was made is owned by Walker Williams of Matador, one of the students in the group. The picture is old Dutchman school near the present town of Roaring Springs and was made in 1895. It was not the first school in the county but was among the first. Mr. Williams said the teacher's salary was between \$30 and \$40 per month and that he boarded with families of his students. The half dugout was so dark it was almost impossible to see for sometime after entering Mr. Williams declared. Part of the dirt roof of the structure is visible in the picture. 

# SOUTHERN FUDGE SOUARES

1/2 cup shortening 1 square unsweetened chocolate, melted 1 cop sifted all-purpose flour 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup KARO Syrup, Blue Label Vi toespoon salt i toospoon baking sode legy, beaten 3/4 cup sour milk 1 teaspoon vanilla

Cream shortening, gradually add sugar and beat until light and fluffy. Add KARO, beat well Add egg, vanils and melted chocolate.
