

Homer Kingery Paralyzed In Freak Accident

HOMER KINGERY, 57, Roaring Springs area farmer, is in critical condition here in Stanley hospital, the victim of a freak accident about 9:30 Sunday morning. Mr. Kingery, with the aid of a Spanish-American, was attempting to lift an ailing cow by her feet through the arrangement of an iron pipe tripod and block.

The heavy pipe tripod fell, striking Mr. Kingery on the shoulder and at the back of his neck. X-Ray examination showed that his back had been broken by the impact. The upper part of his body is paralyzed.

A specialist summoned from Lubbock early this week rendered approximately the same findings as local physicians. Late yesterday Mr. Kingery's condition was described as "quite critical."

At present Mr. Kingery is under the care of his sister-in-law, Miss Ruth Jameson, Registered Nurse with the Veteran's Hospital, Big Spring, Miss. Jameson, former Matador resident, obtained leave of absence to serve as special nurse in the family emergency.

Members of Mr. Kingery's family said the cow which he was attempting to "doctor" had been unable to get on her feet for approximately a month. He had intended to shoot the animal as an act of mercy in the apparently hopeless situation, but decided to make one more attempt to "get her on her feet."

He and the Spanish-American helper rigged the pipe tripod and placed it over the cow when the accident occurred. The Kingery farm is located about 14 miles southeast of Matador.

City Arrayed In Holiday Lights

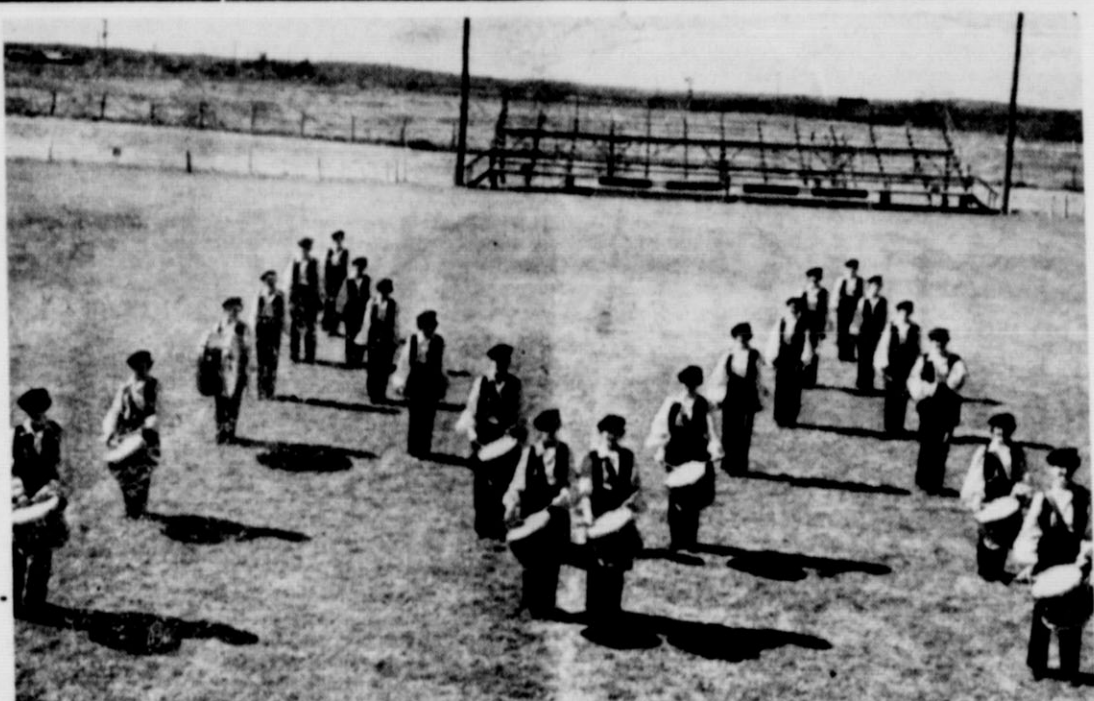
Christmas came to Matador this week with more than a force and while the lingering days of November were still the calendar, plans were being developed for the Yuletide holidays.

Town Will Close Up To Attend Contest

CHRISTMAS is just around the corner but the Matador Matadors are still playing football. Tomorrow evening at 7:30 they are scheduled to meet the Gruber Greyhounds in Buffalo Stadium, Canyon, to decide the bi-district championship honors. The Matadors are ready. Stellar Fullback Arvin Ellithorp is still suffering from a sprained ankle sustained in the Matador-Wheeler game. Serial Number Now A Requirement To Register Trailers

The Texas Highway Department has been losing revenue from the owners of some trailers and semi-trailers, who have been switching license plates and sometimes taking the plates from a registered trailer and attaching them to another trailer which had never been registered. They are going to do something about it.
Effective today (December 1) it is required that all trailers and semi-trailers having a gross weight of 4,000 pounds or more must have a serial number on the respond with that on the license receipt. If the trailer manufacturer did not place a serial number on the trailer, it must be stamped by a mechanic before proper registration papers can be issued.
Information received recently by Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector John Stott's office requires the following evidence to register or transfer a trailer or semi-trailer:
New trailers: (1) Seller's invoice—recording serial number. (2) Complete form 52. Out-of-state trailers: (1) Out of state registration receipt. (2) Out of state title (if issued). (3) Complete Form 52. Shop built but not currently registered trailers: (1) Bill of sale, affidavit of construction or ownership as of Dec. 1. (2) Complete Form 52.
Renewal of Texas registered trailers: (1) Previous years registration receipt showing serial number. (2) If no manufacturer's serial number is affixed to trailer, must obtain assigned serial number (Owner's own serial number are not to be accepted).
Serial numbers will not be issued until officials are completely satisfied with the evidence of ownership.

Farmers Alerted For Wind Erosion Season

The following article written by James Priddy, unit conservationist here, Federal Soil Conservation Service, Upper Pease District, in cooperation with E. Moore, administrator for Motley County

dry season also means a season with an unwelcome crop of real estate. There is much we can do about the soil erosion problem, but we should be making the best we can to keep our individual farms in place.

The amount of sorghums and second growth on the land we should be able to keep on the ground. People have been doing research on factors that determine how much soil is lost to wind erosion. These are: natural soil surface roughness and living cover.

The most effective is cover. If we have more cover than in the past several years, our problem becomes less serious. The first natural tendency is to turn our livestock into our fields and forget to turn out. We can, in many instances, harvest some of this with livestock but we must be careful to remove the manure when the surplus has been removed. Leave enough stubble to protect the soil from blowing. To grub out the stubble may cost in gas and labor as we try to win a losing battle with the wind when there is no cover.

Some times we find it necessary to do some sort of tillage in the winter and spring. If we do not, it takes up more moisture than in a crusted condition. If we do not have sufficient stubble to control erosion, we have to increase roughness and to some extent, natural cloddiness on the surface. Research in the past has pulled the plug on the

eastern method of "turn it under" for our area. This can be accomplished by chisels or sweep-type equipment or by removing the wings from listers and do what is commonly called "pointing."

"I believe the stubble mulching method of soil management offers much if not more in soil and water conservation than any practice we have. It is the working together of all practices, however, that we receive the maximum benefits from soil and water conservation assistance. Stubble mulching assistance is available from our county ASC office, with general requirements as follows:

1. Row crop stubble must be maintained on surface until seed bed is prepared in the spring.
2. Sweep or chisel-type plow must be used. One-way plow will not qualify.
3. No grazing of stubble. Federal cost share is \$1 per acre. Full information may be obtained through inquiry at the ASC office."
