

The event will be held at the Senior Citizens building in Matador. Registration will begin at 10 a.m. and a covered dish lunch will be served at



The public hearing on the 1998-99 school budget was held. No one attended.

The 1998-99 School Budget was adopted. The budget was increased \$178,000 due to State mandates, including salary increases of over \$100,000. The 1997-98 budget was \$1,734,673.00. The 1998-99 budget will be \$1,913,246.00.

The tax rate was set at 1.239 for the 1998-99 school year. The tax hearing will be held September 14 at 7:30 p.m. to approve the tax rate.

Bids were approved and awarded for Fleet, Property, and General Liability Insurance to Carson Insurance of Valley.





3 cups all-purpose flour

1 cup sugar

1 Tbsp. baking powder ½ tsp. baking soda

2 large eggs

34 cup milk





GET FIRED UP - The Motley County Maverick Cheerleaders rode on a Roaring Springs VFD fire truck.






MAVERICK TRAIN — The Motley County Jr. High Maverick football team seems to be having a good time as they ride through the Old Settlers Parade.















Senate Bill #2101 was introduced by Senator Robert Bennett. The bill was referred to the Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources for consideration. This legislation accompanies H.R. #1111, introduced last year into the House of Represen-tatives by Congresswoman Carrie Meek, (D) FL. At present time, Senate Bill #2101 has only two co-sponsors, Sen. Richard Shelby, (R) AL, and Senator Carol Moseley-Braun, (D) IL.

Lupus causes the immune system to become hyperactive and attack the body's own tissue and organs. At least 1.4 million Americans, ninety percent of whom are women, are thought to have the disease. The disease is more common among African Americans, Native Americans, Asians and Latinos. Lupus is a wide-spread, devastating and potentially fatal disease.

We do not know what causes lupus, nor do we have treatments that are as effective as we would like. A cure remains elusive. Senate Bill #2101 can help expand the search for a cause and cure for this terrible dis-
