A Second Glance

We received a letter from the office of Senator John Tower concerning the SALT II agreement. In the letter Tower said: "We are told this is the best agreement the United States could get. I don't believe this to be the case. I certainly cannot support the SALT II agreement in its present form, and if the reservations expressed by many of my colleagues are any indication, it is unlikely that the United States Senate will ratify it without first making some major changes, if then."

Tower, the ranking Republican on the Senate Armed Services Committee, challenged the alleged "equality" of the SALT II accord, calling it "cosmetic", and declaring that it does not meet the standard of equality demanded by the Congress when it approved the Interim SALT agreement in 1972.

"How can we call this agreement equal when it allows the Soviet Union over 300 super heavy land-based missiles while allowing the United States none? How can we call this agreement equal when it excludes the Soviet Backfire bomber, but requires the United States to count American strategic bombers in mothballs and museums against its total allowed manned bombers?" Tower asked.

Tower also disputed the Carter Administration's view that SALT II will not impact on U.S. defense programs. "The only way this treaty will not impact on our defense programs is if the Administration continues to cancel or delay them."

The senior Texas senator said the MX land-based ICBM could be deployed during the treaty period by 1985 but the Russians have said the proposed "shell game" basing system for the MX is prohibited. The Administration disagrees with the Soviet interpretation, but still plans to accommodate the Soviet position, in effect, by waiting until after the treaty period to deploy the MX.

"As another sign of capitulation, before the treaty expires, the United States would be required to dismantle some multiple warhead land-based missiles if it wishes to modernize its submarine launched ballistic missile and air-launched missile

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Rabies Increasing In Many Texas Areas

Rabies, a disease all but forgotten by many people, is once again on the upswing.

Cases of rabies have increased sharply in many areas of Texas, says Dr. Jim Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

There were more laboratory-confirmed cases in Texas last year than any other year since 1961. and 1979 is off to a rousing start.

The first quarter of this year produced over twice the number of cases reported in 1978's first quarter, notes Armstrong. He says 80 to 90 percent of the cases are

in skunks. However, domestic animal cases are increasing.

Twenty-two rabid dogs have been reported in the El Paso area, possibly due to rabid stray dogs in Mexico, he says. As a result, special immunization clinics have been set up to increase the vaccination level. Armstrong says intensive stray dog pick-up activities are under way on both sides of the river.

The veterinarian says the keys to rabies control are public awareness, pet vaccination (both dogs and cats) and stray animal

control.

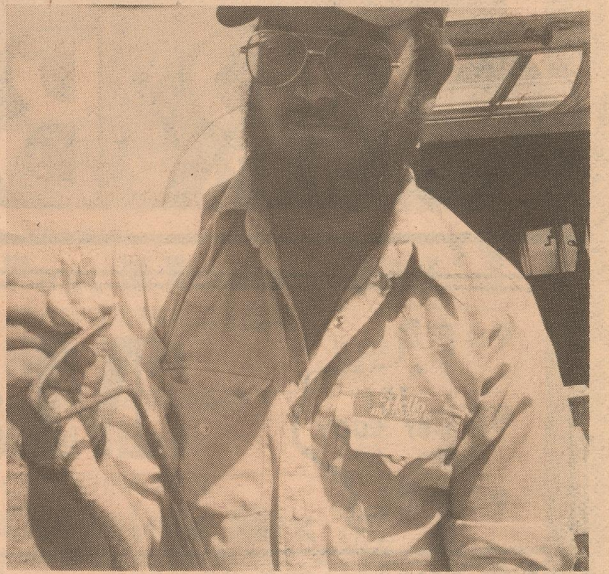
There are 3.7 million dogs in Texas, yet only 1.25 million rabies vaccinations are given annually by Texas veterinarians, Armstrong points out. A 70 percent vaccination level is considered the minimum necessary for rabies control.

During the first four months of 1979, laboratory confirmed cases through the Texas Department of Health totalled 370, compared to 183 confirmed lab cases for the corresponding period in 1978, representing an increase of over 100 percent.

"Of the 370 cases this year, 139 of them were confirmed

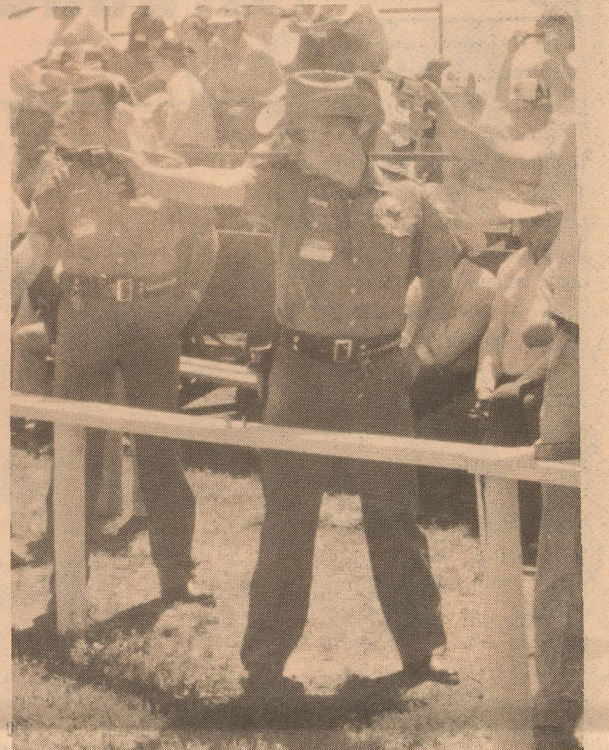
in April alone. About 80 percent of all confirmed cases have been in skunks, and the Department of Health has announced that 46.2 percent of all skunks examined have been positive," notes Armstrong.

Cases confirmed through the laboratory during the first three weeks of April include: Skunks, 108; foxes, 2; bats, 4; raccoons, 2; cats, 1; dogs, 6; horses, 2; and cattle, 7. Although the two horses were confirmed in Brazos County, they were brought here for testing from the Houston and Hempstead areas, the lab report indicated.

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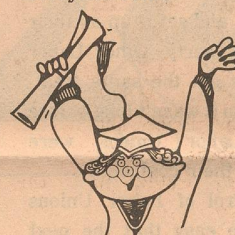

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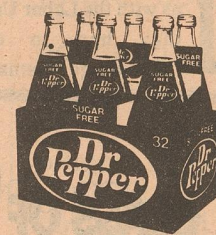

forces." Tower stated. On the issue of verification, Tower pointed out that the Administration has already acknowledged the loss of listening posts in Iran has made the SALT treaty difficult to verify, at least in the early part of the treaty period. He added, however, that the treaty might not be verifiable even with the Iranian intelligence bases. Tower expressed the belief the Senate, in its debate on ratification, would evaluate the treaty in the broader context of overall U.S. - Soviet relations rather than simply an examination of its technical provisions. "The Soviet Union has continued its massive mili-

tary buildup and third-world adventurism despite such unilateral U.S. initiatives as cancellation of the B-1 bomber, delayed production of the Neutron warhead, and termination of the Minuteman III missile production. In addition there is serious concern about restrictions the treaty places on the transfer of technology to out NATO allies, as well as their concern that the protocol limitations on U.S. theater nuclear systems such as ground and sea-launched cruise missiles will be continued. NATO allies, according to Tower, are also concerned over the Soviet SS-20 missile which is not included in the treaty.

County Agent Says

 If you want to make money (for the seller) be sure to buy one of the many "magic cures" that are being offered, no matter if your crop be cotton, peanuts, wheat, sorghum or beef cattle. Here are some of the "come on's" you may be given:
 Sugar solutions to spray on

cotton.
 A soil conditioner, 2 to 4 gallons per acre will result in easier tillage, deeper water penetration, etc. . . .
 Electronic treatment of planting seed to increase germination and yield.
 A trace mineral, 1 gallon per 30 acres.
 Liquid lime, applied at a few gallons per acre to

correct soil acidity.
 A 21-17-17 concentrated fertilizer, applied 5 pounds per 25 acres in 1 to 30 gallons of water to the soil, or 5 lbs. to 50 acres in 1 to 10 gallons of water as a foliar spray to every kind of crop.
 They will say there is no need to check with your County Agent on this, as they either don't know about this product, or won't recommend it because "the big companies pay them a lot to carry out research on their products". All I would like to add to this, is do what you wish, as it is your money, but why not let your neighbor try it first?

PECANS SPRAYS NEEDED
 Now is the time to control the pecan nut casebearer, says County Agent Bill Pallmeyer.
 Get this costly pecan pest before eggs hatch and worms get inside pecans. Watch for eggs on tips of pecans, and once you see these eggs, spray within four to five days, as worms must be killed before they enter the pecans.
 Malathion, Sevin, Guthion, Zolone or Toxaphene may be used. (Be sure to follow instructions on label.) Wet trees to the point where the spray starts to run off trees, and a second application

may be needed 7 to 10 days later.
 Pecans also need zinc to insure good foliage which is necessary for top production. Two types of zinc may be used, zinc sulfate or NZN. Be sure to follow instructions on the label, for if the solution is too strong, leaves will be burned, and if not enough zinc is added, the tree doesn't receive enough food.
 Zinc chelates or tree injectors have been tried, but have not been found to be an effective source of zinc for pecans in Texas. Zinc applied to the soil is not effective because of the high alkaline soils in most of the state which make soil zinc unavailable to plants.
 Pecan tree owners should obtain a copy of "Homeowners Fruit & Nut Spray Schedule", L-1140, as in the case of the casebearer, one application of zinc a year is not enough for most trees. This guide gives a complete spray schedule.
