Livestock Show Planned For Monday, March 24

The 40th annual Motley County Livestock Show will be held at the old FFA building in Matador, Monday, March 24th, according to Joe Ike Clay, Chairman of the Motley County Livestock Association, sponsor of the show for 4-H and FFA members under the supervision of local advisors.

Steers, market hogs and market lambs must be weighed and tagged by 9:30 a.m., with weighing starting at 7:30 a.m. Rabbits and heifers must be entered by 9:30 a.m.

Market hogs must weigh 190 to 250 pounds, and can be either barrows or gilts. Steers must weigh 800 pounds or more, and must not have any permanent teeth that show at time of weighing. Sheep must weigh from 80 to 140 pounds and all milk teeth must be intact. An exhibitor may show up to 6 market hogs, 2 market lambs and 2 rabbits. There is no limit on steers.

The heifer classes are open to anyone living in

Motley County, owning land in Motley County, or Jr.'s eligible to show in the Jr. Livestock show. A maximum of 2 heifers, crossbred or straightbred may be shown. They must be from 12 to 18 months of age.

The show starts at 10:00 a.m. and proceeds as follows: Light market hogs, medium market hogs, heavy market hogs, Grand Champion Market Hog, Light lambs, medium lambs, heavy lambs, Grand Champion Market Lamb, Rabbit bucks, rabbit does, Grand Champion Rabbit, Crossbred heifers, straightbred heifers, Grand Champion Heifer.

The steer show starts at 1:30 p.m. and will be shown as follows: Light steers, medium steers, heavy steers, Grand Champion Steer. The following rule applies to steer, lamb and market hog classes. If 15 or more animals are shown, they will be divided into 3 classes; 9 thru 14

animals, 2 classes; 8 animals or less, 1 class. Class will be divided approximately equal depending on weights, but the same weight will not be placed into separate classes to allow the same number in each class. If weights of several animals are the same at the division of classes, all of the same weight will be placed in the lighter weight class.

The sale of the top 6 animals in the market classes will follow selection of the Grand Champion steer. After the floor bids are auctioned, sale premium on animals (Dollars over floor bid) will start. All hogs must sell due to health regulations, but steers or lambs may be withheld from the sale if the exhibitor wishes.

Billy's Grocery, Matador will serve breakfast consisting of pancakes and sausage to those associated with the show from 7:00 to 9:30 a.m. A concession stand will be operated by the Motley County 4-H Clubs from

9:30 to conclusion of the show. Sandwiches and drinks will be available.

Showmanship prizes will be provided by Lee's Feed and Seed, Roaring Springs, and trophies by VFW, American Legion, Ronnie's, Matador Auto Co., Stanley Pharmacy, Motley County Abstract Co., W. E. Burleson Estate, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Cross, Peck and Donna Thompson, Matador; Swifty Distributors and Floydada Seed and Delinting Co., Floydada; and Lubbock Stockyards, Lubbock.

Ribbons, rosettes and extra prize money will be provided by the Motley County Farm Bureau.

Other officers and directors are: Roy Gene Stephens, Vice Chairman; Guy Campbell, Secretary; Ros Bearden, Larry Bynum, and Bill Hand, Directors.

Bill Moss and Jerry L. Cummins are show advisors.

As additional support is pledged for the show, recognition will be given.

Sharlene goes 2nd in the long jump and Cindy placed 3rd.

of 49 ft. 9 1/2 inches. He also got 5th in the discus. Bezell Moore was first in the boys 100 meter with 11.1 seconds and he placed first in the long jump, and 4th in the broad jump.

wedding a beige lace dress printed with dainty pink roses. Beige accessories completed her attire.

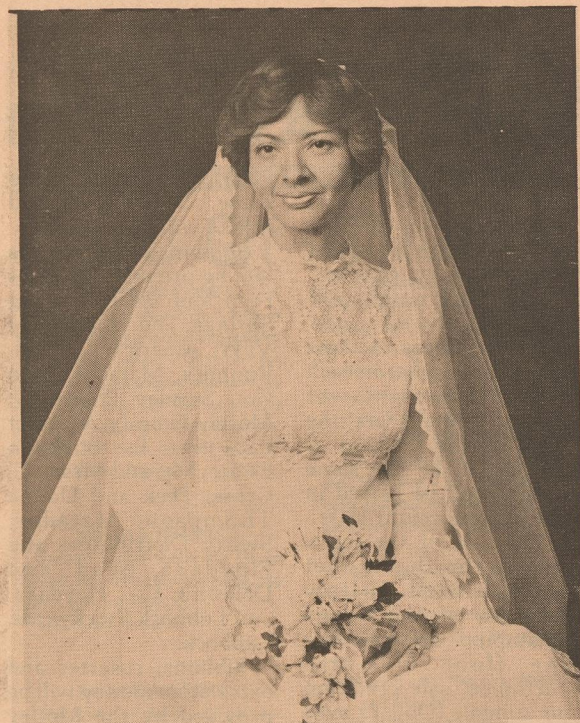
Mrs. Delmont Hays, mother of the bridegroom, of Northfield, chose a screen print dress of shades of mauve.

Thank you so much for printing the article about my Dad's (Bob Martin) accident.
Please find enclosed a card of thanks and check.
You also might like to have some additional information about his condition.

The accident occurred on the afternoon of Feb. 21st while burning grass from around his back door. He was immediately enveloped in flames. He was conveyed to Paducah Hospital and that night transferred to the Baptist Hospital in Amarillo, which was requested by the family.

The second and third degree burns are confined to his right leg and foot. He has been in so much pain, it has only been the last few days that he has been aware of his condition or even to relate the accident.

At this writing the doctor informed us that it will be at least one to two weeks before surgery can be performed. He also says that he has a long convalescence following surgery.

We ask you dear people to please keep the cards and letters coming, they mean the world to him.

His granddaughter, Stephanie Martin, of Amarillo who underwent surgery for scoliosis on the day of the accident is home from the hospital. She is wearing a body cast and is doing so well that it is very likely she will be returning to school in a few weeks.

Program Features Land of Sri Lanka

The ancient land of Sri Lanka, formerly Ceylon, was the subject of a program presented by Mrs. Frank Pohl, Thursday, March 13 at regular meeting of El Progreso Club. The meeting was in the parlor of the First United Methodist Church.

Mrs. Franklin Price, president, opened the meeting with a business session.

"My interest in Sri Lanka was sparked by my brother's working there from June, 1978 until February of this year as a government Irrigation Engineer," Mrs. Pohl said in introduction.

Her brother, George Knierim had engaged in the work for over 20 years, in Nepal, India (two times), in Turkey, Iraq and Afghanistan. During the two years in Sri Lanka, he and his wife resided in Kandy and he drove 14 miles to his work where he was administrator of a half-million dollar project,

directing workers on a 70 acre research farm.

Mrs. Pohl described the country - a small pear-shaped island 20 miles off the Southwest coast of India, the size of West Virginia but having seven and a half times as many people; of its background: Under the British, starting in 1796, in was Ceylon. An independent nation in the British Commonwealth since 1948, it proclaimed itself the Republic of Sri Lanka in 1972; and of its economy: based on three main exports - tea, rubber and coconuts, it is also a land of gems and precious stones such as those that King Solomon had secured to woo the Queen of Sheba.

Mrs. Pohl had maps on display, and scenic pictures of the land. She also displayed the country's flag, which her brother had brought home, and which symbolized the three ethnic groups of the country, Sinhalese, Tamils and Muslims.

Special music for the program was provided by Mrs. W.F. Jacobs, who sang "Far Away Places," and "Around The World," with Mrs. Pohl at the piano.

A tape recording of a festival held at Kandy revealed native singing and the music of the country, composed principally of drums and conch, a large spiral sea shell. The tapes had been mailed to Mrs. Pohl by her sister-in-law.

Inspirational Thought by Miss Rachel Patton, and Roll Call: A place I would like to visit, concluded the interesting program.

DPS Warns Drivers 55 mph Will Be Enforced

"Warning!!! If you are a driver who is violating the 55 MPH speed law, you may be caught and required to appear in court," stated Major C.W. Bell, Commanding Officer of Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Major Bell announced today that an active enforcement program is being directed at the deliberate and determined law violator who seeks to defeat the enforcement efforts of the 55 MPH speed law by employing police scanners, radar detectors and CB radios.

Major Bell said, "Our troopers are going to be aggressive and will work radar in unmarked vehicles as well as black and white." He stated that all legal means available will be used to make the use of the radar unit more effective.

He stated that there are several reasons for this special effort. One reason he gave was the 4,000 plus deaths which occurred on Texas streets and highways last year. He said, "The thought of over 20,000

accidents and over 1,000 deaths involving speeding over the limit last year should be cause for every Texas motorist to slow down and observe the speed limit."

He added, "Another reason, in addition to saving the lives of many Texans, is that many disabling injuries can be prevented. Also, achieving a greater compliance will have a beneficial effect on gasoline conservation."

The Federal Surface Transportation Act of 1978 established national levels of compliance that each state must meet or face sanctions. For instance, had we not met 30 percent compliance with the 55 MPH speed limit by September of 1979 Texas could have lost 8 million dollars. By September of 1980 40 percent of Texas drivers must be in compliance or we will be subject to similar sanctions.

Major Bell said, "We hope that by providing this special effort we can save precious lives, conserve fuel and comply with the 40 percent mandate."

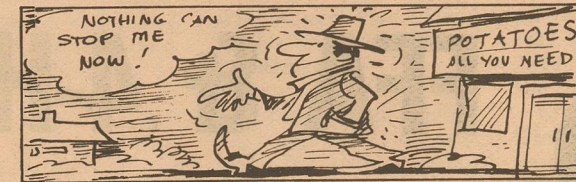

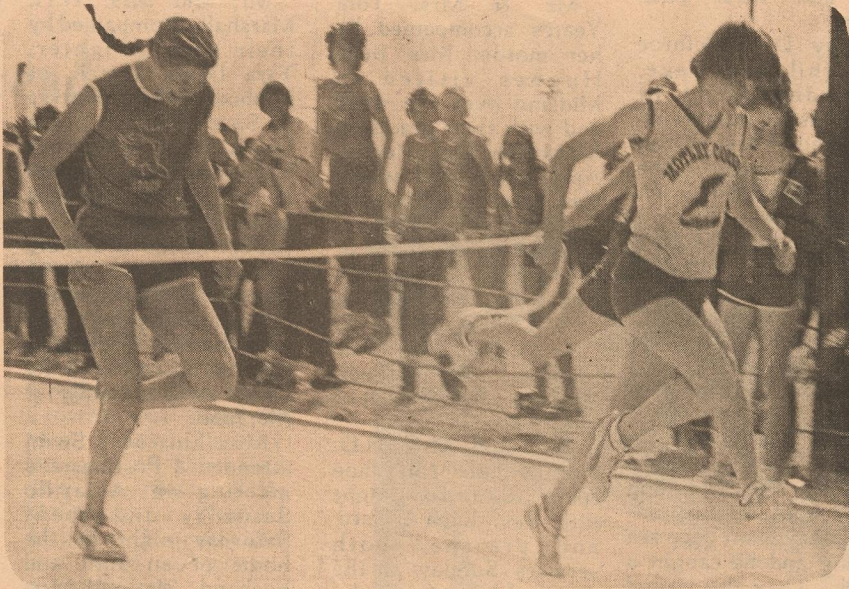

SOUP IS SPLENDID FARE

"Soup of the evening, beautiful soup," reads a line in Alice in Wonderland. People often prefer a simple soup or stew to fancier food, and special favorites need not be reserved for the family. - 2 medium carrots, sliced (2/3 cup)
- 1 package (16 oz.) frozen fish fillets
- 2 cups water
- 1 envelope Good Seasons buttermilk farm style salad dressing mix
- 2 cups milk

Fry bacon in large saucepan until crisp; drain and crumble, reserving 1 tablespoon fat. Sauté onions, potatoes and carrots in bacon fat until tender, about 6 minutes. To prepare vegetables in food processor, chop 2 medium onions, cut in quarters. Change blade and slice 2 medium potatoes, cut in quarters, and 2 medium carrots, cut in chunks.

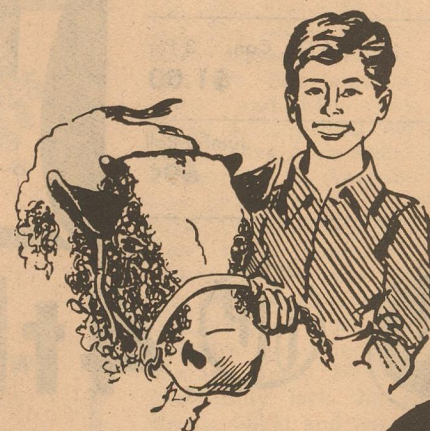

Government To Sell Hurlwood Cotton Gin

The federal government, through the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Fort Worth, Tex., District office, is offering for sale the former Hurlwood, Tex., Cotton Gin complex.

The complex is a 3-unit cotton gin that is presently located in the Hurlwood community immediately south of Reese Air Force Base. This location is about 12-miles west of Lubbock, Tex. on State Highway 114.

The gin complex is located on 10 acres of land that is being purchased for the U.S. Air Force by the Corps of Engineers as part of Reese's Air Installation Compatible Use Zone (AICUZ) program. When the sale of the gin complex buildings is completed and the buildings have been moved, the land upon which the gin complex has been located will be leveled and incorporated into Reese AFB as part of the hazard-free Clear Zone that is called for under the AICUZ plan. Work on developing the land use program that the AICUZ plan recommended began in June 1976.

The gin complex contains three gins and a shop and their associated equipment, two office buildings, a truck pit scale, three residence buildings, five barracks buildings, a barn, and a bath house. All these buildings contain an amount of related personal property and furnishings located within them.

From Feb. 29 through 10 a.m. May 1, 1980, the Corps of Engineers will be open to receive sealed bids for the purchase and removal of all the government-owned property. At that time all bids will be publicly opened at the District office in Ft. Worth.

The complex property is divided into twelve bid items. Bids may be submitted by individuals or corporations on individual items or on the entire complex.

Invitation for bids number DACA 63-80-B-0098 may be obtained from either the Corps of Engineers District Office in Fort Worth or the Civil Engineering Squadron Real Estate Office at Reese AFB. The addresses are: 1. Fort Worth District Office,

The gin complex property is offered for sale "as is" and "where is" and must be removed from its present location within a minimum of 90 days and a maximum of 270 days from the date of notice to proceed with the removal of the purchased property.

After opening the bids, the contract will be awarded to the individual or corporation who submits the bid that is most advantageous to the government when price and other factors are all considered.

FARMSTEAD WINDBREAKS

Now is the time to plan Farmstead Windbreaks. The Soil Conservation Service, located in the County Courthouse in Matador, wants to assist you in protecting and beautifying your farmstead with wind break plantings.

Windbreaks designed for winter protection are planted to the north and west of areas to be protected. Blocking cold winter winds can reduce home heating bills up to ten percent. Windbreaks can help to stop dangerous snow drifting into yards and drives. Windbreaks can also be designed to help protect against spring and summer dust storms by placing plantings on the

south and west sides of areas to be protected. These windbreaks help to keep dust out of the house and drifts from covering yards.

Windbreaks can be used to screen unsightly barns and corrals and also block equipment areas from sight. Tractor and equipment noise, highway and road noise can be filtered out by using windbreak plantings. Song birds and wildlife such as dove and quail can be promoted to help beautify farmsteads by planting certain windbreak materials. Let the Soil Conservation Service help you now with your windbreak plantings.

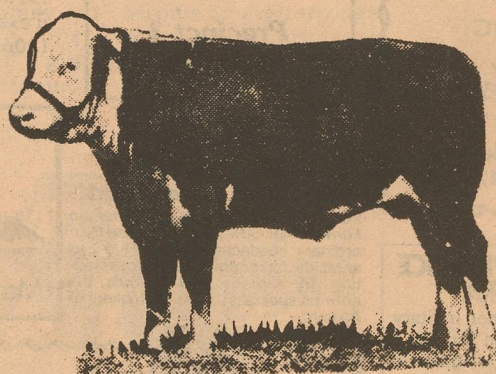

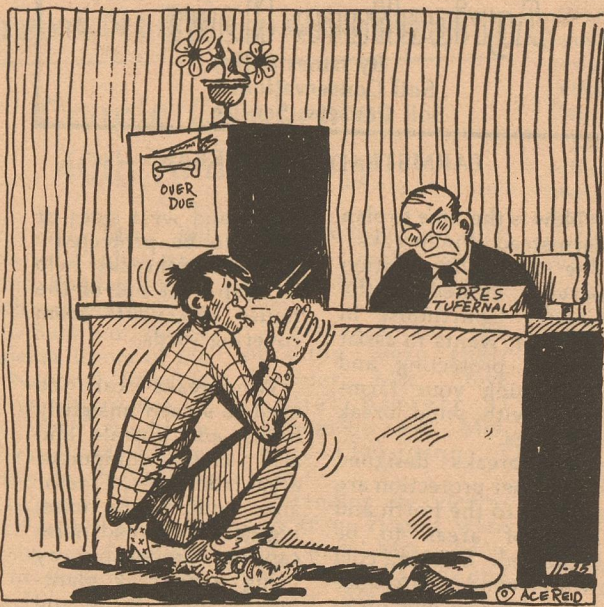

Question: A friend of mine has a 17 year old daughter who is retarded. Could the child get SSI payments on the basis of disability? Answer: If the child is eligible in all other respects, a retarded child under 18 (or under 21 attending school) is considered disabled for SSI purposes and may be eligible for payments if his or her IQ is 59 or less. A slightly different definition applies to older retarded persons. A retarded child with a higher IQ also may be considered disabled, depending on whether the child has a physical or other mental impairment and the degree to which the child depends on others, or the child's ability to achieve developmental milestones.
