# Injuries

Robert Henry Hargett, 47, died at 8:15 a.m. Thursday, June 19, in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. He had received head injuries during a scuffle that followed a fatal shooting incident on June 7. Hargett had apparently been beaten about the head with a shotgun an individual alledgedly known as Butch Cassidy from New Mexico following the shooting at a farm home near Muleshoe.

Hargett had been charged with murder in the shooting death of Vivian Ann Copeland



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

ercentage. This is just one of pol-free cottonseed flour proced by what is called the Li juid Cyclone Process. LCP for otton flour will soon be itilized on a commercial scale y the plains Cooperative Oil Mill at Lubbock. The new food-grade cottonseed flour will have as much as 65 percent protein compared to about 13 percent for wheat flour. Unusually high protein content of the flour was the primary reason for the concentrated research. Scientists say that as much as six percent of the total world supply of protein is in cottonseed, but until LCP was discovered the protein could not be utilized directly by humans because of the toxic gossypol pigment in the cotton eed. LCP's success in making possible the production of the food-grade flour is being hailed as a major achievement by world nutritionists.
