

## Matadors upset in district opener

After putting up a good fight, the Motley County Matadors lost their district opening game to the Valley Patriots, 21-7.

The first quarter saw the Matadors take the lead on a one yard run by Benjamin Ridgley. Dayton Grundy kicked the point after and Motley County led 7-0 after one quarter. Valley came back to score in the second stanza as Nathan Wheeler scored Valley's first points of the night. Cory Chandler kicked the PAT and the halftime score was tied 7-7. Valley scored 2 times in the second half, another TD by Wheeler and one by Chandler, who kicked both PAT's and the game ended

with Valley on top 21-7.
Motley County was led on offense by Ysef Alvarado who had 11 carries for 76 yards; Jermaine Hendrix, 11 carries for 10 yards; and Benjamin Ridgley, 8 carries for 11 yards. Ty Barclay caught 3 passes for 26 yards. Total offense for the night Motley County was 122 yards.

I am so thankful that I bought this history. I believe there aren't any more for sale.



## Thornberry backs \$4 billion disaster relief plan

WASHINGTON,D.C--U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry (TX-13) voted Oct. 2, for a disaster relief plan that will provide farmers and ranchers with more than \$4 billion dollars in federal assistance to help them cope with the drought and low commodity

"In the time we introduced this plan two weeks ago," Thornberry stated," I've heard from a lot of producers who had thoughts and concerns about various components of the package. For example, a number of folks expressed concern that the \$75 million for livestock feed assistance wasn't going to be enough. I agreed with them, and we were fortunately able to add additional \$100 million in this area to the bill.

"When you combine this relief plan with the tax bill the House passed last Saturday, I think you're talking about a very solid package that will provide producers with assistance both in the short-term and the long-

The disaster relief plan was approved as part of the agriculture appropriations bill for 1999, which passed the House of Representatives this afternoon by a vote of 333-53. According to Thornberry, the bill contains several key provisions which will benefit farmers and ranchers. These provisions include:

\*\$1.5 billion for payments to farmers for natural disaster losses. \*\$1.65 billion for loss markets

Thornberry noted that the tax bill passed last weekend by the House also included a number of producerfriendly provisions, including: expanding the health insurance deduction for self-employed individuals to 100 percent; making income averaging for farmers permanent; increasing the net operating loss carry-back period for farmers; providing an immediate \$25,000 per small business expense deduction; and providing and immediate increase in the inheritance tax exemption to \$1 million dollars.

Thornberry is one of Congress' leading proponents for eliminating the inheritance tax, and is the author of legislation that would do just that.

He spent the past several months working with members of the Agriculture Committee on the disaster plan and other proposals aimed at helping producers cope with current conditions. In June, he authored a resolution calling on the Secretary of Agriculture to provide timely assistance to those affected by the drought. In August, he helped push through a plan which provided producers in the 13th Congressional District with over \$111 million in assistance by giving them the option of receiving their 1999 AMTA payment on October 1.


