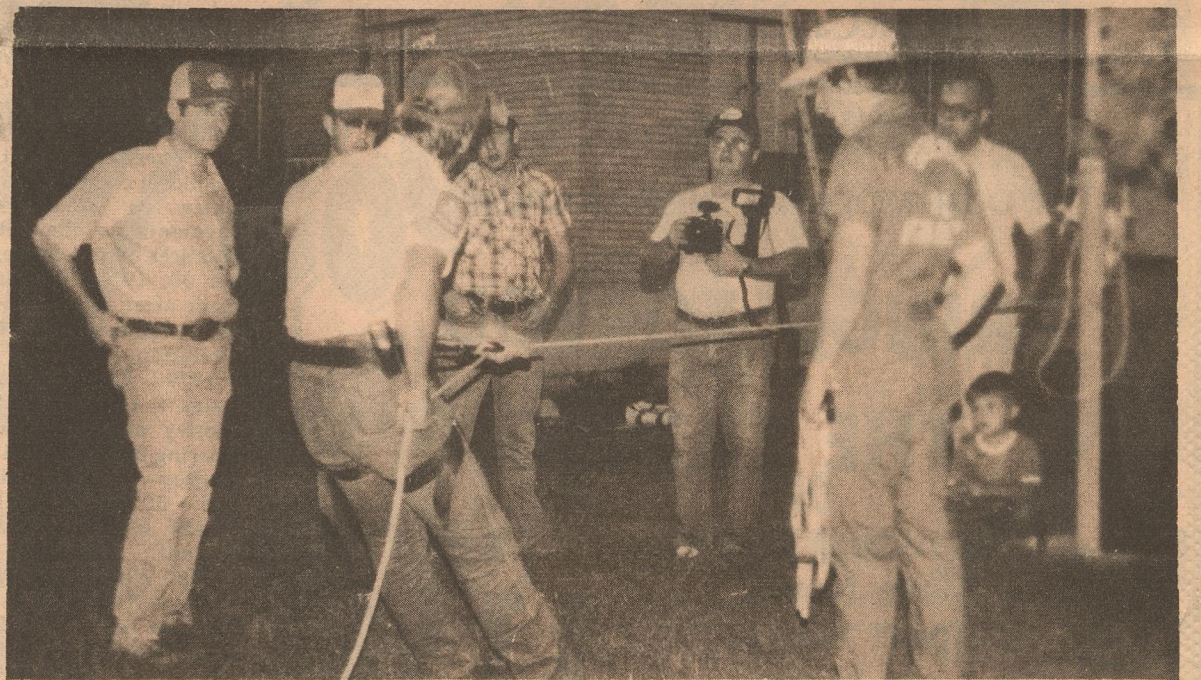
came after a 13 play drive which covered 72 yards. With 55 second left in the game Steer quarterback David Carver scored from 27 yards out. Nicholson ran in the PAT and the final score was 22-6, Rochester over Motley County.

Defensive standouts for the Matadors were Harvey Lee, Joe Don Warren, and Dewayne Walker. On offense Lee had 13 carries for 45 yards, Charlie Campbell 17 for 23, Dwight Campbell 8 for 13, and David Green had 6 punts for an average of 34 yards per punt.

Total offense both passing and rushing for the Matadors was 85 yards.

The Matadors will travel to Crosbyton Friday night. The game will start at 8 p.m.

"Crosbyton is going to be a tough game," Coach Griffin said. "We are going to come out and do our best against them."

Rappelling: We Learn It To Save Lives

A new technique was added to the skills of the Matador Volunteer Fire Department during practice Monday evening which could save time and lives if it was needed during an emergency situation.

Rappelling - the art of descending down a rope, has been used by the military, rescue units and mountain climbers for years, and is now an art known by a few local residents.

Bruce Tiffin and Gary Younger, members of the Silverton fire department and rescue unit, met with local firemen Monday for classes on rappelling.

"Only a few days after we learned to rappel and bought our equipment we used it to reach an injured man," Tiffin said. "He had run his truck off into a pit at the dump ground. We got down to him in about 15 seconds where it would have taken us about 15 minutes to find a way to climb down."

After a brief lecture on hook-up procedures and equipment orientation the Matador firemen went to the top of the courthouse and rappelled down the south wall.

Local firemen now hope to purchase a

minimum amount of rope and gear to be ready for rescue emergencies.

"A lot of men, and even women and children, rappel around Silverton just for fun and hobby," Tiffin said. "It is something easy to learn

and valuable for rescue purposes."

Local firemen plan to meet with the Silverton unit at a later date to practice more rappelling and improve their own knowledge of this valuable tool.

Set-Aside Acreage - You can now graze your set-aside acres. Set-aside acres cannot be harvested in any manner whatsoever. No Bailing - No Green Chopping - Etc. Only grazing is permitted. Your set-aside acres for 1979 will remain under program control through December 31, 1979. Wind and water erosion must be controlled, also weeds must be kept under control. Avoid costly penalties and see to it that you comply with set-aside requirements.

Agricultural Conservation Program - Those of you who have been approved for practices under the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) need to report the practice if completed. We have to make all payments on completed practices before September 30, 1979. Payments made after this date will count against your 1980 limitation.

1979 Cotton Loan Rates - Loan rates for Motley are as follows: Roaring Springs - 50.45¢; Turkey - 50.35¢; Quitaque - 50.35¢; Paducah - 50.45¢. Interest rate is 9 percent.

1980 Wheat Program - There will be no set-aside required for wheat. The loan rate has been

announced at \$2.50 per bushel.

1980 Disaster Program There will be no disaster coverage for the 1980 crops unless new legislation is enacted.

Holiday - This office will be closed Monday, October 8, 1979 in observance of Columbus Day.

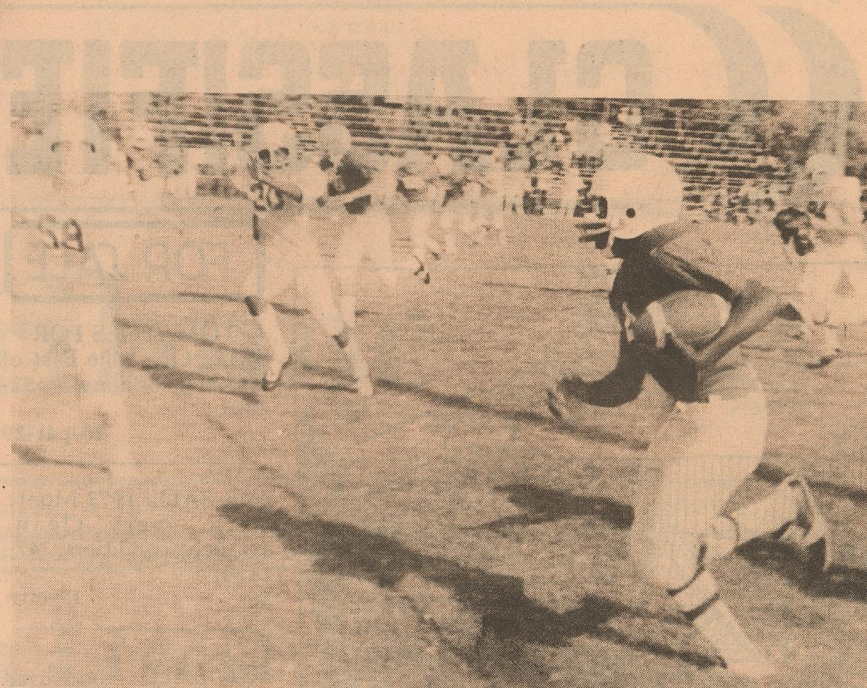

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would:

—Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and
—Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

—To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
—To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
—To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
—To prescribe procedures; and
—To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

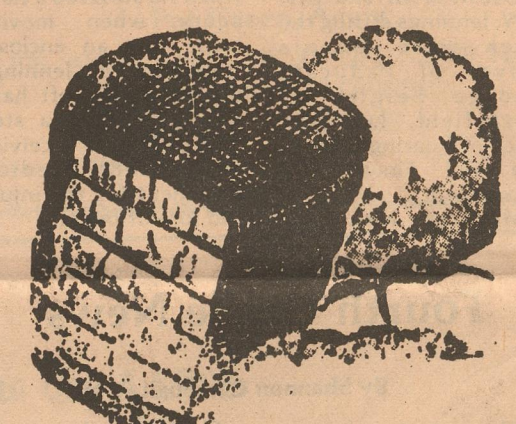
Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."
