The Lynx defense rose to the occasion Friday night to stop a good Panhandle team while Randy Reid stepped in for injured quarterback, Scott Sherwood, and ran for one TD, and connected on a 47 yard pass to Scot Martin setting up the Lynx second touch down.

Two key injuries hampered the Lynx throughout the game. One of them, of course, was the knee injury which Scott Sherwood sustained during practice last week, throwing back-up quarterback Reid into the team leading position on a very short notice. A new quarterback affects a team in several different ways. It takes a while for a team to become accustomed to the calling cadence of a quarterback. A football team relies heavily on precise timing, and a new calling cadence affects the team's timing in a very big way. A change in quarterbacks can also affect the team's confidence. In the game against Panhandle the Lynx did make some mistakes caused by their affected timing, but the new quarterback made a big play early in the game running 52 yards for paydirt and the Lynx offense pulled things together to put another TD on the board.

The other key injury affecting in a great way the Lynx' performance Friday was an ankle injury to Jed Miesner. The "Purple Jug" has been accustomed to having "Big Jug" in the middle of that defensive line acting on the most part as an anchor. Up until Friday night it has been almost an impossible job to move Jed out of that line, but the seriously sore ankle made the big nose guard less mobile and more easily moved. Friemel, Reneau, Whitaker, and Jones rose to the occasion, coming to the "Big Jug's" aid and solidifying the Lynx' Defense to stop the Panthers.

Indeed the Lynx displayed another mark of a great team; that mark being the ability to overcome key, serious injuries to come out with a victory against a tough team. A 14-0 score may sound close, but the Spearman-Panhandle game may have been closer than what fans realize. The general feeling prevailing in the air around Spearman last week gave one the impression that Panhandle was going to be easy. A closer scrutiny of Panhandle's team may have changed some of that general opinion. Panhandle had, and still has, a good team.

That fact coupled with the weakened condition caused by Lynx injuries mixed with another speculation that playing Spearman seems to bring the best out of any team, whether they have been considered tough or not; an indication being, that Panhandle played a little over their head; seems to have made for a very, very close game.

This coming Friday's game presents an even more interesting situation. The Lynx will have those injuries to overcome, although their timing should be improved somewhat with Randy having another week to work with his team. The River Road Wildcats won their first victory, ever, last week. Their record is very misleading. The Wildcats have a bunch of outstanding individual talent. If they can succeed in jelling that talent in the waning days of the season, they could become as tough as any team in the district as far as Friday night's game goes. They will certainly be flattered if that winning elation they experienced last week. They've tasted the fruits of victory and that coupled with the fact that playing Spearman seems to bring the best, and then some, out of

Election Set For 8

Absentee voting for the November 8 state election will continue through Nov. 4 at the County Clerk's office at Hansford County Courthouse. A check with the office Friday revealed that 4 persons had voted absentee.

Voters in the 31st Senatorial District will be voting for state senator, a spot that became vacant when Max Sherman resigned his senatorial seat to become president of West Texas State University. All other voters in the state will be voting on seven amendments to the constitution.

The senatorial race has five candidates, three Democrats and two Republicans. The Democratic candidates are Bob Simpson, Mel Phillips, Burk Whittenburg, all of Amarillo. Republican candidates are Bob Price of Pampa and James Brandon of Amarillo.

The seven Constitutional Amendments for voters include: Proposal Number One, to provide for expanding the Court of Civil Appeals from five judges to nine judges and to allow them to set in panels of three judges; Proposal Number Two deals with providing an additional \$200 million in bonds of obligations for the Veterans Land Fund and to allow surviving widows to purchase tracts under certain circumstances; Proposal Number Three deals with the changing of the law to where if a person is out on bail for a prior felony and commits another felony to deny bail under certain circumstances; Proposal Four would exempt from ad valorem taxes property designated for the preservation of cultural historical or natural history re-

sources; Number Five deals with the authorization of forming associations which would be authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from various livestock and other agricultural products; Number Six deals with giving state and national banks the right to use electronic devices or machines and sharing the cost of such devices; Number Seven would change the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State on Judicial Conduct and to make changes in its power and procedures.

Polling place are Precinct 1, Court House; Precinct 2-Renner Ranch; Precinct 3-Gruver Elevator; Precinct 4-County Agricultural Building; Gruver; Precinct 5-County Agricultural Building; Spearman; Precinct 6-Spearman High School; Precinct 7-Oslo Church; Precinct 9-Morse Community Building. Precinct 8 is absentee voting. As of Tuesday noon, 4 had voted absentee.

He has worked with President Carter since he was governor of Georgia. At the seminar Smith will discuss "Government in Agriculture."

Brown is a professional sociologist who holds three degrees from Texas A&M University. He has been associated with A&M's Agricultural Extension Service in charge of community development.

Also speaking will be book author Harold Bremeyer who wrote "Individual Freedom and the Economic Organization of Agriculture," and Economics and the Production of Markets in Agriculture." He will discuss

"The Future of Co-Ops," at the seminar.

William C. Helming, founder-owner-manager of BEEF GRAIN-CALLI market and management consultation service for all phases of livestock production will attend the seminar. He will conduct a session on "Crop and Livestock Outlook."

Finally Chicago banker and specialist in commercial loans to agri-business accounts, Bennett L. Hauerstein will conduct a session The vice-president of the First National Bank of Chicago will discuss "Agriculture Financing."

Advance registration for the seminar should be made with

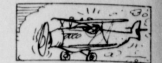


Joyce Wilson services held

He was active in the band two years, serving on the band council as a freshman. This year he is a member of the choir.

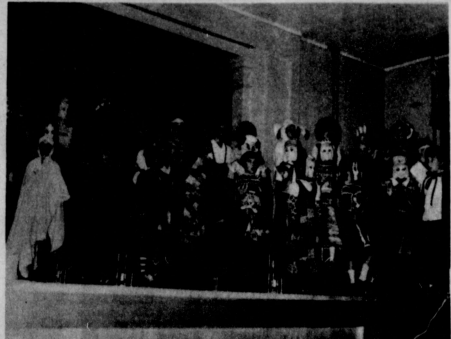

DWI Fines Assessed

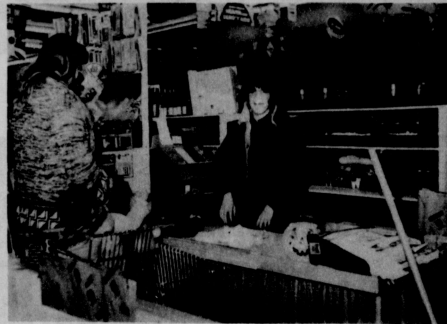

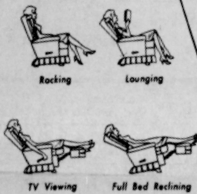
