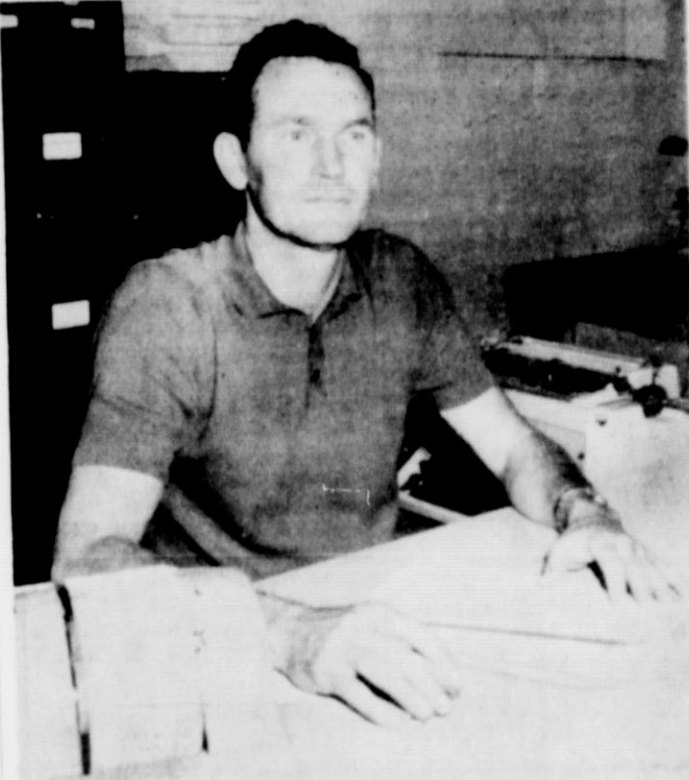

Hospital Board To Weigh Federal Aid

FEDERAL AID in the construction of a new hospital through the Hill-Burton assistance will be reviewed by the Motley County hospital board. A decision was reached Thursday night at a special meeting of the board held at the court house, to authorize architects and the consultant to prepare an application for Hill-Burton funds. The application must be filed by May 31 in order to get assistance out of this year's appropriations.

One member of the hospital board said the application had no important significance, except that in case the county did decide upon and approve the construction of a new hospital, the application would be on file. Otherwise the delay of a year or more would be certain. No obligation is attached to the application. The county would first need to vote matching bonds before the application could become effective.

The board is considering many other conditions, especially the need of the district after the advent of Medicare July 1.

The Tribune has no authority to assume that generally the board members favor the use of existing facilities within the district. This position must hinge upon approval of Medicare and insurance company inspectors who have already made some surveys this week. Reports of the inspectors are not available.

The hospital board has not spent any funds and no funds are available to it until a bond issue has been approved. The five members of the board are serving without pay in order to ascertain the best possible procedure for the Motley County Hospital District and at the least expense.

The architects and consultant have advised the board that a new 20 bed hospital would cost approximately \$400,000 to build. (Continued on back page)

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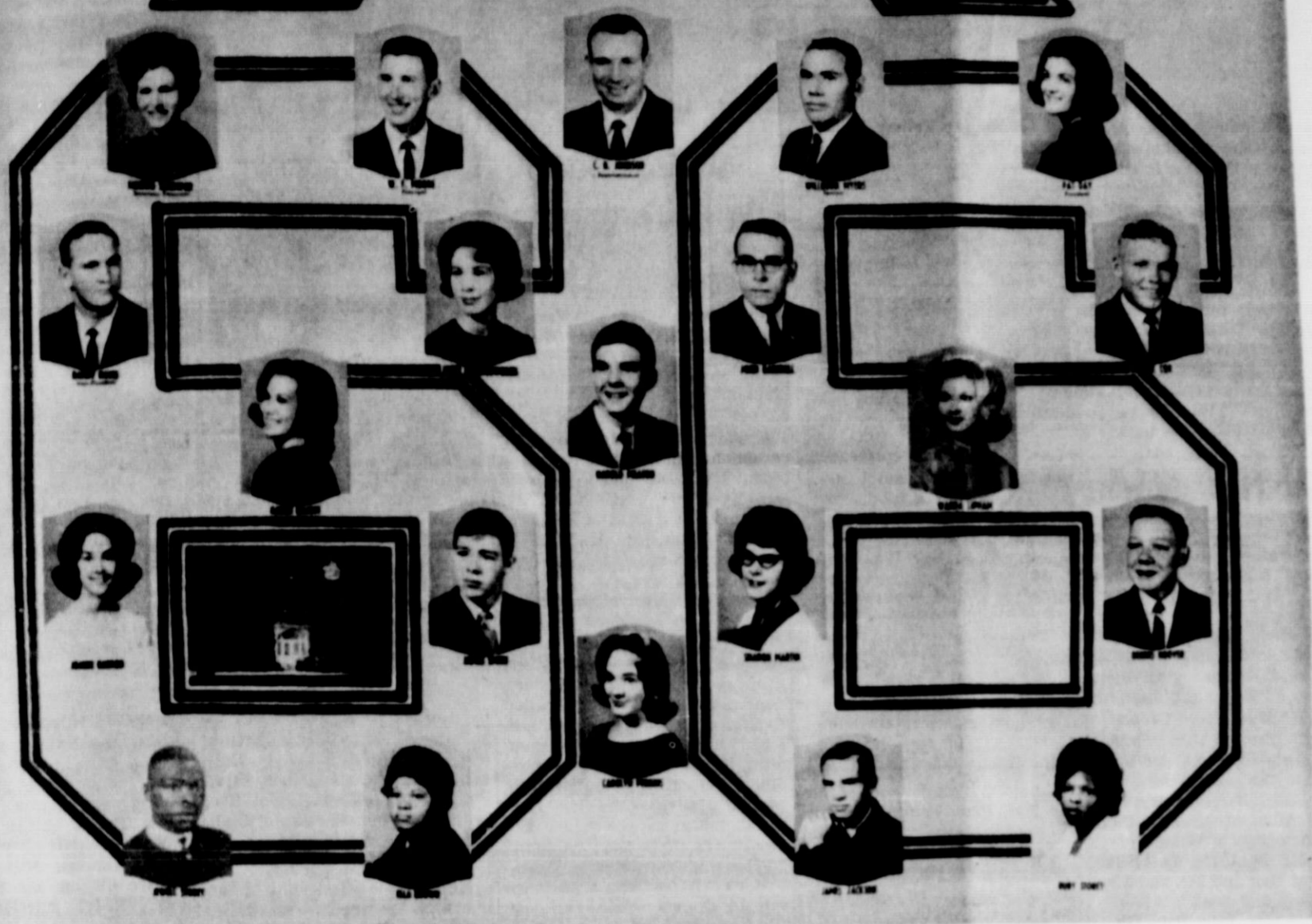

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Freeze branding is new, in fact so new that it isn't even mentioned as yet in the brand laws. Livestock owners interested in this process are urged to contact me for additional information.

Weeds use 4 to 11 times more water for growth than do good native grasses; some are poisonous to livestock; and others cause damage to eyes of animals.

If weeds are a problem on your range you may be interested in weed control.

Best control results are obtained when weeds are 4-6 in. tall, growing vigorously with plenty of soil moisture and when the temperature ranges from 55 to 85 degrees.

If this is your problem, I have bulletins listing weeds and controls, free for the asking.

These tips should be helpful to those wishing to fertilize their lawn. As most recommendations are for so many pounds per 1,000 square feet, it is necessary to know the area of the lawn to purchase the amount of fertilizer needed. When applying, if you lay off your lawn in blocks of 1,000 square feet, it will help you to determine if you are applying the proper amount of fertilizer.

Knowing the total area, and marking of the 1,000 square foot areas is also valuable in applying

herbicides for weed control. This way, you know if you are applying enough material to do the job, and avoid over application that may burn the grass.

Local people with peach trees should be interested in the following information provided by Extension Horticulturist Blueford Hancock. Peaches should be thinned to have a space of about 6 inches between fruits. (With moisture we have at the present time) Plums can be carried with a closer spacing.

Now is the time to thin the fruit.

but may have its place in this area. Before "leaping in with both feet," why not try a limited acreage to see how it does here.

Tests show that baby pigs need iron to get a good start in life, and unless iron is received by the time they are 3 to 5 days of age, they are anemic.

Baby pigs have a very low storage level of this trace mineral at birth, and the sow's milk is also low in iron content. Five methods are suggested for supplying iron:

1. Inject iron-dextran compounds into the muscle.
2. Dose with an iron pill or paste.
3. Swab the sow's udder with an iron solution.
4. Supply pigs with clean soil, mixing iron sulfate with the soil.
5. Feed mixtures containing high iron levels, if the pigs start eating at an early age.

Each of these methods have advantages and disadvantages. If pig anemia seems to be your

problem, why not stop by and see if one of these treatments can be used in your management system.

Farmers should consider what to do with empty fertilizer bags. Dangers as well as eye-irritation result with improper disposal of the bags, and placing the empty bags upside down on a fence post is not the answer.

Cattle may be poisoned by the remains of the fertilizer regardless of how small the amount of fertilizer left in the bag. Acids have resulted when bags have blown into the path of passing vehicles, and all of us are familiar with the way they litter the countryside.

Only a few seconds are required to place the empty bags in a pickup and then drop them off at a place to be burned. Will you help with the litter and safety problem?



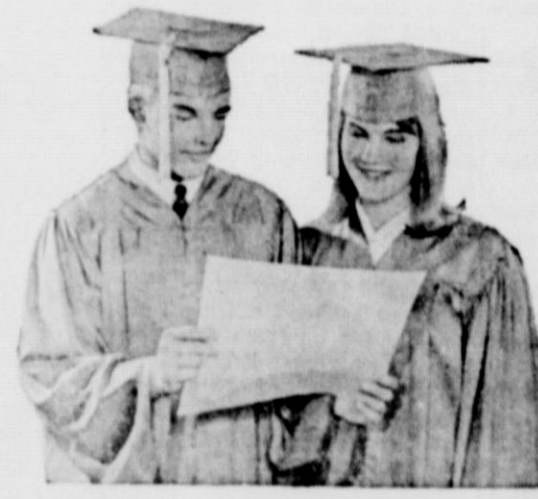
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
