EDITORIAL

Local Citizens Extend Helping Hand

Stray dogs and cats within the city limits of Matador have become a nuisance and a menace to county residents. It's time for the citizens of this county to band together and eliminate this hazard.
With the dreaded disease rabies having already been found in this area, there is no non-vaccinated animal safe from this killer. All animals, and humans, are susceptible to this disease with a VERY painful result from any point of view. Stray and non-immunized animals are probable targets for infected animals.
With the close contact between residents and animals in this town, there is the greatest need for a law to

be passed or something to be done to end this problem before it really gets out of hand.
In the school area, owners of loose pets need to be contacted in order to keep their animals from bothering the children. If one of the school children should be bitten, who will take the blame at this time.
There is no law pertaining to the condition of the county's animals; therefore there is no one to check the health of these roving mongrels. If the owners can't control their pets they cannot be kept from becoming a dangerous factor to everyone's daily environmental contacts.
Something has to be done. What?

Motley County residents are extending a helpful hand to Vernon and Wichital Falls tornado victims as are other West Texans. Truck from churches and the Salvation Army in Lubbock have been picking up donations of good clothing, bed-linens and kitchen utensels headed for our neighbors who need help.

County judge, Bill Whitaker and local Salvation Army representative, Luther Green stated that another load of donations will be going to tornado victims Wednesday, April 24. If the boxes are packaged and so designated they will be delivered to specific Or-

ganizations. The greatest needs at this point seem to be kitchen utensels and all linens.
How can we complain over our little trials and grievances, our little petty problems when our "neighbors" down the way are struck with the horror and devastation that occurred almost in the twinkling of an eye? We really cannot comprehend the shock and realization that hundreds faced that April 10 evening when the tornadoes tore through Vernon, Wichital Falls and others not so horribly hurt.
We should count our many blessings though there isn't time enough to name them one by one.

disadvantaged people including health, arts and crafts, education, jobs, housing and Provides transportation, referrals, youth activities and general counseling to 6,000 low income families, administration and management of the program funded by other federal, state, and local governments providing services to the poor.
Executive Director is James Carr in Crosbyton.

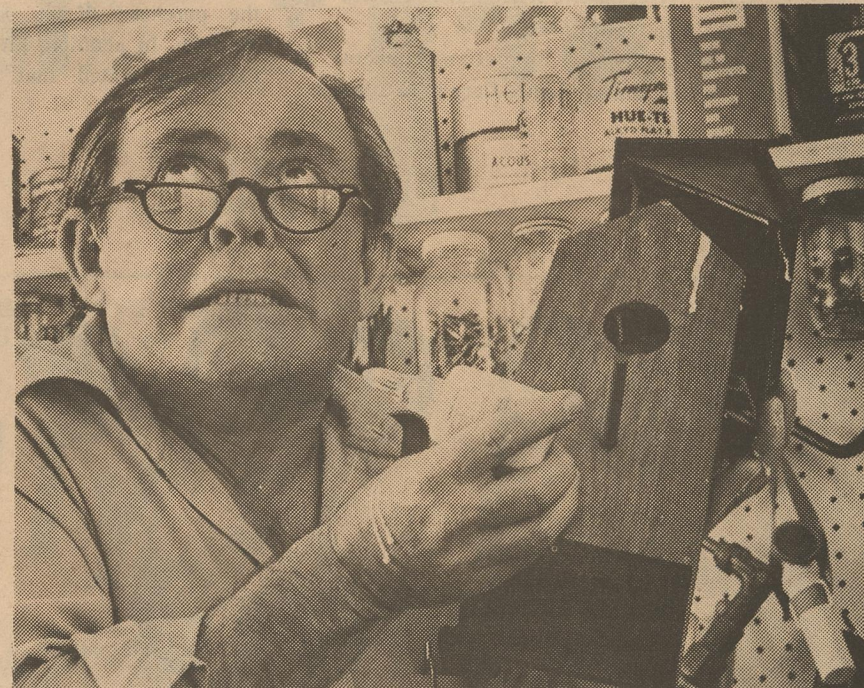

The tournament this year is set for Sunday, April 22 -- tee off at 1:30 p.m.

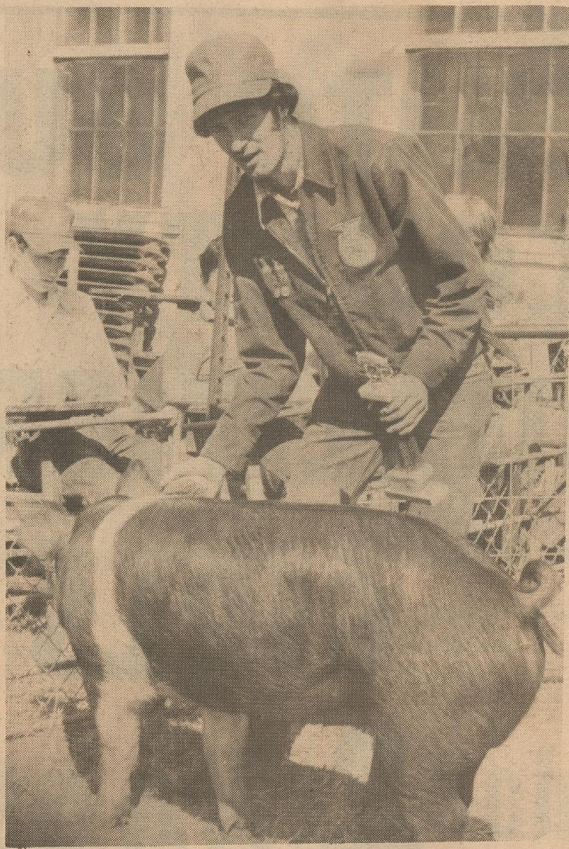
**Patton Spgs. Paper Staff

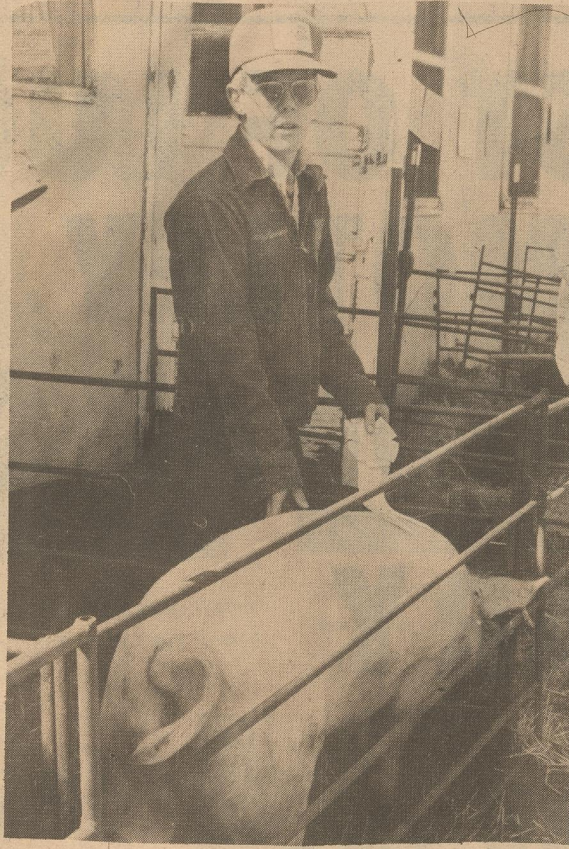
They all reported to have

The application for funding of the proposed regional EMS system has been completed and sent to the regional office of DHEW in Dallas.

90-120 days before installation of equipment complete -- March or April, 1980.
I anticipate we should receive notification of the outcome of our application in June. For this reason, I would like to postpone the regularly scheduled meeting of the SPEMS Council in April. The next scheduled quarterly meeting is July 31, 1979. You will receive a notice and agenda of this meeting prior to that date. By that time, we will be able to move ahead with the work of establishing a regional emergency medical system.

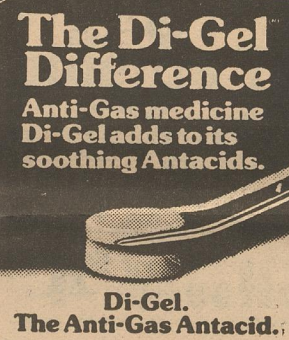
