

Building goes through lots of changes

Ownership of the old D & G building located on the 100 block of West Ave. D in Muleshoe has changed hands many times over the years and the building has served many purposes - from being a car dealership in the 1940s to a bracero housing complex in the mid-1950s. It has also been a grocery store and laundromat.

The building has gone through a lot of changes since it was built in the 1940s. Now, only a frame of one of the oldest buildings in Muleshoe is standing as it is in the process of being torn down in order to make way for a parking lot.

Jessie Leal owned the D & G building for 20 years until selling it in December to Johnny Actkinson and Muleshoe Abstract located next to it, in order that it may be converted into a parking lot.

Leal said that there is a lot of history behind the D & G Grocery building.

It is hard to find anyone in Muleshoe who remembers ex-

actly when the old D & G building was built or who first owned it. Records at the Muleshoe Abstract Company could not be found to pinpoint it.

Buck Johnson said he believes the building was originally built for Colvin Motors, a Chrysler auto dealership in

the 1940s. The building was then believed to have been a grocery store in 1945.

Leal said that when he came to Muleshoe in 1953 or 1954, the D & G building was being used to house braceros and the front part was a grocery store (Doss & Green). Leal worked

for this grocery store for awhile.

Jack Young, who is District Judge of the 287th District in Texas, said his uncle had a grocery store at that building when the bracero program was started. That was in the mid 1950s.

The building was a second hand store at one time and the other part was a laundromat.

Leal said he believes that the D & G Store went bankrupt and was repossessed by First Federal Savings & Loan in

9-1-1 is now the number to call for emergencies

The Muleshoe Police Department has announced that the telephone number 272-4200 will no longer be valid when placing calls for emergency assistance. As of Thursday, the city has switched over

to a new 9-1-1 system and 9-1-1 is the number local residents should call when seeking help from local police, ambulance and fire services.

"We just want to notify the public that the 4200 emergency

number which a lot of older people are used to calling is no longer being used. People need to call 9-1-1 now," said Muleshoe Police Chief Julian Dominguez.

The 4200 number is no

longer valid and if people try to call it they will not get anything.

The Muleshoe Police Department received equipment to convert to the emergency number to 9-1-1 a few months

ago but has just completed the necessary changes to make the switch.

In the long run, Dominguez feels the change will be for the

Perry encourages support of Boll Weevil Eradication

Dear Editor:

Mother Nature is proving a fickle partner to High Plains cotton farmers. Several years of mild winters have invited the nation's number one pest to establish a home in an alarming and increasing number of cotton acres.

In the past, we've been able to keep the few weevils in check through a diapause program, along with our traditional wicked winters. Today, however, we must take matters into our own hands by approving Boll Weevil Eradication effort

by voting yes.

Each year, farmers and ranchers watch the cost of boll weevil control rise - \$22.5 million last year across the state - and see the pests take a bigger bite out of their cotton production - \$20 million in annual crop losses. But it doesn't have to be that way. The technology is available to eliminate these losses.

Cotton sales generated \$1 billion last year in the High Plains. That money travels through the community in

many ways, multiplying its effect as it goes. When farmers make more money, their entire community benefits. What's more, the eradication program will create jobs during the program's duration.

By approving this measure, an enhanced pre-eradication diapause program will be conducted by the Plains Cotton Growers under a cooperative agreement with the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation. In 1998, an actual eradication program is set to come on line.

Of course, there are costs associated with the program. But I believe he benefits outweigh these costs. Without the program, we'll continue to struggle against this devastating pest and see more farmers unable to stay in business. Vote yes for boll weevil eradication.

ing, although he is not sure.


The D & G building is believed to have been built in the

DeShazo students compete in state OM

Seven students from DeShazo Elementary School recently competed at the state Odyssey of the Mind (OM) tournament at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls.

The Odyssey of the Mind is a program that helps develop problem-solving skills and rewards creative thinking.

These students qualified for state competition by winning first place at the regional tournament held in February at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

They placed 7th out of 22 teams in the state competition. They were also awarded the Ranatra Fusca Award for creativity. This award recognizes extremely creative solutions, whether or not they are successful. They were recognized with medals for this award.

Out of 264 teams competing in all divisions, only seven teams received this award.

The team members were: Jessica Carpenter, Nikki Felan, Gradee Adrian, Brennan Broyles, Cydni Vandiver, Kyle Yell and Andy Sain. Coaches for this team were Kulie Broyles, Hellen Adrian and

These students were on the Division I Balsa Wood "a New Twist" team. The team's problem was to design and build a structure of balsa wood and glue. The structure was tested by balancing and supporting as much weight as possible. The structure had to undergo a series of twists during the competition.

The structure could weigh no more than 18 grams, the equivalent of two Hershey's kisses. DeShazo's team structure held 420 pounds.

Texas Odyssey of the Mind has grown from two school memberships in 1982 to the current 1,413. This now places Texas number one in the world membership for the 5th year in a row.

Winners from the state tournament will compete on May 27 at the World Finals at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville, Tenn.

Teams at the World Finals will be from all 50 states, Washington, D.C. and Australia, Canada, China, Europe, Japan and Mexico.

The most important characters in the Old Testament could be called victims. One young man was the victim of the

When Jesus died on the cross, he baptized suffering with his own blood. Through him, we who are often victims of pain and suffering, sorrow and death, become victors as we share in his victory.



Houston Livestock Show draws record crowd

Houston - The 63rd celebration of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo continued its assault on the record books, cracking the one-million mark in rodeo attendance for the first time and bringing in a half million dollars for the grand champion steer.

The 1995 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo: Recorded a total draw of 1,810,007 for general attendance, surpassing last year's total of 1,616,113 by 12 percent.

Set a rodeo attendance record of 1,068,447 exceeding 1994's rodeo attendance of 985,871 by 8.38 percent. Four of the 20 rodeo performances set individual performance records.

Established six world record auction sales marks - \$500,000 for the Grand Champion Steer; \$140,000 for the Reserve Grand Champion Steer; \$81,000 for the Grand Champion Barrow; \$80,000 for the Grand Champion Pen of Broilers; \$67,000 for the Grand Champion Turkey; and \$41,000 for the Reserve Grand Champion Barrow.

Presented the Friday, March 3, rodeo performance on television nationwide. Featuring rodeo highlights and a full-length concert by Hank Williams Jr. and Sawyer Brown,

the performance also was shown on pay-per-view cable television throughout Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana and select markers in New Mexico, Arizona and Nevada.

"The individual records that we set this year may stand forever or be broken next year, but the combined results of this year's show will be remembered for a lifetime," said Don Jordan, Show president.

Total livestock auction sales (including a horse and ratite sale) tallied in at \$7,516,206, a decrease of 15 percent from the 1994 total of \$8,884,286. Three fewer commercial cattle sales were held in 1995 dropped from \$1,247,000 in 1994.

However, junior show market sales, making up \$4,545,349 of the total, rose 6 percent from 1994. Of this amount, \$1,351,950 was placed in the Show's Educational Fund. And, due to the Show's guaranteed premium program initiated in 1994, the young Texas 4-H and FFA exhibitors received a total of \$3,125,575 for their auction animals.

Making up the \$4,545,349 junior show total were market steer sales of \$2,494,800, followed by junior market swine sales of \$718,225; junior market lamb sales of \$618,700; and junior market poultry sales

of \$498,700. The junior commercial steer sale posted a final total of \$214,924.

The fourth annual Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Premier Horse Sale totaled

\$350,450, rising 16 percent over the previous year's figure of \$301,275.

Commercial cattle sales varied from breed to breed, totaling \$2,527,382 in sales.

Joe Beaver of Huntsville, Texas, won the All-Around Cowboy title, and added \$25,000 to the \$9,736.46 won in the calf roping and team roping events, for total earnings of \$34,736.46.

Herbert Theriot of

Poplarville, Miss., was runner-up, after competing in the team roping and calf roping events.

A total of 501 rodeo contestants contended for a share in \$634,757 in prize money. The Houston Rodeo ranks as the world's richest regular-season rodeo.

This year's Houston Livestock Show attracted 2,047 foreign visitors from 63 different countries, many of them livestock buyers.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is a charity event, contributing more than \$8 million annually in support of Texas youth.
