**Blood Pressure** Is Indication Of **Numerous Diseases** 

AUSTIN-Blood pressurewhat does it mean?

Nothing more, says State Health Officer Henry A. Holle during this annual observance of heart disease control, than a measure of pressure against artery walls as blood courses through the body.

Everyone's blood pressure, according to the explanation, in highest when the heart pumps : fresh load of blood into elastic walled arteries, and lowest when the heart pauses between beats for refilling. The high level is systolic, the lowest is diastolic pressure.

Physicians measure blood pressure by wrapping an inflatable rubber cuff around the patient's arm. When air is pumped into the cuff a column of mercury is forced into a glass tube. The

height to which it climbs indicates the pressure inside the cuff and the compression brought against blood vessels in

the arm Then, using a stethescope, the physician determines systolie pressure by listening to the sound produced by blood flowing through the artery when the pressure in it is just above that physician.




