

Green Thumb program salutes older workers

Three local women have been involved in the Green Thumb program for years and are examples of how this program can be an asset to the community and to the non-profit places in which they work.

The week of March 12-18 has been proclaimed "Hire the Older Worker Week" and that is just what the Green Thumb program does. It salutes the ability of older workers and encourages people to employ them.

"Hire the Older Worker Week" is a time to spotlight the contributions of these seniors, Thursie Reid, Adele Tompkins and Lena Ruthardt of Muleshoe, and what they bring to the local labor force.

Adele, Thursie and Lena all work for what they are paid and are highly depended on at their working places at the Texas Department of Health

Office in Muleshoe, the Muleshoe Public Library and at Muleshoe Healthcare Center.

Green Thumb, Inc. has operated the Senior Community Service Employment Program for 13 years. The program provides the nation's seniors with part-time employment and training opportunities. The Green Thumb program operates primarily in 132 rural Texas counties.

Lena has worked at Muleshoe Public Library for nine years, helping out with a variety of library operational tasks.

"I like my job very much because it makes me feel independent," Lena said.

Adele Tompkins has worked at the Texas Department of Health for 12 years, where she helps keep medical records, post lab reports, type and do other tasks.

"I have enjoyed my work," Adele said. "It has been a learning experience for me, learning about medicine." She is supervised by Registered nurse Judy Jacobs.

"I like the Green Thumb program because it is only part-time and I never feel dis-

criminated against because I am older," Adele said. "People here depend on us and we help ease the work load."

Thursie Reid has worked with the Green Thumb program at Muleshoe Healthcare Center for three years. She basically assists residents with ac-

tivities.

"I like everything about my work here, I love these people, everyone of them," Thursie said.

"I have gotten a lot of experience, learning to get along

Precipitation enhancement workshop to be held

During the past year, many High Plains residents have wondered just what they could do to make it rain and relieve the dry conditions across the region.

Many large white clouds full of moisture have passed over the region but they have refused to release their precious cargo.

Weather experts from across the country will meet to address this problem and discuss one possible solution: precipitation enhancement.

The Texas Tech Water Re-

sources Center, the Texas Natural Resource conservation Commission and the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 will sponsor a workshop on precipitation enhancement in Lubbock at the Sheraton Inn on April 7, 1995.

Workshop topics include the history, legal aspects, and the cloud seeding process. Workshop participants will also have the opportunity to review the progress of current cloud seeding projects in Texas.

The Colorado River Municipal Water District has operated a cloud seeding program since 1971.

Representatives of the District will also be at the workshop to present information on their program. According to CRMWD officials, the cloud seeding has increased average annual rainfall by 30 to 40 percent in its target areas.

Precipitation enhancement is an attempt to change or control natural development of precipitation cloud

forms in the lower half of the earth's atmosphere.

Silver iodide is introduced into the cumulus clouds to cause raindrops to form. This also produces a more efficient cloud system that will last longer and produce more moisture droplets.

One positive aspect of precipitation enhancement is that it does not increase rainfall in one area at another area's expense.

Clouds are very inefficient and only release a small portion of their moisture at any

one time. Even after seeding, large amounts of available moisture are still left in the cloud.

The workshop will begin at 8:00 a.m. and conclude at 4:30 p.m. Registration includes meeting costs, one meal, and coffee breaks.

In an effort to further safeguard the community blood supply, United Blood Services will require that blood donors show identification before they donate at the Muleshoe Blood Drive.

The identification program started Feb. 1, 1995 to help United Blood Services assure the accuracy of donor records and verify the identity of each donor.

The ID must have the donor's given name and one of the following: birthday, Social Security number or a picture of the donor. Some examples of acceptable identification

include a current driver's license, a Social Security card, a United Blood Services donor card or a passport.

"Most people carry an ID so we don't expect this requirement to create a problem," said Cheryl Keefer of the United Blood Services.

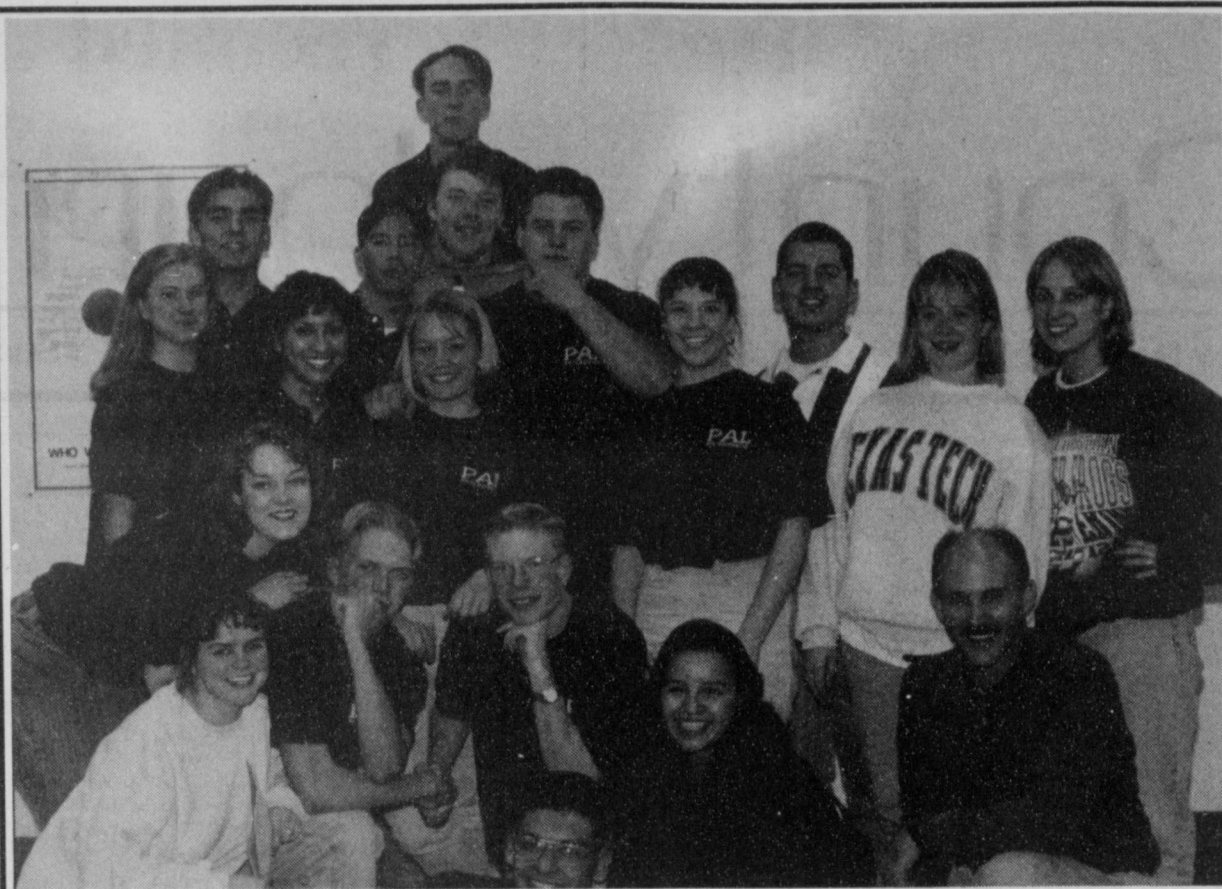
Anyone who has equipment or uniforms belonging to the league may turn them in on Tuesday. This may be your

Turkey is recalled in 14 states

The U.S. Department of Agriculture this week announced that a Springfield, Mo., food processing firm voluntarily has recalled from 14 states over a million pounds of ground turkey because small pieces of bone were found in the produce.

Hudson Foods, Inc., is recalling all 16-ozs. (1 lb.) packages of its "Delightful Farms Finely Ground Turkey"

distributed to retail stores in Texas, Tennessee, Louisiana, California, Arkansas, Florida, Illinois, Kansas,

Massachusetts, Minnesota, Missouri, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Virginia.

All packages covered under the recall will have "Est. P-7249" inside the circular

USDA inspection seal on the label. No other Delightful Farms food product is affected by the recall.

"Because of the potential for injury, we urge consumers who may have purchased the suspect product to return it unopened to the place of purchase," said Michael R. Taylor, acting under secretary for food safety.

USDA learned of the problem after two consumers in Minnesota reported finding bone in the ground turkey. Subsequent USDA laboratory

tests confirmed the presence of small pieces of bone in unopened packages. As a precautionary measure, the firm is recalling 1,117,256 pounds of Delightful Farms finely ground turkey.

Consumers with questions about the recall may phone the toll free USDA Meat and Poultry Hotline at 1-800-535-4555 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. This number also provides access to a telecommunications device for the deaf and hearing impaired.

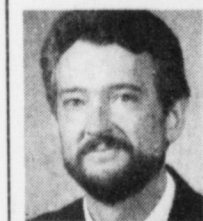

So Many Bricks, So Many Walls

So many bricks. So many walls. The bricks we use to build them are questions all dressed up in religious veneer, as if the whole future of the Christian faith depended upon issues instead of upon a Savior.

Pick a brick. Any brick. The Lord's Supper. How often? Bap-

tism. How deep? Music. Pitch pipe or pipe organ? Robes. Only around the house or in the pulpit, too? Choirs. Just in heaven or also in church?

Lots of "religious" bricks used to build sanctimonious walls. The names of the bricks change, but the mortar remains the same. It is our own pride, not a very religious thing, but it holds walls together quite nicely, thanks.

Some shore up walls with Scripture, or worse, the lack of it, building elaborate positions based on nothing more than silence. And when we do build walls with Scripture, we tend to pull out a verse here and one there, forgetting the chapter which is truly the Lord's Prayer, a poignant prayer for unity (John 17).

We are so much more like the apostles than like the Lord. Like tattletale kids, we run to tell on our religious neighbors: "Lord, we saw someone who doesn't worship behind the right wall doing good works in your name, so right away we warned him to stop!"

Sound familiar? It happened before. I'm sure Christ's answer is still the same: "Do not stop him, for whoever is not against us is for us."

Still, we're very attached to our walls. They shore up our self-justification, the very heart of sin. They serve for us like the black hats and white hats in old Westerns, color-coding the bad guys and good guys. We forget that our only claim to goodness is that we've been dressed in His righteousness in absolute mercy and grace.

One thing's sure. If we raise our eyes high enough to look up to the Savior on the cross, we'll find ourselves looking over walls. In the light of the cross, issues assume their proper size.

Jesus is the Son of God. He is Lord. On the cross, He paid the price for the salvation of the world. Nothing else matters much.

So many walls. So many bricks. Maybe it's time we loved the Lord enough to quit building.

White attends a shoe expo

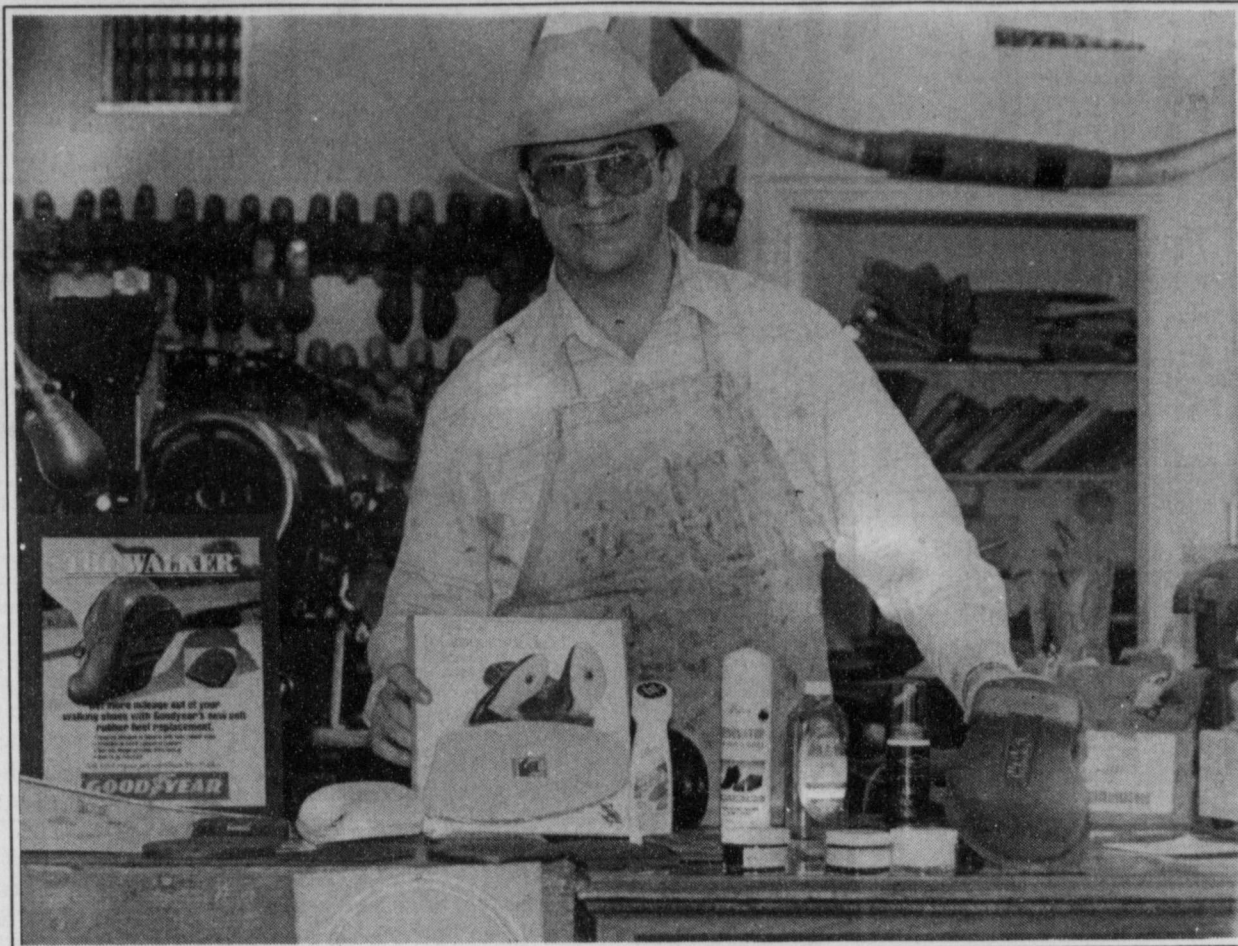

Workshop to help residents plan landscapes

LUBBOCK - South Plains residents who find their "green thumbs" itching to do some Spring beautification around their yards can get some professional guidance here Saturday, March 25, during an all-day Landscape Development Workshop for Individuals and Families.

Conducting the training will be Dr. Steve George, associate professor and horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Dallas,

and a faculty of leading landscape architects and designers from the South Plains.

The workshop will be from 9 am. until 6 pm. at the Breedlove Dehydration Plant, 1818 N. Martin Luther King Blvd.. Breedlove is on the road to the airport just north of Loop 289.

The workshop is sponsored by the Extension Service, West Texas Arts and Botanical Association, South Plains Extension Master Gardeners and the

Land Use Board of South Plains Food Bank.

To provided individual instruction and counseling, only 40 registrants will be accepted. A family will be counted as a single registrant. Participants are encouraged to bring a plan of their property or a diagram showing dimensions of the yard and buildings, and pictures of the house and landscape if possible.
