County Health Care Discussed At Meeting

With the bitter taste of recent failures to keep the hospital open still in the mouths of county residents, local officials may be on the track of a sweeter way to provide the county with primary health care.

It could be in the form of a clinic, staffed with local nurses-aid and lab technician, and a nurse practioner who could deal with 80 per cent of the medical cases of the county, such as sore throats, cuts, simple fractures and the stablization of emergency cases so they could be transferred to an area hospital.

Ronald Warner, president of South Plains Health Systems, Inc. in Lubbock, and Mike Webb, director of planning, met Monday evening with Motley County commissioners and Motley County Hospital District board members to discuss

some alternatives to bring medical care to the county.

In discussing other avenues of medical facilities, Warner proposed that the local officials focus first on the present hospital, and the \$270,000 debt against it. While he didn't rule out the possibilities of turning the hospital into a Level Three nursing home, he did state that the outlook was not good for it to be a prosperous working nursing home.

His main proposal to the group was to get out from under the current hospital obligation (by selling it if possible) then opening the Traweek Clinic as a working clinic with an advance trained nurse practitioner. nurses aid-receptionist, and a lab technition on the staff and an area doctor visiting the clinic at least once a

"This will not be a first-aid

station, nor a free clinic" Warner said. "These would be specially skilled people who are trained in lifesupport systems. A doctor more days a week to see patients, and once the local residents learned to patro-time. nize the clinic the doctors would likely be here more

Warner said in addition to being a medical center the facilities could be a clinic for family planning, public Floydada or Plainview health, mental health, drugs and alcohol.

"To convince the people that the primary care center would be good for Matador and Motley County you need to get the community, businessmen, churches and civic clubs behind it," he

The local men agreed that there were many children in the county who had to be



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

This is the advice of the Beltone Crusade for Hearing Conservation, a public service effort sponsored by Chicago-based Beltone Electronics Corporation, world leader in hearing aids and electronic hearing test instruments.

While it would be unusual today to find an employer who would totally reject a job applicant because the person has a hearing problem, some firms still believe hard of hearing job seekers must be carefully "placed". Such a belief is a fallacy.

While some employers feel a hearing aid user would be suitable for a production-type job, but not qualified for a sales position, other employers express directly opposite opinions. They would not hesitate to "place" the person on the sales force, but not in

a production-type job.
While persons with unalleviated hearing problems obviously should not be located in a job where the hearing impairment could create a safety hazard, it is a simple matter to place these people in jobs where such hazards are not encountered.

Additionally, for the vast majority of the hard of hearing job safety is not an important problem. Most work related accidents occur because persons do something contrary to instructions. The hearing impaired generally have learned the value of self-discipline and the importance of following specific instructions
