

The Tribune Becomes Of Age

Monday was an ordinary day in Matador. It was unusually hot for March 14, some sand was in the air and people were hoping for rain. The weather was several degrees cooler on March 14, 1934. A lot of sand has passed between the sky and Matador in 21 years and some water has passed under Ballard Creek bridge. The Tribune acquired the Motley County News from Grover C. Mitchell on a Wednesday afternoon, March 14. 1934 (no equipment-just the name, goodwill, advertising contracts and subscription list). At that time the Tribune was owned by Howard Hamilton and the present publisher, Douglas Meador. The newspaper was being published on an old two-page Taylor press in the Crews building (Kansler building, since torn down, on the south side of the square).

Actually the Matador Tribune was first published by the Floyd County Hesperian in Floydada. Meador started the newspaper with no more equipment than a pencil and paper The year was 1931 (about October). Without any equipment, legal status, mailing permit, national advertising or money the newspaper failed after seven issues. In October the following year Meador became editor and publisher of the Roaring Springs News, owned by M. S. Thacker. For over a year the handset newspaper was printed in a sheetiron building (still in use). In late November, 1933 the Roaring Springs was moved to Matador, and the name changed to the Matador Tribune and Howard Hamilton acquired half interest in the business. After acquiring the Motley County News the new partnership went into debt approximately \$8,000 in the purchase of a new Linotype machine, the purchase of a Babcock press and moving to the Masonic building (home of the Tribune for 19 years). It is easy to remember 1934. It was a year of drouth, Sc cotton, 25c wheat and the government bought cattle at \$12 per head and shot them. The Tribune could not pay the interest on its indebtedness. The following March, Hamilton sold his interest in the obligation to his partner. The day of that transaction was not a bright one. Highway 70 was not paved at the time and a sandstorm was blowing out of the west, which made it impossible at times to see the Matador Auto Company across the street. Soaking rains fell about 30 days

There it is, a thumbnail sketch of this newspaper's history. One thousand and ninety two weekly issues later the Tribune is still being operated under the same management. The years between the two dates have been filled with many problems. disappointments, many worries and many wonderful hours. The Tribune's subscription list has grown to 1,485, altho Motley county's population shrunk from approximately 7,000, in 1934 to less than an estimated 3,500 at present.

The Tribune has acquired some physical assets in a fifth of century, but its wealth is an intangible asset - its friends. Through wars, drouth, depression and a change in political administration, its friends have remained loval. In return the Tribune has attempted always to be impartial (frequently in error) but always sincere. Its first concern has always been Matador and Motley county and the welfare of the people. It believes emphatically in the land and the people of Motley county, and that despite the drouth and the predictions of some with lesser faith, the future is brighter than at any time in the county's history. The Tribune is aware that many changes are taking place and that the economy and standards of the nation and the entire world are undergoing transition. The shift in population is but one of the changes evident in

The Tribune is proud to have had part in the development of Motley county for 21 years. It is grateful for the opportunity to serve in the capacity that is the responsibility of a progressive journal. To its friends, its readers, and patrons it tenders sincere appreciation for the years of faith


