Mr. Luckett built the brick building on the same site and it was first occupied in August 1916. The Luckett estate sold it to Motley county as a temporary courthouse after the old courthouse was destroyed by fire in 1944. Later the property was sold to the Jackson estate, present owners.

The expanded emergency loans, which will continue to supplement credit supplied by regular lending programs, are expected to help farmers and ranchers finance major reorganizations when that is necessary to stabilize their operations. Control Debt Loans

In addition to the expanded credit program, assistance will be available through the Farmers Home Administration to both creditors and debtors in effecting voluntary adjustments of existing debts, when necessary, in order that the debt load on the farmer or rancher be held to a point within his ability to repay.

In cases where it is necessary in order to enable the farmer or rancher to continue his operations the Farmer Home Administration may include funds in domestic and irrigation water the loan to refinance his indebtedness.







A LIGHTED CIGAR dropped in a waste basket late on the afternoon of December 14, 1914. caused Matador's most disastrous fire. Three frame buildings in the heart of the small town's business section were destroyed and for a time the entire block was threatened - one small building was dragged across a vacant space to the south to prevent the spread of the flames. The businesses lost included the Bates Dry Goods (where the fire first started) present site of Case Dry Goods, Moore & Moore grocery and a barber shop. Above picture shows the old F&M bank building (now the Barkley building), looking south on Main street. In the left background is the Matador Hardware Company, then a wooden building, which was saved by keeping the roof soaked through the cooperation of most of the town's male population operating a bucket brigade. The bank building was not damaged altho buckets of water were hoisted to the roof during the fury of the fire. The above picture also shows the beginning of the construction of the four modern bricks which replaced the buildings destroyed by the fire. The late R. P. (Ranse) Moore told the Tribune the four buildings 100-feet x 100-feet cost less than \$2,300 each. At extreme right in above picture is the corner of the old First State Bank building.


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
