First 1955 Bale Ginned

First bale of 1955 cotton in the county was ginned Friday at Roaring Springs. The bale was grown by Ben Davidson on Mrs. George Springer's farm about 4 miles southwest of Roaring Springs. The 1750 pounds of "snaps" produced a 480-pound bale for which the Red Ball Gin paid 40¢ per pound. The cotton was planted about the first of June.

Caldwell Smith, manager of the gin said he paid at the rate of \$48 per ton for the 700 lbs of cottonseed. Cash contributions as a prize for the first bale amounted to about \$80. Mr. Smith said. The prize was collected in Roaring Springs. The first bale of 1954 cotton was ginned one day earlier, Sept. 1.

Second bale ginned in the county was raised by Fred Dawson on his farm between Matador and Roaring Springs and ginned here Saturday at the West Texas Gin. Joe M. Gaines, manager of the gin said the 1760 pounds of bolls produced a 539-pound bale, and 850 pounds of cottonseed which the gin bought at the rate of \$43 per ton. He said the cotton would class middling 7.8. Mr. Gaines paid 40¢ per pound for the cotton. Late yesterday he had collected approximately \$120 in cash and merchandise here in Matador as a prize for the first bale ginned here.

To Receive Plaque

Mr. Davidson will receive an engraved plaque for ginning the first 1955 bale in the county, it was announced Tuesday. In the future the Matador and Roaring Springs Lions clubs will be joint sponsors in presenting a plaque each year to the farmer ginning the first bale in the county. The plaque has been ordered for Mr. Davidson and will be presented upon arrival.

Annual 4-H Gilt Show Saturday

Annual 4-H Sears gilt show will be held at the Matador High School Ag building, Saturday, Sept. 10, at 1:45 p. m. It was announced by County Agent Bill Palmeyer this week. Judge of the show will be Kirby Clayton, county agent from Paducah.

Exhibiting gilts will be Gary Lancaster and Mae Martin, Matador; Bert Green and Stanley Brooks, Roaring Springs; Joe Ed Smith and Dean Turner, Flomol; and Vergie Holman, Northfield.

These gilts are the registered Poland Chinas furnished by the Sears Foundation, and were in turn furnished by 4-H members who showed gilts in the 1954 show. Those taking part in the 1955-56 program will furnish animals for members of the 1956-57 program.

The first place gilt will be shown at the District Show at Lubbock on Saturday, Sept. 17, together with the goat that is being fed by Wallace Archer of Flomol.

Mr. Greene runs 2,500 Hereford cattle and 5,000 sheep on the ranch. The area has an annual rainfall of about 30 inches and has a present market value of \$100 per acre. Mr. Greene's expensive hobby is raising race horses. The Australian who accompanied Mr. Kouch to Childress by private plane, was impressed by the contrast of green fields and "desert" in West Texas. There are no such oases in the Australian desert, he said. He had previously visited the King Ranch in South Texas and ranches in several other states.

DEATH CLAIMS "KID" KENNEDY

Death has claimed one of Matador's oldest and best-known citizens, Joseph C. "Kid" Kennedy, 92, died early Monday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Frank Stafford.

"Kid" as Mr. Kennedy was affectionately known throughout Matador's business area, had lived here for approximately a quarter of a century. He had been in failing health for several months.

He was born in Collin County, Texas, January 24, 1863, and died at Matador, Sept. 5, 1955, at the age of 92 years, 7 months and 11 days. He was married to Miss Mary Campbell, June 29, 1882, and she died in 1912. In 1917 he was married to Mrs. Emma Bloodworth, and she preceded him in death in 1935. Mr. Kennedy was a member of the Methodist Church.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Baptist Church, with Rev. C. R. Mathis, Baptist pastor of Roaring Springs, and Rev. H. T. Harris, Baptist pastor of Whiteflat, officiating. Music included a quartet composed of Messrs. Nolen Barmore, Randall Whitworth, R. E. Campbell, Sr., and T. E. Edmondson, who sang, "Where We'll Never Grow Old," and a duet offering of "Whispering Hope" by Mrs. W. F. Jacobs (continued on back page)

Matadors Pop Buffs 13-6 In First Game

Coach Hopkins Takes "Crying Towel" To Forecast Friday Game With Spur

VICTORY crowned the Matador Matadors' first game of the season Friday night when they left the Petersburg Golden Buffaloes following on their own range with a score of 13-6. It was a wonderful beginning for the Matadors, witnessed by 2,500 fans, but Coach Ray Hopkins has not spread any optimism that the score pattern will be carried into the second game of the season.

The Class 2B Matadors will meet the AA Spur Bulldogs here on Burleson Field Friday night. The Bulldogs are loaded with senior lettermen and are overwhelming favorites to win their district title. Coach Ray Hopkins brought his "crying towel" to the Lions club meeting Tuesday when he outlined the season's prospects.

He said the Matadors lost seven starters from last year's team. He said 27 boys were out for football, but that most of them were freshmen. He explained that he played only 12 men in the Petersburg game because of his dearth of experienced players. Coach Hopkins praised his team, however, and said they played with hustle and drive, and the well to win.

Never Gave Up Lead

The following account of the Petersburg game appeared in the Saturday Lubbock Avalanche:

Matador spotted the Golden Buffaloes of Petersburg a 6-0 lead before roaring back in the same period to push over a pair of touchdowns for 13-6 victory before 2,500 fans in the opening football game of the season for both teams.

The District 2B Matadors staged a 62-yard march for its tying touchdown, with Arvin Ellithorp carrying over on an 18-yard run. Garland Cartwright carried over for the extra point and the Matadors had a lead they never gave up.

Petersburg opened the scoring when a Matador fumble was recovered on the visitors' 20-yard line. J. D. Adams set up the tally with an 18-yard jaunt and Edward Thompson crashed over from the two on a handoff from Don Rhodes.

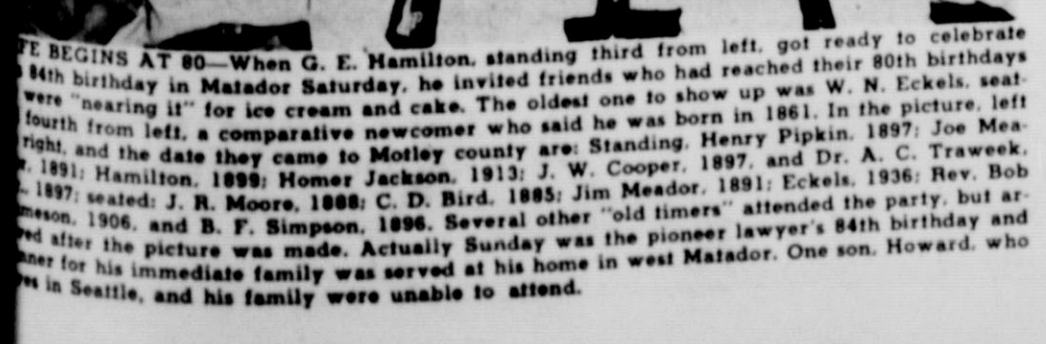
Mrs. Stanfield has been operating Mrs. Anna Harmon's shop during the summer.
