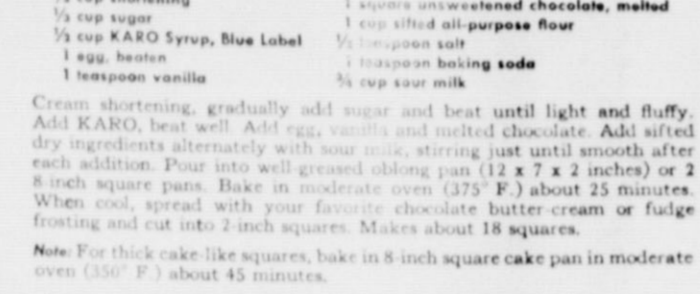

SOUTHERN FUDGE SQUARES

1/2 cup shortening	1 square unsweetened chocolate, melted
1/2 cup sugar	1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1/2 cup KARO Syrup, Blue Label	1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg, beaten	1 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon vanilla	1/2 cup sour milk

Cream shortening, gradually add sugar and beat until light and fluffy. Add KARO, beat well. Add egg, vanilla and melted chocolate. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with sour milk, stirring just until smooth after each addition. Pour into well-greased oblong pan (12 x 7 x 2 inches) or 2 8-inch square pans. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) about 25 minutes. When cool, spread with your favorite chocolate butter-cream or fudge frosting and cut into 2-inch squares. Makes about 18 squares.

Note: For thick cake-like squares, bake in 8-inch square cake pan in moderate oven (350° F.) about 45 minutes.

Pruning Of Trees Advised In March

Pruning often stimulates tree growth—especially winter pruning, according to County Agent Bill Palmeyer, who said pruning should not be later than March.

If pruning is done now, spring growth soon will hide cuts. Plan carefully and prune moderately, suggests Palmeyer. Severe pruning or "de-horning" can permanently deform and injure the trees.

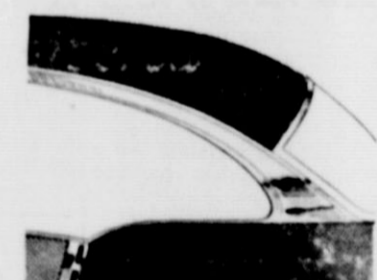

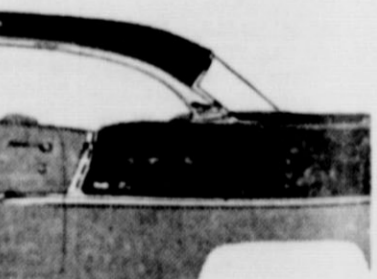

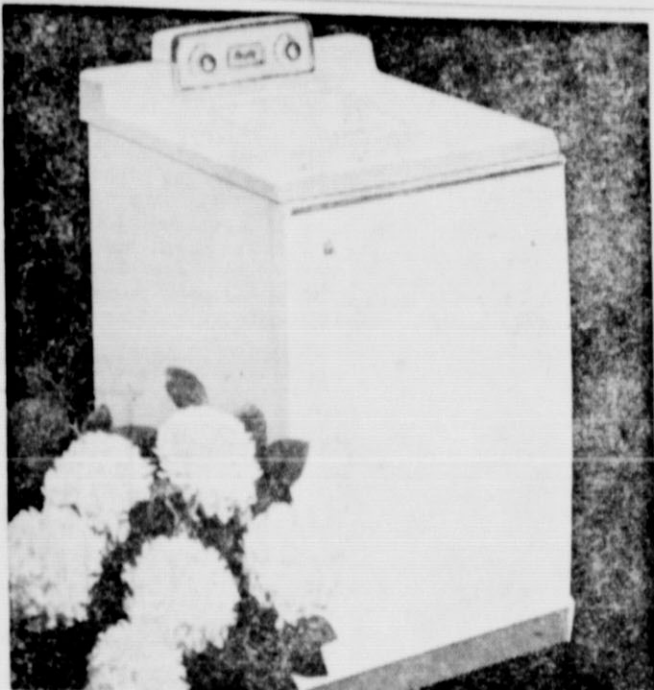

neys said. Judge Woodward told the tiny blond defendant "It's a heartbreaking thing to see a girl your age in here for murder... we can understand the conflicts that went on in your life when you were being snuffed around from relative to relative... but the fact remains that you killed somebody," he said. Her lawyers had based her defense on an insanity plea... "there is no doubt in our minds you were legally sane."

"The judge told the small prisoner that punishment was not the sentence's principal aim. Instead the court hopes for her rehabilitation, to give her a chance to get hate out of her heart."

Appearance Of Child
A reporter on the Washington Post (issue of Feb. 26) wrote of Marion's appearance at her trial. "Mrs. Moseley, still looking about nine years old even though dressed in a sweater and skirt outfit and wearing a trace of lipstick, showed practically no emotion when she testified she had no intention of killing

her half sister..."

Another article in the Washington Post said: "Three witnesses, a church pastor about to baptize her, a Texas judge who at one time planned to adopt her and her father, William Bannister, testified in her behalf."

The Rev. Ralph Webster Neighbour, pastor of the Montrose Baptist Church, Rockville, said that six weeks before the murder, Marion came to his church "to commit her life to Christ."

Wanted To Help
In his office here Monday Judge Gilbreath said: "I know it is a news story but Mrs. Gilbreath and myself prefer that little or nothing be said about my testimony. I actually don't know what effect it had on the sentence. I do know that I wanted to help her—and that I tried. I believe this is a crime for which society is more to blame than the one convicted. Marion is still to me just a little girl."

Judge Gilbreath returned home late Sunday from Wichita Falls. The group of Farmers Union delegates went to Washington in defense of a continued support price on grain sorghums.

Higher Profits From Certified Planting Seed

Guaranteed purity, higher germination and boosted crop yields await farmers who buy and plant certified seed this year. Germination and yields of course are dependent upon the available moisture, but farmers can't afford to gamble with seed of questionable quality, says Bill Palmeyer, county agent.

Certified seed usually are the best seed of a particular variety available. This seed with a "blue tag" comes from fields that have been inspected during the growing season, properly handled at harvest, cleaned and tested for purity and germination. Only after the seed has passed certain rigid standards does the State Department of Agriculture issue a blue "certified" tag for each bag.

Certified seed may cost slightly more, but the added cost is good insurance, Palmeyer says. He advises farmers to buy now planting seed for this year's crops. Seed supplies generally adequate but last minute shoppers may find local stocks depleted and forced to plant whatever seed is available.

If the planting seed has not been chemically treated for seed-borne and seedling diseases farmers find this practice profitable and added insurance against poor stands and plant losses during early growth.


