GLITTERING GENERALITIES: accept without investigation) nothing really said but said in a way it seems glamorous, etc.

APPROACH-AVOIDANCE: trade with Red China to keep them from harming us or do what dad says to avoid spanking

APPROACH-APPROACH buy a pretty car that saves fuel

UNDEFINED TERMS: WORDS USED are not known like "hear" in the Bible, unknown language, or "Do you remember where...?"

ABSTRACTIONS: terms which have merely emotional value and are indicated by frame of reference like, church (building, tradition or what?) or like liberate, truth which involve fruitless arguments

GENERALIZATION: like Darwinism bases on logic and examination of evidence and not fact

The Motley Girls took second place at the Class B State Track Meet in Austin last week end. The team came home with first place in two events, second in one event and fourth in one event.

Compiling a total of 46 points the Motley County Girls placed 2nd in Team totals in Conference Class B on May 5.

The 400 Meter Relay placed 1st with a time of 49.6

(Ann Moore, Sharlene Smith, Gwen Calvert and Glouris Sims) followed by Lometa for second and Valley placing third.

Sharlene Smith captured the 100 yard dash for Motley County by running a 11.1 for first place. Last year Sharlene finished the 100 yard dash in third place. In the 200 Meter dash Sharlene Smith placed 2nd with a time of 25.1 running two tenths faster than she did at

Regional.

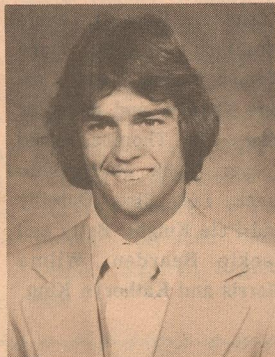

County Health Care Discussed At Meeting

With the bitter taste of recent failures to keep the hospital open still in the mouths of county residents, local officials may be on the track of a sweeter way to provide the county with primary health care.

It could be in the form of a clinic, staffed with local nurses-aid and lab technician, and a nurse practitioner who could deal with 80 per cent of the medical cases of the county, such as sore throats, cuts, simple fractures and the stabilization of emergency cases so they could be transferred to an area hospital.

Ronald Warner, president of South Plains Health Systems, Inc. in Lubbock, and Mike Webb, director of planning, met Monday evening with Motley County commissioners and Motley County Hospital District board members to discuss

some alternatives to bring medical care to the county.

In discussing other avenues of medical facilities, Warner proposed that the local officials focus first on the present hospital, and the \$270,000 debt against it. While he didn't rule out the possibilities of turning the hospital into a Level Three nursing home, he did state that the outlook was not good for it to be a prosperous working nursing home.

His main proposal to the group was to get out from under the current hospital obligation (by selling it if possible) then opening the Traweek Clinic as a working clinic with an advance trained nurse practitioner, nurses aid-receptionist, and a lab technician on the staff and an area doctor visiting the clinic at least once a week.

"This will not be a first-aid

station, nor a free clinic"

Warner said. "These would be specially skilled people who are trained in life-support systems. A doctor would be at the clinic one or more days a week to see patients, and once the local residents learned to patronize the clinic the doctors would likely be here more days."

Warner said in addition to being a medical center the facilities could be a clinic for family planning, public health, mental health, drugs and alcohol.

"To convince the people that the primary care center would be good for Matador and Motley County you need to get the community, businessmen, churches and civic clubs behind it," he said.

The local men agreed that there were many children in the county who had to be

taken to other counties for frequent allergy shots and other primary care, plus cuts and check-ups. With the nurse practitioner on hand to handle the cases, local residents would be saved miles of travel and hours of time.

Warner suggested local officials contact South Plains Health Providers in Plainview to see if a practitioner can be provided. A doctor from Floydada or Plainview would see patients all day one or more days a week. The aid-receptionist, who would also take care of medical records, and the lab man would be hired locally.

The main question of the night was how to get health care to Motley County. After the meeting, local officials feel they are a step closer for new ideas, and maybe an answer.

Association Formed For Baseball

Parents and other citizens met Thursday, May 3, to form the "Motley County Youth Organization" in order to promote and organize a summer league baseball program for the Motley County youngsters in the first grade through the eighth grade of the current school year.

This year's program will be divided into two age categories with three teams in each of the two age divisions. These divisions

will be (1) first grade through the fourth grade; and (2) fifth grade through the eighth grade. Official slow pitch softball rules, along with the adopted local ground rules will be in effect at each game.

Regular season games will be scheduled and at the end of the regular season, a Championship Playoff tournament will be held in a one week period to determine the actual Champion- See Baseball Page Four

Attention Cotton Farmers

Immediate action by producers is required if there is to be an IN SEASON COTTON INSECT MANAGEMENT program.

On May 1st, only 10 percent of the producers had

placed their deposit of 40c an acre for operation of this program, and for the program to become a reality, 60 percent participation is required. If Motley County producers want this program which consists of delayed planting of May 20th or later, scouting of fields during the growing season and recommendations made upon insect findings and the growth condition of the crop, immediate action must be taken by those who are waiting to see if the program goes over.

Deposits must be received at Lee's Feed & Seed, Roaring Springs, The First State Bank, Matador, The County Agents Office, Matador, Caprock Gin, Flomot, or the Farmers Co-Op. Gin, Flomot, no later than Monday, May 14th.

County Agent Bill Pallmeyer states that no checks

will be cashed until it is determined if the program has sufficient backing for operation. Participation in Motley, Hall, Briscoe, Floyd, Dickens, Kent, Crosby and Garza Counties will

determine if only one Entomologist is located at Dickens if one will be located at Dickens and one at Matador. Producer funds will be used for scout expenses Only.

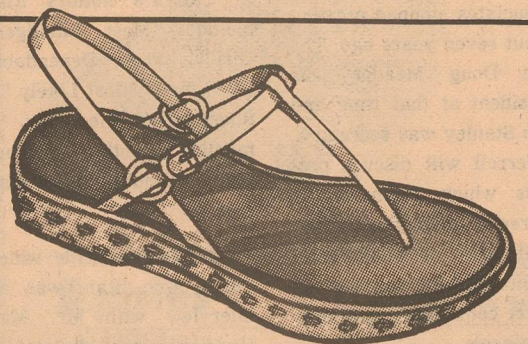

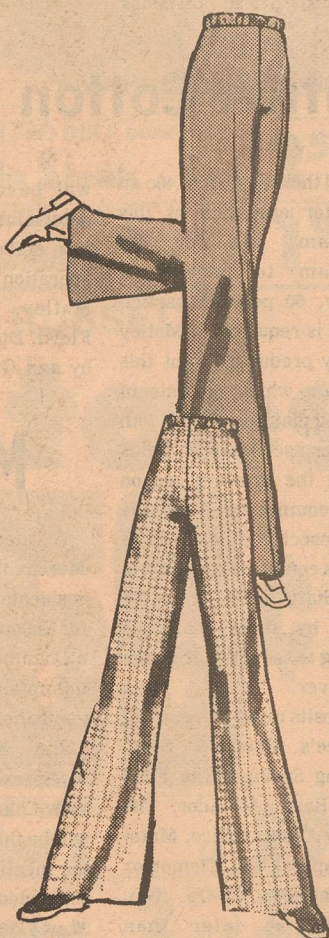

1. Be sure to water the lawn properly. Water the seed well as soon as it is planted and make sure you keep the topsoil moist until seeds begin to germinate. Excessive watering can cause lawn diseases.

Miss Carpenter and Fred Robinson were married at Post where she had moved to obtain work in the Post Textile Mill.

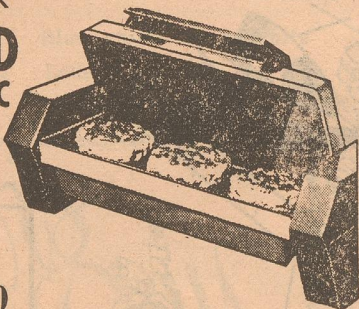

However, the trip to the next million appears to be much shorter as it has taken less than six years to install

another half a million, and projections on company growth indicate the 2nd millionth telephone will be installed by late 1982.

General Telephone serves over 400 exchanges made up of over 990 communities with over 2.2 million in population in 59,000 square miles of area in Arkansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas. Size of exchanges range from 51 telephones in Fowlerton to 85,391 in Garland in the Dallas Metroplex.
