April Sales Tax Rebates total \$170.7 million

(Austin) — Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander recently delivered a total of \$170.7 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,094 Texas cities and 118 counties, a 7.5 percent increase over the \$158.7 million allocated to cities and counties in April 1998.

Year-to-date, rebates to cities and counties are up 7.4 percent over the first four months of 1998.

This month's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in February and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in March.

"April sales tax rebates reflect that the Texas economy continues to expand, but at a more moderate pace than we saw a year ago," Rylander said.

Rylander delivered monthly sales tax rebates totaling \$156.8 million to Texas, 7.7 percent higher than last April's payments of \$145.5 million. Rebates of \$139.9 million to Texas counties were 5 percent higher than allocations of \$13.2 million in April 1998. Another \$5 million went to 38 special purpose districts around the state.

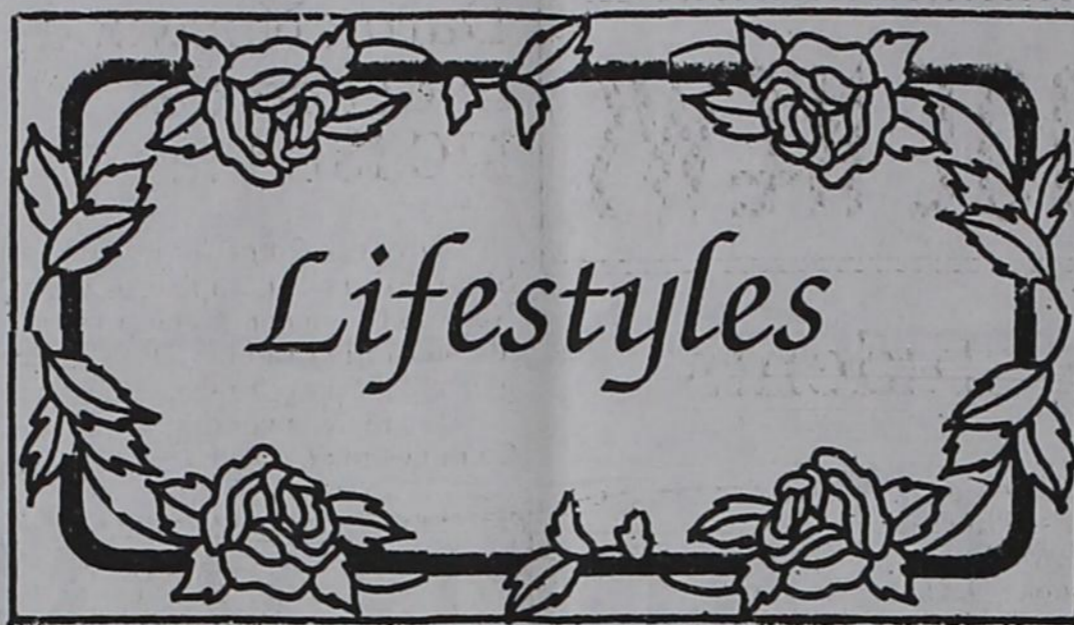

El Progreso club members hear Wyman Meinzer program

Mr. Meinzer photographed the moving of the buffalo herd from the famous J.A. Ranch to the Caprock Canyon State Park near Quitaque. He showed slides he made of the operation. He gave a detailed discourse on all aspects of the undertaking of an unusual job, due to the reaction of the buffalo.

Colonel Charles Goodnight established the J.A. ranch and entered Palo Duro Canyon on October 23, 1876 with the first herd of cattle. He was very interested in preserving the purebred buffalo, a fascination and concern all his life. The remaining pure buffalo on the J.A. Ranch were awarded to the Caprock Canyons State Park and were moved there.

Mr. Meinzer is a well informed, talented and dexterous young man, who held his audience spellbound, making them feel as though they were in attendance. The photographs

made into slides were breathtaking with beautiful scenes of West Texas and of the moving of the buffalo. They were colorful and near perfection.

Loys Campbell, club president, presided over a business meeting following the program. Many segments were discussed, plans were made for the Spring Convention to be held at Burkburnett on April 10.

Mr. Meinzer gave the inspirational thought for the day. A quotation from his latest publication, "Sky".

Floydada Rehab and Care Center to Sponsor DNA Testing for Alzheimers and Other Related Diseases

Blood samples for the Texas Tech Alzheimer's DNA Research Bank will be collected for the Floydada area on Monday, May 3, in the Floydada Rehabilitation and Care Center at 925 West Crockett, Floydada, Texas. The event is in cooperation with the laboratory staff of Shirley E. Poduslo, Ph.D., of the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center in Lubbock. No fee is charged for participation.

Persons interested in participating should call Paul Walker, Director of Social Services, or Kiki Wilcox, Administrator, at 806-983-3704 for an appointment. Family History forms may be obtained before the sampling date in order to give family members more time for consideration of facts which will be helpful. For the genetics study two tubes of blood are drawn from patients and members of their families. Research is being conducted to determine which gene or genes may cause Alzheimers disease.

This is NOT a test for Alzheimer disease. Participating families will receive quarterly newsletters on the overall research being conducted. There will not be an individual report on the possibility of having Alzheimers disease.

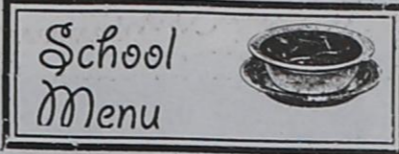
a 95% passing rate in the writing section. We are extremely proud of these students and their success and of the staff and teachers that helped our students achieve this goal.

Farm Bureau offers Future Hedging Workshops

Today's farmers and ranchers face unprecedented risks as they strive to produce food and fiber for our country and the world. Low market prices, increasing costs, and unpredictable weather patterns have increased the financial risk producers endure.

To help producers offset uncertainties and understand how to take advantage of the market opportunities, Texas Farm Bureau is offering a program to help manage risk exposure. The "Futures Hedging Workshop" offers basic and intermediate education of futures market hedging, options trading and other risk management techniques.

Purpose of the Futures Hedging

Workshop: To teach agriculture producers how to be more successful at marketing their commodities through a hedging program utilizing futures and options.

During the 1-1/2 hour workshop participants will be exposed to:

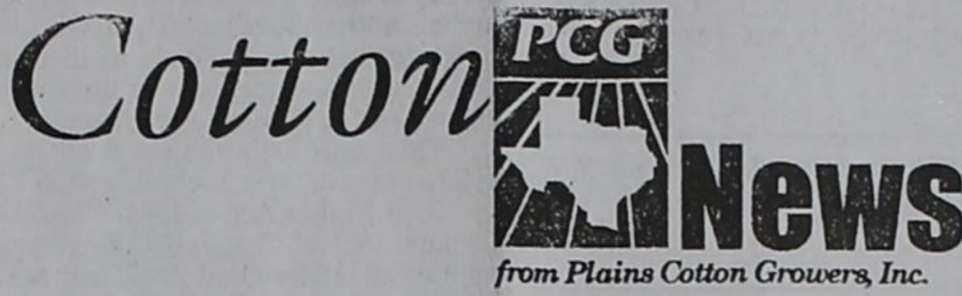
- Exchange Requirements
- Technical Analysis

PCG WORKING TO REFORM CROP INSURANCE

With a lot of road yet to be traveled, Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. (PCG) continues to advance its thoughts and concerns about crop insurance to fellow industry members and to the legislators that will eventually put forth a reform plan.

PCG has worked on crop insurance issues for many years. What appears to be different this time is the emphasis placed on improving the overall performance of the agricultural safety net following 1998's adverse weather and price situation. Both House Agriculture Committee Chairman Larry Combest and Ranking Committee Member Charles Stenholm have commented on the lack of protection afforded by current insurance products and have called for an overhaul of the system.

PCG officials have been working to develop a crop insurance priority list that includes changes producers feel are necessary to make insurance a viable risk management tool.

PCG representatives traveled to the American Cotton Producers (ACP) meeting in Dallas this week to discuss crop insurance and other important cotton related issues. ACP is the producer arm of the National Cotton Council.

The week of April 26 will find PCG representatives and members of the Texas Cotton Producers organization in Washington, DC visiting about crop insurance issues with members of the House Agriculture Committee staff, USDA and the National Cotton Council.

Key concepts being communicated by PCG at this time include:

1. The importance of providing yield coverage levels that track producer expenses during the growing season so they have opportunity to recoup production costs through the time a loss occurs.

2. Provision for a harvest incentive that encourages producers to produce.

3. And, the need for programs that protect against price fluctuations beyond the control of individual producers.

PCG will continue to "put meat on the bones" of crop insurance reform as the process moves forward and communicate the latest developments to producers.

AGREEMENT TO AID FUTURE U.S./ CHINA TRADE

Signing of an agreement between China and the United States on agricultural trade issues could mean positive changes are on the horizon for cotton exports.

The agreement, signed April 10, is part of the effort by China to gain membership in the World Trade Organization and should significantly open Chinese markets to U.S. agricultural goods.

For cotton it means the establishment of Tariff-Rate Quotas (TRQ) which will allow cotton imports up to the quota level to be charged a minimal tariff (1% for cotton). For cotton this means that up to 3.4 million bales of cotton a year, growing to 4.1 million bales in 2004, would qualify for the minimal TRQ rate.

Under the agreement 67 percent of the imports would be available to private sector in China and 33 percent would be available to the state-run textile business, Chinatex.
