Mrs. Ora Faye Patton, Stanley Hospital nurse, right above. showed him some of the gifts he received from strangers. His most cherished gift was the pair of boots shown at the left, given him by nurses in the hospital. The Christmas tree in the background was a gift of highway construction employees working near the scene of the accident. Charles Ray also received shirts and pajamas from Matador Volunteer firemen and other gifts. including money. A large box of toys was received from the C. N. Hodges school in Lubbock where classmates and his teacher, Mrs. Margaret Paige, collected gifts. He was released from the hospital on Christmas Eve to accompany an uncle to Oklahoma City. When this picture was made Charles Ray had not been told that he alone survived the accident, and was asking when his parents and brothers were coming to see him. Their wrecked car was found in a ravine more than two hours after the accident, with four members of the family dead and Charles Ray suffering a broken arm, shock and other injuries. He was pinned beneath the body of his dead brother. The temperature was 10 degrees below freezing.


