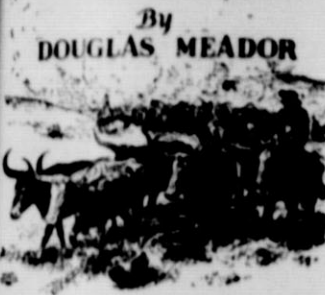

Scouts' Carlsbad Trip Shaping Up

Queries to chambers of commerce along the route of the proposed Boy Scout troop to Carlsbad are beginning to be answered, Tom Hamilton, scout master, has said. Hamilton last week mailed out cards to the civic organizations in an effort to determine what restaurants and camping grounds the troop will use on the journey. Tentative plans call for the troop to begin its jaunt July 16 and to return July 21. The proposed trip calls for visits to the Caverns, Albuquerque, Taos, Eagle Nest Lake, Ratan, the Catlin Mountains, and Boy's Ranch at Tascosa. Twenty-five boys will make the 1,200-mile trek in a truck to be loaned by a local business concern, Hamilton declared. Sponsorship of the tour will be under the direction of the Matador Lions Club.

MATADOR YOUTH LEARNS ABOUT STATE POLITICS; ELECTED HEALTH OFFICER

A Matador youth survived the political maneuvers of the Lone Star Boys State held in Austin June 8-16 and emerged as health officer for Lone Star City. The boy was Charles Herbert Sanders, 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hallford. Lone Star City was the name given the dormitory at the Texas State School for the Deaf where Sanders and 40 of his companions stayed. Sanders, like any other city official, was elected to his position after a great deal of heated campaigning took place. However, the Matador youth took the race like a veteran politician. In all, there were more than 300 boys attending the session. Eight cities comprised the parties sought the political power. It was an effort to teach the boys something about state government. Movie Set For School Has Come

A \$600 sound motion picture projector for Matador High School arrived Tuesday, school officials have announced. The machine was purchased by the class of '47 from money taken in by a series of programs given by the group. Chief attraction of the projector is its independent sound box, which can be detached and used for football games, and other public gatherings. Use of the machine will be chiefly to bring visual educational films to students of the high school and grade school. However, other films, such as popular Hollywood releases, can be rented, school officials declared. Half of the purchasing price of the projector has been paid, and the remaining portion will be paid this year. An electric record player, also ordered by the school, has not arrived as yet, but is scheduled to come sometime before school starts.

STAMPS QUARTET PRESENTS PROGRAM AT HIGH SCHOOL

Generally tagged as singers of religious songs, members of the Stamps All Star Quartet waived from their popular reputation and presented a program spiced with comedy and current hit tunes in the high school auditorium last Monday. Nonetheless, the religious theme occupied the greater part of the evening's entertainment, as did a rather snappy style of presentation, which is peculiar to the group. Only one hymn was rendered in the slower tempo, but all were presented with an air of casualness. The chorus of one particular selection, "Music In My Soul," was run through in 10 seconds flat. Perhaps the most easy-going of the group was Edwin Baggett, the pianist. The youthful piano player seemed to be playing songs that he had played hundreds of times before. As for the singers, it was J. W. Elliott, the bass, who captured the fancy of the appreciative audience. Elliott reached for some low notes on the hymns, but it wasn't until his solo, "Asleep In The Deep," that he brought up a B-flat.

"Approximately 75 farmers have applied for crop damage insurance claims," Allen declared. "It wasn't a case of planting being done at the wrong time—it was the rain that was off-schedule." One farmer reporting to the AAA office said that only four acres of his 104-acre plot was saved. Most of the damage done was to cotton and wheat.

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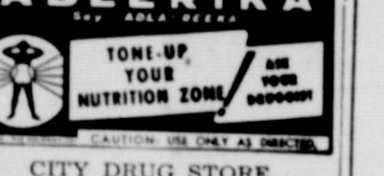

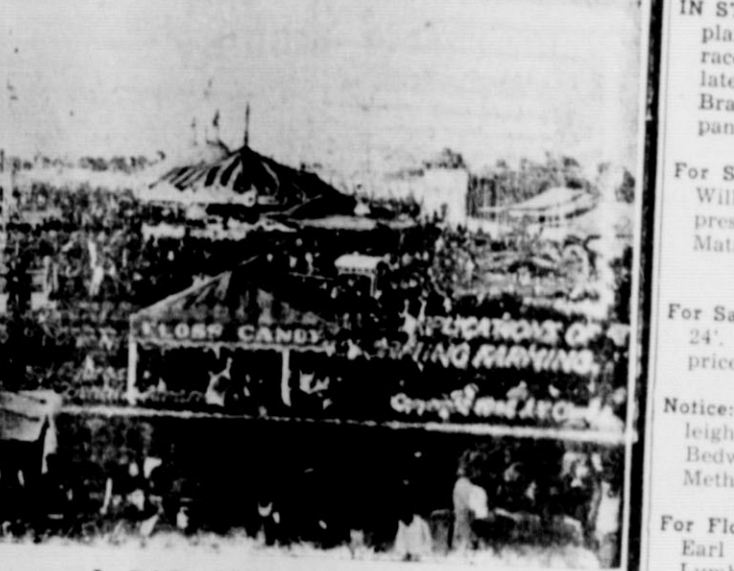

be made starting July 1st. Therefore, bring or mail your cream tickets to the AAA office if payment is desired. The payment rate for April is the same as it has always been whereas the payment rate for May and June will be 15c per pound for butterfat and 55c per hundred-weight for whole milk. That is an increase over the same months in 1945 but slightly less than the rates for April. Producers are requested to bring their cream tickets to the AAA office and sign an application just as soon after July 1 as practical.

Termination of Beef Cattle Production Payment Program
The offer of CCC to make

Beef Cattle Production Payments expires June 30, 1946. In the case of feeder-slaughter, a beef animal otherwise eligible will not be eligible for payment unless slaughtered before midnight June 30, 1946 to the slaughterer for slaughter.

All applications for beef cattle production payments must be submitted to the AAA office for payment not later than August 31, 1946.

Termination of Sheep and Lamb Production Payment Program
The offer of the CCC to make sheep and lamb production payments expires June 30, 1946. All provisions as stated above for the Beef Cattle Production Pro-

gram are applicable to the sheep and lamb production payment program.

All applications for sheep and lamb production payments must be submitted to the AAA office not later than August 31, 1946.


