When the guns fell silent at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918, many noted that it was the eleventh hour - not the twelfth hour of completion. Then, when the anniversary was officially designated as Armistice Day. today known as Veterans Day, there was the ominous note again - not Peace, but Armistic: An armed truce.

Theme of the 1955 Veterans Day observance will be "Peace With Honor". That theme was selected by a National Committee headed by Harvey Higley, Administrator of Veterans Affairs, appointed by President

Many are asking what we should do on this Armistice or Veterans Day of 1955. For the soldiers who have come back from wars on foreign soils, for the families and friends of those who rest in alien lands or in the sea, or in home ground, that question does not arise. For them, dawn of the eleventh of November will always break upon an ineffaceable memory. And for the inmates of our crowded military hospitals, war has never ended. A new generation appears, people go about their daily affairs oblivious of the true meaning of the day, but for millions November 11 will ever be a day apart.

Veterans Day is not a holiday. It should not be a day of pleasure. It is a solemn occasion dedicated to the memory of those who have died in order that we may live. A day to honor those who carry through life the scars of conflict. A day for a grateful nation to recall their sacrifices, and, in a small way pay its humble tribute. A day to remember the brutality and uselessness of war. A day to think of the 21 million living U. S. veterans of all wars.

Veterans Day should have a second purpose-it should be a day on which to analyze the problems that beset us as a nation, and on which to pledge our best efforts toward a just and lasting solution of those problems. This is our obligation to the soldiers living and dead who preserved our liberties.

Peace - not Armistice is our goal. All the impressive words spoken would be a mockery if we did not believe that November 11, 1918, was in reality a rainbow of promise for peace among nations. It is for us, the living, to make it more than a promise.
