Local Law Officers Apprehend Duo

Two suspected felons were apprehended in Muleshoe late Thursday afternoon by the combined forces of the Bailey County Sheriff's office and the Muleshoe Police Department.

Acting on a "tip" from a Lubbock police officer, which indicated that the two wanted men were in the Muleshoe area, Muleshoe officers proceeded to the Agricultural housing complex on east 6th Street.

After securing the general area where the suspects were lodged, two Bailey County officers led the initial encounter which resulted in the arrest of two young Hispanic males. The two men were charge with four counts of homicide each. One other man

was taken into custody and later released when a routine check revealed no wanted notice on him. A shotgun was also confiscated in the arrest; however, Deputy Tony Wallace indicated that it was not believed that the gun was connected with the Lubbock incident.

Warrants on the two 19 year old men for suspected homicide have been outstanding since July 15, 1980, after they were involved in a July 13 incident that left four Lubbock men dead. The homicide allegedly occurred in a 4th Street pool hall on the Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

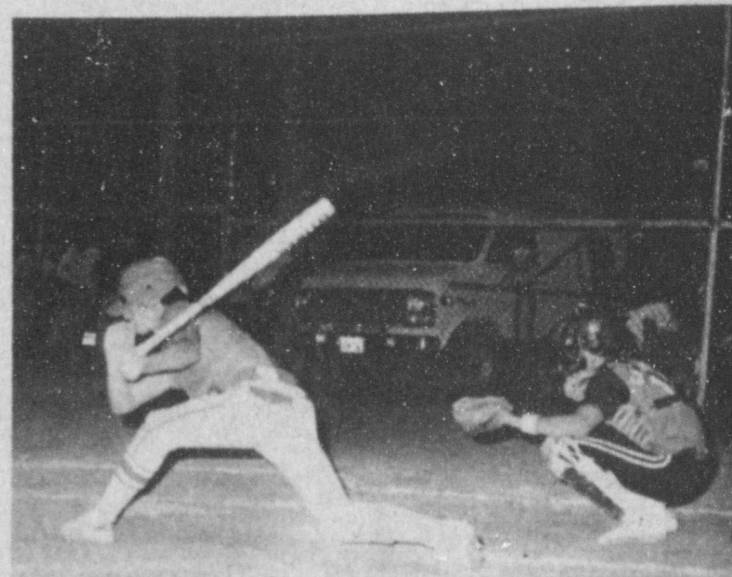
Senators Plan Announcing MX Alternative

Two senators from Utah and Nevada plan to produce an alternative to basing MX missiles in their states.

Sen. Jake Garn, R-Utah and Sen. Paul Laxalt, R-Nev., hope to submit their recommendation within two weeks after completion of hearings on the MX by the Senate appropriations subcommittee.

The panel began its hearings with a closed session Tuesday.

Garn said he would be surprised if the hearings "didn't produce conclusive evidence that there is a better alternative than the Air Force's plan to deploy 200 MX missiles in Utah and Nevada.

Cool germination test results are being coolly received by many cotton agronomists, who say the lower-than-usual vigor demonstrated in cotton seed indicates the test itself, is at fault. Designed to provide an indication of early-season seed vigor, the test is, according to a Texas Agricultural Extension service agronomist, more rigorous than standard germination tests. And, even though most of the test seed fell below normal test values, this does not necessarily mean that cotton farmers will face a severe vigor problem in 1981. Most researchers believe that the poor results are more associated with the test itself than with the seed quality. Although a reliable test is being worked on, it appears that this year planters will have to rely on their own past experience and judgment in assessing potential performance.

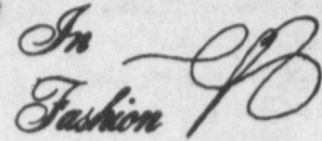

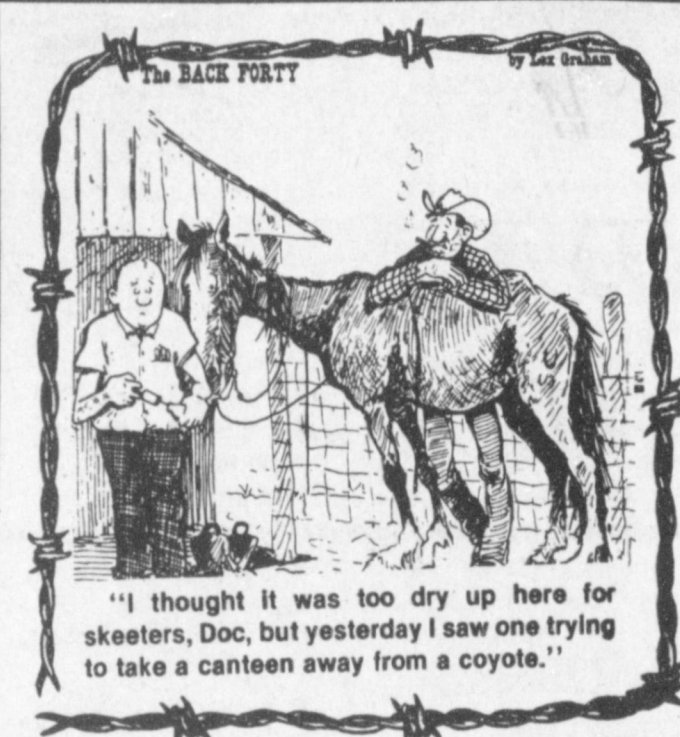

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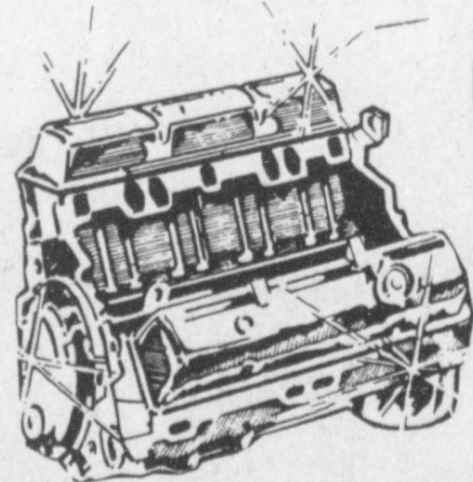

Gin trash research could give farmers new energy source

COLLEGE STATION --- The waste products of cotton ginning -- called gin trash -- could someday be the source of energy used to power gins, says a Texas A&M University researcher.
Texas harvests and produces more cotton than any other state with the crop often exceeding 5 million bales. For

about 90 percent of the cotton crop, every bale harvested results in between 700 to 1,200 pounds of gin trash.
The implication of gin trash research would allow farmers to be more energy independent, said Dr. Ronald

Lacewell, an agricultural economist.
Five major crops in Texas -- sorghum, cotton, corn, wheat and rice -- produce more than 20 million tons of residue each year.

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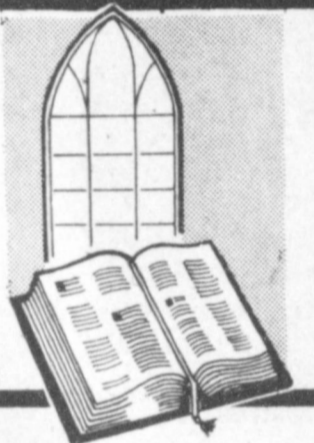

northeast side of Lubbock, when three men entered the pool hall and opened fire on three others. Shots were exchanged from both groups. "A quarrel between two of the men had been 'brewing' for over a week," according to Lubbock Police Detective Joe Navaraz.

Lubbock Police Sergeant James Fields indicated to the Journal late Thursday evening that the two suspected men had been traced to the Muleshoe area by various tips they had received. "A year's hard work has gone into the apprehension of these men," another officer stated.

Bailey County Sheriff's Deputy Hal Bynum received a call around 3 p.m. Thursday, indicating that the two men were in Muleshoe. Bynum proceeded to check the information, receiving confirmation that the men were in the housing complex.

Bynum, accompanied by Sergeant Wayne Holmes of the Police Department, Chief Jerry Hicks, Detective Julian Dominguez, Patrolman Monty Phipps, Sheriff's Deputy Tony Wallace and Tom Watson were all enlisted in the capture of the two men.

The suspects were brought to the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center where they were identified by descriptions furnished by the Lubbock officials, as well as tattoos and scars.

Bailey County Justice of the Peace, Tana Holmes, acting on directive from the Lubbock District Attorney's office, arraigned the two men on the homicide charge and set bond at \$440,000 each - \$100,000 each count of homicide.

Lubbock officials J.R. Ashmore of the Lubbock Police Department and Lubbock County Sheriff's Deputy Bill Druel arrived in Muleshoe Friday morning to complete identification procedures and transfer the suspects to the Lubbock County Jail where they will be held pending trials.

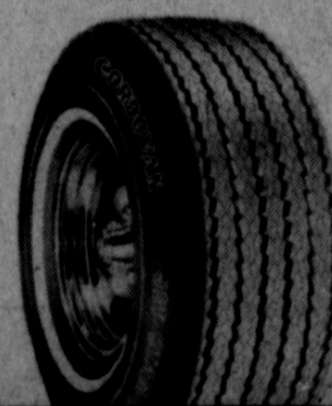

Clayton Champions Rural Area Needs

Legislation vital to the rural areas of Texas and several new laws directly affecting the district represented by Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake were approved before the legislature adjourned June 1.

Clayton, who played a prime role in guiding the process as Speaker of the House, said the new legislation would have a positive effect on the seven counties he serves.

The financial stability of small school districts was aided by retaining a minimum aid provision. The law states that no school district shall receive less

state aid per student in average daily attendance than it received in the previous school year.

"With rapid changes in property values that impact small school districts tremendously, this provision allows sound funding for public education in rural-oriented counties," Clayton said.

Rural areas of the state have been hardest hit by the inflationary cost of county road and bridge maintenance. To cope with the situation, the Legislature has passed legislation that will raise \$29 million for the Lateral Road Fund by an across-the-board li-

cense tag fee hike for all vehicles in the state. The legislation goes into effect on July 1, 1982.

Agriculture products have long been exempted from ad valorem taxation, with the exception of livestock and poultry. Legislation passed this session calls for a constitutional amendment election that asks voters to approve allowing for the exemption and thereby making for more uniformity in determining taxable income and property for farmers and ranchers.

To preserve the traditional practice of buying and selling gasoline on a

temperature-adjusted basis the Legislature enacted a law that will make it an offense to refuse to make sales of a motor fuel without an allowance for temperature adjustment for shipments of gasoline over 5000 gallons.

Clayton said, "The significance of the legislation is that because motor fuel evaporates at a high rate at warmer temperatures, this bill will assure that service station owners and operators do not have to pay for evaporated gasoline. This will be particularly helpful to our operators in out-of-the-way rural areas that require long hauls of motor fuels. Consumers, by not having evaporation costs passed on to them, will likewise benefit from temperature-corrected sale of gasoline."

Rural counties have often found it difficult to provide adequate juvenile probation services through local funding. A new law will pave the way for updated, equitable juvenile probation services throughout the state. The legislation renames the Adult Probation Commission the Texas Probation Commission and makes it

responsible for juvenile as well as adult probation services.

No longer will a county have to provide funding for indigent counsel in a capital case. Legislation passed provides that the court will certify the amount to be paid to the court-appointed counsel by the Comptroller from state funds. Such cases have been an added financial burden to rural counties who have insufficient local funds for lengthy capital cases.

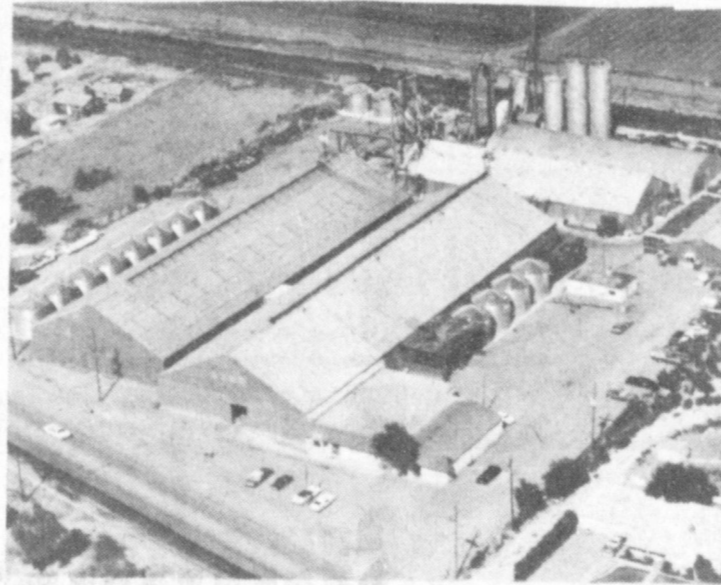

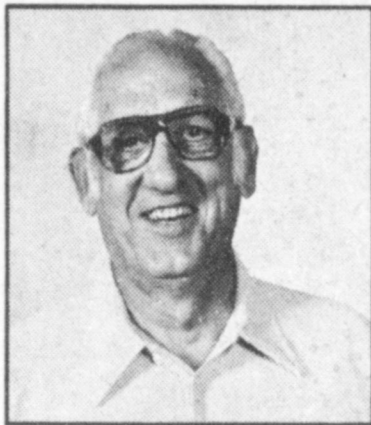

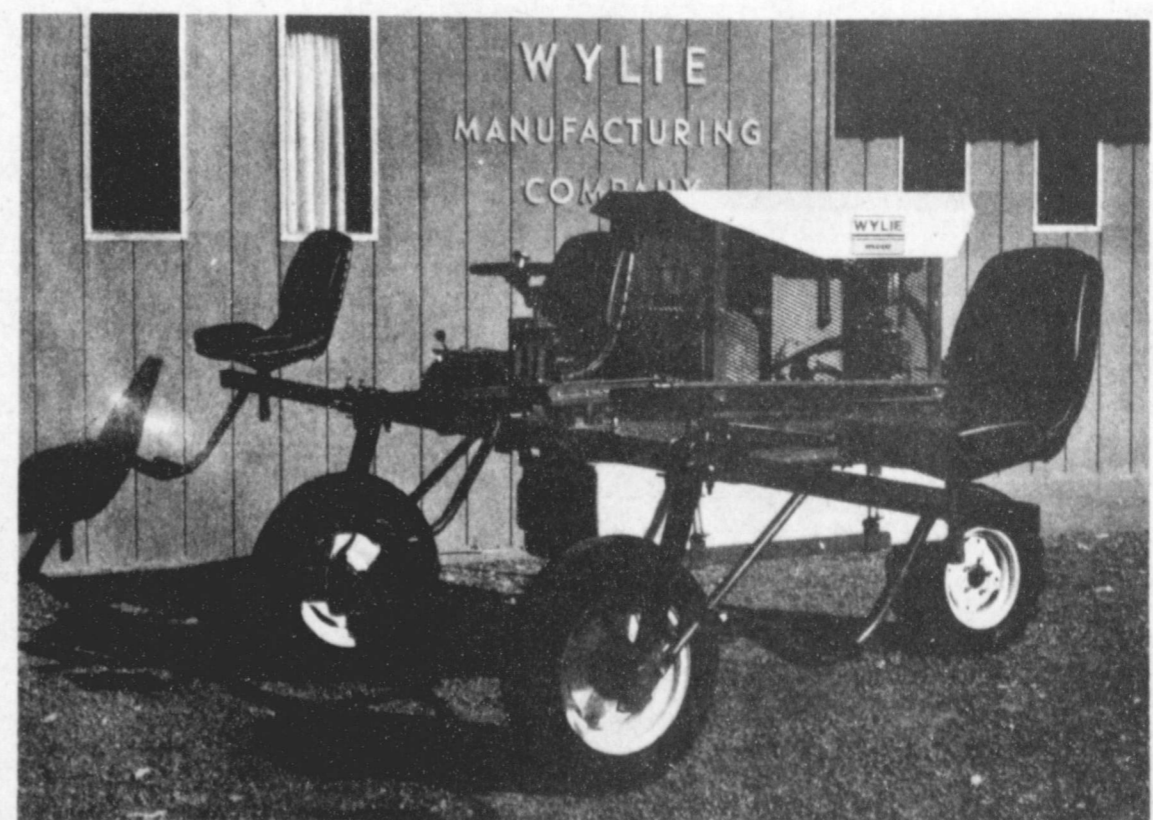
