

Three Industrial Development Teams Named

Returned

The Hansford County Grand Jury for the 84th Judicial District Court Monday, Sept. 12, returned indictments against Jesus Aguilar, 24, of Perryton; Charles Rae Bassett, 35, of Oklahoma City, Okla.; and Michael Ray Belcher, 19, of Borger during the initial meeting of the fall term of the jury.

Aguilar was indicted for burglary of a motor vehicle and escape.

Bassett was indicted for aggravated assault on a police officer and possession of a controlled substance, namely cocaine.

Belcher was indicted for burglary of a motor vehicle.

The three were remanded to the custody of the Hansford County Sheriff and placed in jail in lieu of bond and pending further court proceedings.

Bond of \$20,000 each was set on the counts against Aguilar, a total of \$40,000.

Bond of \$25,000 each was set on the counts against Bassett, a total of \$50,000.

Bond of \$5,000 was set for the one count against Belcher.

County Budget set no tax increase

The Commissioners Court of Hansford County meeting in regular session Monday, Sept. 12, in the Courthouse in Spearman adopted, after public hearing and with no increase in taxes, the projected 1978 budget of \$1,652,407.47 for Hansford County.

County Judge Johnnie Lee pointed out that the assessment valuation had increased \$7 million so the budget has been increased accordingly.

The tax rate for county purposes is \$1.27 per \$100 assessed valuation with the tax breaking down as follows:
General fund: 62 cents.
Jury fund: 04 cents.
Road and Bridge general fund: 20 cents.
Road and Bridge sinking fund: 09 cents.
Special road fund: 30 cents.

Comery fund: 02 cents.
In other action during the lengthy session Monday, Commissioners Court also approved minutes of the meeting of Aug. 25, approved payment of bills, received the treasurer's monthly report and approved the request by Panhandle Eastern Pipeline to install a gathering line across a county road in Precinct 2.

"Kiss Your Baby" Week Proclaimed

Mayor Ralph Blodgett declared September 18-24 as "Kiss Your Baby" Week in Spearman, Texas by signing an official proclamation today.

Stressing the need for public health education in Spearman, Texas, the Mayor said the "Kiss Your Baby" Week is designed to help parents recognize the symptoms of cystic fibrosis in their children.

One of the signs of C/F, the most serious lung-damaging disease, is a salty taste to the skin. Mothers have sometimes alerted doctors to the possibility of C/F when kissing their babies and tasting salt, explained Mayor Ralph Blodgett.

Cystic Fibrosis is inherited by approximately one of every 1,600 American babies. It occurs when a child receives a gene for the disease from each parent. So far, there's no cure for C/F, but early diagnosis and treatment are helping to lengthen lives. Today, 50% of C/F patients can be expected to live past the age of 18, where once few survived to school age.

The signs of cystic fibrosis and other lung-damaging diseases include: recurrent wheezing; persistent coughing with excessive mucus; pneumonia more than once; excessive appetite with poor weight gain and enlargement of the fingers. Cystic Fibrosis signs also include a salty taste of the skin; persistent bulky diarrhea and nasal polyps.

THE MOORES, Gene and Bobbie

The Reverend Gene Moore and his wife Bobbie have witnessed with the spoken word and music to thousands of people around the world. It is their conviction that Christianity is just as relevant today as it was two thousand years ago.

Gene is an ordained minister having been appointed as evangelist in 1962. Previous to becoming an evangelist he was a pastor in a local church. He feels that evangelism is his call to the Christian church and thinks that his God given talents are in this area.

Bobbie is an accomplished musician. She has many years of formal training. It was music that brought Bobbie and Gene together. They met at an Oklahoma college where they both received their degrees. They were married in 1953. Their duets have thrilled thousands since then. They have sung for gospel meetings, camp meeting, at retreats, and for civic clubs. Five thousand people heard Gene sing at a jungle camp meeting in India.

In 1968 the Moores sang in Indonesia. At one time they sang in a crowded railway car, jammed with Indonesians. Wherever they go, they find that music is the universal language. The Moores directed the music at the Southern Illinois Annual Conference in 1971. Gene's latest missionary trip was to India in 1971. A large part of their giving goes for India missions. Currently they are building a church building in India in memory of their son Timothy.

They have been in charge of music for United Christian Assemblies, the South Central Jurisdictional Conference on Evangelism, and the National Committees of the Twelve. They led music for the Southern Illinois Annual Conference in 1972. They have four record albums, the latest of which was arranged by Kurt Kaiser and accompanied by a London Orchestra. Gene is a songwriter and has had several songs published by Rodeheaver-Word. Among his familiar songs are "Fill Your Life With Love", "Jesus Set My Heart to Singing", and "Do Unto Others". Gene's latest song was written several days after the death of their 9 year old son Timothy.

The Moores feel that they don't have to be old fashioned to be Christians. The songs of Bobbie and Gene are loved and appreciated by people of all ages. Teenagers find a message they are seeking in their music; older peoples' faith is strengthened as they listen to the familiar gospel songs.

The Moores have two children. Susan who is a teenager and Jonathan born December 19, 1972. Susan is a good singer and has begun singing specials with her parents. Jonathan as yet has only developed his lungs.

Perhaps the Moores sum up their own witness when they say, "Through our ministry we are trying to tell the message of what God has done for us and of what he can do for you."

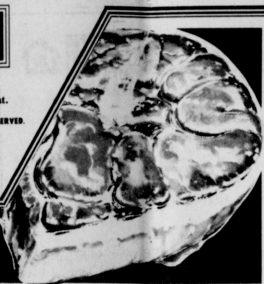

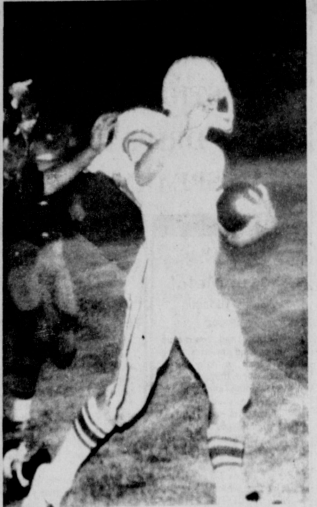

A. This would only serve to reduce the amount of gas available to the interstate market, where traditionally higher prices have resulted in larger exploration efforts. Prices in this unregulated sector of the natural gas market have enabled producers there to explore for and produce gas that would be non-commercial in the regulated interstate sector. Since the advent of interstate regulation in 1954, there has been a marked increase in the amount of gas dedicated to interstate sales. By 1970, 69 percent of new gas supplies was sold in the unregulated sector. Between 1970 and 1973, well over three-fourths of all new gas was sold in the interstate market. The imposition of controls on the interstate market would reduce incentive for continued exploration without assuring more supplies for the interstate market. How can we assure more supplies for the interstate market? One step is to deregulate natural gas prices.

FmHA Revises Formula for drought emergency water system Grants

A more liberal formula for determining the amount of grant funds, supplementing loans available for improvement of rural community water systems affected by drought, has been put into effect in Texas by the Farmers Home administration (FmHA), the agency's State Director W.H. Pieratt, announced this week.

Hatchinson, Lipscomb, and Ochiltree Counties have been made eligible for FmHA emergency loans and grants under President Carter's drought assistance program to help communities having diminished water supplies, resulting from drought conditions. In designated drought areas. Applications for projects approved must be made in time for funds to be obligated by September 30, 1977.

State Director Pieratt said the revised regulations will enable FmHA to apply a formula on grants similar to that used by other federal agencies that help to finance drought emergency water system projects.

In calculating a community's ability to repay an emergency loan for water system improvement, FmHA previously has taken into account existing indebtedness only for water facilities. The new formula lets FmHA take into account the applicant's existing indebtedness for all purposes. This is expected to increase the grant portion of FmHA funding of many projects.

vides that some projects, previously not eligible for grant assistance may receive FmHA grants of up to 20 percent of total eligible project development costs, if they are needed to safeguard public health and safety. A larger proportion of grant funds, up to 50 percent, may be provided if justified through the formula for determining the community's ability to repay a loan.

Application of the revised formula has been made retroactive to May 6, 1977, except where loan and grant funds have been delivered to the borrower. Financing of projects previously approved but not yet funded will be adjusted to the new formula, Mr. Pieratt said.

In addition to the September 30, 1977 deadline for obligation of funds, the drought emergency program imposes in April 30, 1978 deadline for completion of projects. Communities of up to 10,000 population may be included in the service areas of water systems receiving FmHA loans and grants. Loans are made for terms of up to 40 years, at an interest rate of 5 percent.

Project assistance from FmHA is provided through local county offices throughout the state. Information on project assistance can be obtained from FmHA's four county office at 408 Amherst, Perryton.

The latest USDA and Bureau of Census figures indicate that the United States farm population is dropping at a much faster rate than previously anticipated.

Last year, the figures indicated that the rural population had slipped another half million to dip to a new all-time low of 835 million people. The next result is that fewer than one in 25 Americans now lives on a farm - in 1935 about twenty-five percent of the United States population lived on farms. Since a few short years ago, 1970 to be exact, farm population has declined 14 percent! This trend is partially explained by movement to large mechanized farm operations and preference of farmers and farm hands to reside in town and commute to fields.

Head Lice

COLLEGE STATIONS— Lice may plague even clean hands, although often the problem is associated with poor personal hygiene, says Carla Shearer, health education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Head Lice may appear in the fall when children go back to school. They are transmitted by direct contact—sharing a comb, a hairbrush, scarf or other headgear.

itching may suggest the presence of lice, and nits (lice eggs) on the hair may be the first observable sign of head lice.

Medications are available without prescription. Repeated with a medicated product may kill the lice and their eggs. For recommendations on treatment, check with your doctor, pharmacist, or local health department. In any case, follow instructions carefully.

Pediculosis is an infestation of the skin and hair by lice. The head louse is one species of lice which lives on the head. These

insects — small, grayish white and wingless — are two to three millimeters (1/16 to 1/8 inch) long.

The life cycle of a head louse starts when the adult female (who produces 50 to 150 eggs) attaches her eggs to a strand of hair, usually behind the ear.

The eggs will hatch within 5 to 10 days and then mature in 8 to 10 days. Lice feed on human blood and cannot survive long if separated from their food source. Depending on conditions, the adult may live for three or more weeks.

How do you feel about your Health care

"We've got some of the best health care in the state in the Panhandle, and we're looking for ways to make it even better." That's the way Eddie Melin, Director of the Panhandle Health Systems Agency, characterizes a new public information campaign his group has introduced in area media.

Melin and his Amarillo-based staff are attempting to increase the communication through a two week, mass-media WELLNESS campaign. "We picked the term WELLNESS because we frankly felt like a lot of the existing public health jargon is unworkable," Melin observed.

Eddie Melin hopes WELLNESS will be more than just a casual attention-getter. "What we're working for," he said, "is the cooperation and involvement of Panhandle-area citizens who are the day-to-day benefi-

ciaries of health programs. We're hoping they'll take the time while they're well to think primary thrust in a coordinated newspaper and radio advertising schedule, according to Melin. "We've bought space in thirty-four newspapers and on twenty-one radio stations," he said.

"Part of the awareness campaign will be to invite comment from the average man-on-the-street," Melin says. "We want to know how he and she feel about the quality of health care about how they'll fare when they're sick. That's what WELLNESS means to us."

The WELLNESS effort has its roots in their communities, Melin said.

The Health Systems Agency was created by the National Health Planning and Resources Development Act of 1974. It serves twenty-five Panhandle

counties and is responsible for performing a variety of health planning, development and review functions where federally-funded programs are concerned.

"We're looking forward to getting information that will help us in our planning. Much of it will be funneled right back to representatives we have in area towns. Those representatives will be able to give us an even better picture of what's happening in their communities," Melin said.

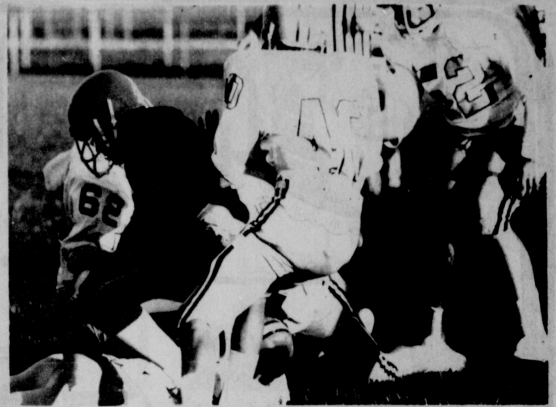

Only twice in Spearman's football history have the Lynx gone to Phillips and defeated them there. And if one will recall some to the past games with Phillips, he might remember scores such as Phillips 66 - Spearman 0, and Phillips 60 - Spearman 0, but that certainly wasn't the case this year. Phillips tested every mode of the "Purple Gang's" game with quick, tough, and aggressive playing, but they couldn't put the ball into the end zone until the final moments of the game against our least experienced boys.

The offensive line didn't open up the holes like they should have in the first half, and I suspect they were keying on Sellers after his fine performance against Stratford. The rush against Scot Sherwood's passing game was tremendous. All in all their defensive play was good forcing the Lynx to rely on the big play. If the game see-sawed back and forth in the bits during that first half, Reid kept things from becoming too

boring, with an 85 yard run back from the opening kickoff for a touchdown. Things may have bogged down in the first half, but they certainly got going in the second half, a sign that the coaches went back into the dressing rooms during intermission and back to the drawing boards. The Lynx came out in the second half ready to play football. Newton showed every one that he knew how to run with the ball with a 58 yard scamper for a TD and Sellers followed that displaying his punt return talents with a 60 yard journey that also ended in end zone. And apparently Newton didn't feel like that was enough, he made another TD trip in the fourth quarter which accounted for 18 more yards and six more points. Coach Sherwood started substituting freely and Phillips finally scored.

The defense -- well the score was 7-0 at the end of the first half and 13-0 at the end of the third quarter and 20-0 with a little over a minute to go in the game. I would say it was not

Snider racked up 15 yards after three attempts, averaging an even 5 at a whack rounding off a pretty good night for the backs.

In the receiving department Bodey caught two of Sherwood's tosses for 13 yards and Sellers hauled in one for 6 yards. And Ortega and Meisner proved their worth on the defense with 14 tackles apiece, with Ortega adding a pass interception to his night's work. In the scoring department -- and that's what it's all about -- Reid and Sellers each had a touchdown, while Newton galloped twice for "paydirt" be-

Patient flown to Amarillo in first such flight from here

The first patient ever to be transferred by helicopter from Hansford Hospital in Spearman to a hospital in Amarillo was flown out of here at 4:01 p.m., Tuesday, Sept. 13, in a helicopter and crew from the Potter County Sheriff's Department and the Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center. The patient was identified as Manuela Olivas, 72, of Mexico. She had been admitted to the hospital in Spearman Monday with an acute and severe but non-contagious illness. She is the sister of a resident of

Spearman. This first helicopter ambulance flight from Spearman to Amarillo was made at the request of the attending physician. The patient was air-lifted to St. Anthony's Hospital. 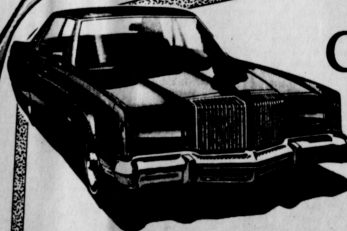

Deadline near for emergency loans

Farmers in Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Hansford and Hutchinson counties who plan to apply for federal emergency loans to help them recover from drought losses should file applications no later than September 30, 1977, at their county office of the U.S. Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

FmHA County Supervisor Robert J. Holloway issued this reminder that terms of the special Drought Impact emergency loan program, for which Congress appropriated extra loan funds this year, carry the

Sept. 30, 1977 deadline for loan application.

The rule applies in counties where farmers' eligibility for loans is based on Drought Impact designations made by local Interagency Drought Emergency Coordinating Committee. Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Hansford and Hutchinson counties are under that type of designation.

Mr. Holloway said of loan amounts needed under applications filed by September 30 can be revised if necessary in the course of loan processing. In

most cases, production loss this year can not be finally determined until later than September 30.

Under new legislation signed into law by President Carter August 4, loans not exceeding \$250,000 to offset production loss from disasters occurring since last July 1 are made at an interest rate of 3 percent. Loss to offset that portion of actual loss exceeding \$250,000 are made at an interest rate of 5 percent. Additional financing for production purposes, or for making major adjustments in

farming operations, is at a higher rate. Applicants must prove that necessary credit is not available to them from commercial lenders serving their localities.

Farmers may obtain further information or file applications at the FmHA office serving Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Hansford and Hutchinson Counties, located at 402 South Amherst, Perryton, Texas.

Transplant Iris—Transplant bearded iris during the next few weeks so that they will boast colorful flowers next spring, advises a landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Plant only healthy rhizomes (underground stems) in a well-drained bed in full sunlight. Work the soil to a depth of 12 to 18 inches and add a complete fertilizer. Space transplants 12 to 18 inches apart. Trim back foliage to one-third its original height.

Sales tax collections highest ever

State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Tuesday that tax collections by his office for the 1977 fiscal year ending August 31 were the highest in the state's history, totaling a record \$4.194 billion.

This is about \$651 million above the previous high set in fiscal 1976 when collections totaled \$3.5 billion. The state fiscal year runs from September 1, through August 31.

(The \$4.194 billion figure includes \$351.5 million in city sales taxes which are collected and processed by the Comptroller's Office).

Bullock said another record was broken last August when his Revenue Processing Division deposited \$594.6 million, the largest deposit for a single month in the state's history.

The previous record was set in May 1977 when a total of \$540 million was deposited in the state treasury.

Bullock said that increases in sales, motor and special fuel and oil and natural gas revenue,

coupled with intensified collection efforts by his office, account for the record collections.

State sales tax collections for the year were up 15 percent over fiscal 1976, city sales tax revenues were up 14.9 percent, motor and special fuels collections were up 4.5 percent and oil and natural gas were up a combined 15.7 percent, Bullock said.

Bullock said his auditors uncovered some \$91.5 million in tax deficiencies in fiscal 1977, a 27 percent increase over the previous year. This is additional tax money uncovered by audits that otherwise would have gone uncollected.

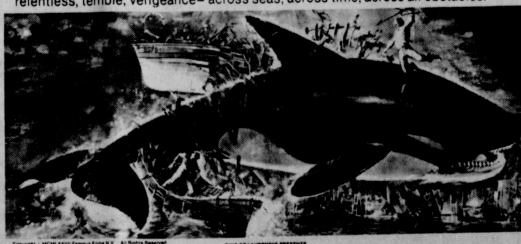

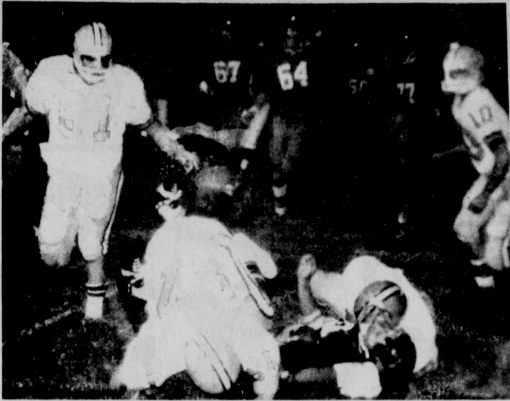

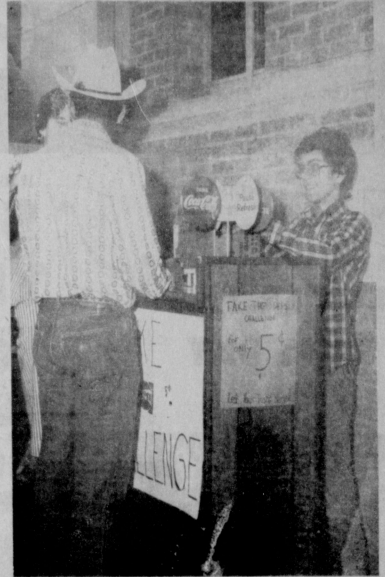

Texas Tourism Tops \$3.1 Billion In 1976

A record \$3.1 billion was spent in Texas during 1976 by 17.2 million auto visitors from out of state, according to data released today by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Coincidentally, a new dimension regarding long-staying visitors to Texas has been developed for the first time by the Department's tourist industry analysis. The new data parallels the travel characteristics of the two distinct types of auto travel parties.

Short-term visitors, those who stayed 29 days or less, amounted to 94 per cent of all auto visitors to Texas during 1976. Long-termers who stayed 30 days or more, often called "Winter Texans," totaled less than six per cent of last year's auto visitors, but their spending topped \$800 million and accounted for 26 per cent of all

auto traveler expenditures.

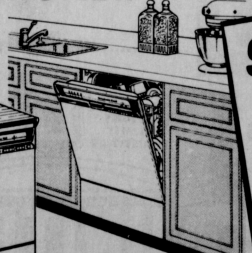
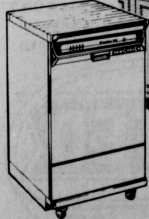
The disproportionate impact, according to the highway department, hinged on the extraordinary length of stay by Winter Texans -- nearly 85 days in the Lone Star State compared to an average of 6.68 days for their more numerous short-term counterparts.

The comparative data cites both similarities and differences between the two types of auto travelers. Short-term auto visitors averaged 2.43 persons per party; long-termers averaged 2.08 persons per party.

Among short-termers, 48 per cent cited vacationing as their primary reason for coming to Texas, with nearly that much more combining Texas pleasure trips with business motivations. Pure vacationing attracted 61 per cent of the long-termers, and much less emphasis on business considerations.

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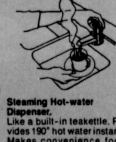
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
