## Roaring Springs Ranch Club Now Open For Memberships

calls wild life, birds and humans in to enjoy the most peaceful recreation area in the great Foothill Country. It's the Roaring Springs Ranch, and artifacts show it has been used by humans as a recreation site for cen-
turies. The Wichitas and the turies. The Wichitas and the
Commanches camped and hunted here. The buffalo hunted here, The buffalo
hunters moved in and stayed until the big game was gone and then ranchers came. Hydrological studies done on the water show the
mineral content and the mineral content and the
temperature doesn't match the water normally found in this area. There are indications that the water comes
from New Mexico, surfaces from New Mexico, surfaces
here and then again in South here and then again in South
Texas. More than one million gallons of water each
day flows from the underday flows from the under-
ground spring and down the ground spring and down the
rocks, then eastward down the South Pease River. The Ranch is now owned by developer Jerrell Jennings, who has turned it into
a private ranch club. With the help of ecology planners and assistance from Texas Tech University, Jennings said they were designing the springs to be forever as springs to be foreve
