Before cold weather sets in, the City is already making attempts to buy more gas from Transwestern, as Hi Plains cannot furnish anymore gas than they have been furnishing is the past. Hi Plains is unable to make a contract with Transwestern, who furnished more gas for the city nished more gas for the city last winter during "peak-need" periods of extreme

New Feed Additive For Cattle Released

Many veterans retired from military service and paying premiums for U. S. Government Life Insurance (USGLI) or National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) from monthly retirement checks may be missing annual dividend checks, the Veterans Administration reported today.

The VA insurance center at

Philadelphia reported there are several thousand military retirees who each month pay insurance premiums by allot-ment from their retired pay.

In some cases, the monthly deduction becomes so routine the veterans fail to notify the VA when there is a change of address. This is particularly true, a spokesman said, when a retiree's check is sent to a banking institution.

Annual dividends paid on USGLI and NSLI policies often

result in some checks being returned to the VA for lack of a current address, the spokes

man said.

Military retirees paying their Gl insurance premiums by allotment should send changes of address, with policy number to the Veterans Administration Center, P.O. Box 8079, Philadelphia, Pa.





The supplemental security income program makes monthly payments to people with little or no income and limited resources who are 65 or over or blind or disabled. People can get information about applying for the payments by calling or writing any social security office.

"When applying," Weatherly said, "it's a good idea to have with you as many of the following as possible: a checkbook, if you have one, to show how much you have in the

Governor Dolph Briscoe an-nounced approval of a \$31,800 supplemental Office of Human Development grant to Texas Panhandle Community Action

Development grant to Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation in Amarillo.

The grant is for Handicapped Head Start, and is effective, retroactively from Aug. 1, 1976, through July 31, 1977. It is funded under Title V of the Head Start, Economic Opportunity, and Community Partnership Act of 1974.

The supplemental funds are being used to improve services of approximately 75 handicanped children in the 26-county area of the Texas Panhandle. In order to improve the services, a diagnostic team is being hired by the delegate agency PESO Education Service Center of Region XVI, and the corporation is hiring an educational diagnostician and a certified teacher of the handicapped.

trol research in alfalfa are invited to the Les Darsey farm on October 14. The minitour will start at 10 a.m. according to Dr. G. B. Thompson, Director of Research for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Amarillo-Bushland. Station at Amarillo-Bushland. The research plots are located in a field 5 miles north of Alanreed on state highway 291. After arriving at the field, tour participants must take a field road 0.5 mile east and 0.25 north to see the research plots. Mr. Darsey sprinkle irrigates alfalfa on sandy soil and sells most of the crop to feedlots. Farmers in Wheeler, Hall, Donley and Collingsworth Counties produce alfalfa under similar conditions.

conditions.

Results from two years of fertility research will be discussed by Dr. Don Goss, Soil Scientist from the USDA Agricultural Research Service Center at Bushland. In his experiment, manure and commerical fertilizer were compared as a source of phosphate.

weed control research was conducted by Dr. Allen Wiese and Wayne Chenault, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Scientists. Both experimental herbicides and products already labeled for weed control in alfalfa were applied in October. November and February, 1975. Some of the products did the job and others did not according to Wiese.

Joe Van Zandt, County Agricultural Agent in Gray County assisted with tour plans and arranged for a pocket gopher control demonstration by Lloyd Cheatheam, District Field Supervisor for the Rodent Control Service. Gophers do a lot of digging that hurts alfalfa stands almost as much as weeds according to the county agent.

After discussions of research and the gopher control demonstration, tour participants will have a first hand look at the combined effects of good fertility and weed control programs. With proper management, alfalfa yield and protein content are greatly increased. Herbicides applied in the winter controlled winter annual grass weeds, allowing vigorous well fertilized alfalfa to shade out summer annual

Jehovah's Witnesses Banned In Argentina

Freedom of worship has been denied the Christian Society of Jehovah's Witnesses and their 604 congregations throughout Argentina, by Decree Number 1867 signed by Jorge Rafael Videla, President of Argentina, under date of August 31, 1976. According to Peter Butrus, presiding overseer of the Pertyton congregation, the branch offices of the Society and all meeting places have been meeting places have been closed.

Butrus said a communica-tion received from World Headquarters of Jehovah's Witnesses in Brooklyn, New York, was considered by the

Perryton congregation. "We were shocked and surprised at were snocked and surprised at this move by the Argentine government," Butrus related. Butrus reported, "In or-dering 'the activity of the

Butrus reported, "In or-dering 'the activity of the religious association ... pro-hibited in the whole territory of the nation," the Decree, issued by President Videla sated that 'freedom of worship consecrated by Articles 14 and consecrated by Articles 14 and 20 of the national constitution of course finds itself limited in the sense that the religious ideas should not imply the violation of laws or an attempt against public order, national security, morale or good cus-toms.

"According to a bill passed by the Argentine congress in 1949," Butrus explained, "all religious groups except the Catholic Church were required to register with the Depart-ment of Cults of the Ministry of Foreign Relations. Registry of Jehovah's Witnesses was denied and in August 1950 our work was officially proscribed. "For five years following this proscription, close surveil-lance of Jehovah's Witnesses was maintained but, with the was maintained but, with the fall of the Peron government in 1955, pressure began to ease somewhat and the following year a national public assem-bly was held, attended by over 5,000 persons. 5,000 persons.
"In 1957, however, another

national assembly was inter-rupted by the police who invoked the public meeting

edict of the Chief of Police. This abridgement of the free-dom of worship and of meeting "According to a bill passed by the Argentine congress in 1949," Butrus explained, "all guaranteed by the constitution was challenged by Jehovah's Witnesses, and on March 14, 1958, the sentence of the Chief of Police as revoked and eight articles of the public meeting edict were declared illegal and

edict were declared illegal and unconstitutional."
Following another change in government in 1958. Butrus continued, a number of appeals were made to various government officials and agencies to have the ban against the Christian activity of Jehovah's Witnesses lifted, but despite favorable responses from several officials, the government responded negatively in 1959.
Despite the DeJure proscription of the work, however,

De Facto acceptance continued, two public assemblies being held that same year. In the years that followed, a new building housing branch offices and a printing plant of the Society of Jehovah's Witnesses was built and later enlarged, and many new meeting places or Kingdom Halls were constructed. During the last twenty-five years, the preaching work of Jehovah's Witnesses was well received by people all over Argentina, the active number of Witnesses growing from 1.416 in 1950 to 31,140 in 1975.

"With this background of favorable activity and the response our work has received among the people of Argentina," Butrus explained concerning President Videla's decree of August 31, 1976, decree of August 31, 1976,

"we find it difficult to under-stand why this action should be taken after twenty-six years, when obviously no at-tempt has been made by these Christians 'against public order, national security, mor-ale or good customs,' as stated by President Videla in his decree. Obviously the position of Jehovah's Witnesses is misunderstood. It is our hope that liberty will soon be re-stored to Jehovah's Witnesses in Argentina." in Argentina."




