Actually, Childress wanted to play the game on Saturday afternoon, but the Lynx officials wanted the game on Friday night. Cunningham has never lost a toss with his lucky coin! Also, Supt. Cunningham announced that the Farr Cafeteria would be open after the game to feed Lynx fans. In the past, they have opened for the Childress fans, after the game.

now on sale at the business office in Spearman; be sure and pick up your tickets before you leave for the game, as they will insure you of a good seat Friday night.

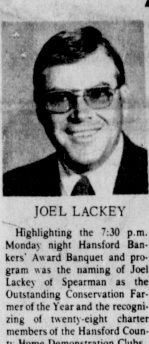

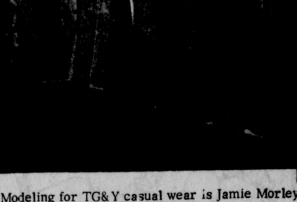
New County Agent

World Production Increases

World grain production increased by 120 million metric tons between 1972 and 1976 to a record of 1.321 billion metric tons. At the same time harvested acres increased from 675.5 to 734.7 million acres. Sixty percent of the increased production is due to added acres and 40% of the production was credited to better yields. With world population increasing at a rate of 88 million people per year, an additional 30 million metric ton increase will be needed each year to maintain our normal food level. The normal food level is figured by a 15 year average.

Farm Energy Use - 3%

The total U. S. Food System, from farm to supermarket, uses 16.5 percent of total U.S. energy consumption. However only 3% is used in "on farm" production. Of all energy used on the farm, 13% goes for irrigation. Farm agriculture also uses 17% of liquified petroleum gas.

PSU Bull Test

In pens of 5 head, Partell Herefords, Coldwater, KS, leads the Senior Bulls with a 2.91 ADG. In Junior Bulls, Phil Light, Angus, Liberal, KS, leads with two pens at 4.29 and 4.20 pounds ADG. These are followed by Kramer Herefords, Hagston, KS, at 3.41 ADG; Floyd Coen Polled Herefords of Elkhart, KS, at 3.11 ADG; and Panhandle State University with a pen of Herefords at 2.79 ADG and a pen of Angus at 2.59 ADG.

In Senior aged pens with four head each, Sell Herefords, Booker, TX, post a 3.77 ADG followed by Johnson Polled Herefords, Rolia, KS, at 3.70; Crall Herefords, Weatherford, OK, at 3.40; and Emmett Lefors, Pampa, TX, at 3.05. Junior age pens of four head were led by Blau Herefords, Ashland, KS, at 3.82; Benton and Bill Thomason, Alva, OK, at 3.68; Andrews Herefords, Olney, TX, at 3.64; Jenkins Angus, Higgins, TX, at 3.56; and Burrows Polled Herefords, Clayton, NM, at 2.37 ADG.

Top performing groups of three Junior bulls were led by Dale Coen, Elkhart, KS, at 3.62. In the senior age groups of three, Thomason Herefords posted a 4.67 ADG followed by Sager Angus, Balco, OK, at 4.10 and Diamond J Polled Herefords, Balco, OK, at 3.00 lbs. ADG.

Among individual bulls, top performance are consigned in the Senior age group by Litua Polled Herefords at 5.43 lbs. ADG and Porter Angus, Doherty, TX, at 5.43. Other top performers in the Seniors are Sell Herefords at 4.96 and 4.32; Sager Angus at 4.86 and 4.83.

Messner Herefords, Laverne, OK, at 4.79; Johnson Polled Herefords at 4.64 and 4.57; Crall Herefords at 4.21; Thomason Herefords at 4.04 and 4.00 lbs. ADG.

Junior age bulls were led by Phil Light Angus at 5.44, 4.43, 4.21, 4.11 and 4.11; Kramer Herefords at 5.04 and 3.82; J.D. 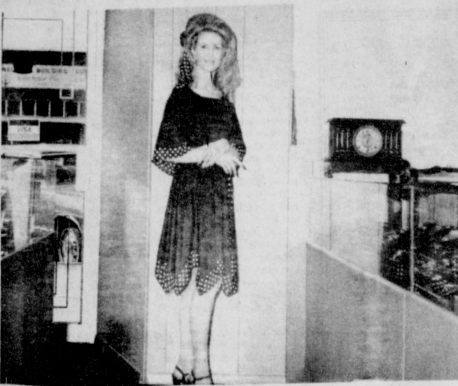

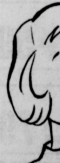

Neff is to meet with Hansford County officials to clarify the status of the proposed fire agreement with the county concerning terms of such a contractual obligation, which will include county participation in digging solid waste pits for the municipality.

Council did not oppose the use of revolving blue lights for

use on personnel vehicles of fire department and ambulance personnel for emergency use only in responding to a call and it was noted that such vehicular use will be in keeping with city traffic ordinances. A state law authorizes the use of such lights by such personnel.

Mention was made of the three Animal Husbandman Awards which were given at the Hansford County Fat Stock Show this Spring and included Kirby Hargis, Spearman FFA Boy; Ricky Thompson, Gruver FFA Boy; and Phil Orman, Hansford County 4-H Boy. Two students were sent to the Citizenship Seminar at Baylor University at Waco this summer and including Beverly Dorman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Dorman of Gruver and Misha Davidson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Davidson, also of Gruver.

Delbert McCloy presented the membership report and noted that there were 781 members at the beginning of the year with 149 new members being added to date and 713 re-newing making a total report of 862, a gain of 81 members.

Resolutions which were presented to the group for action included the National Energy Crisis: "Be it resolved whereas we need to solve the energy crisis and whereas to create a new market for farm products emphasis should be placed on production, marketing, and education the public to use fuel manufactured from farm produce."

Resolution No. 2 had to do with the Occupational Safety and Health Act and the group favored the complete repeal of this Act noting that the Farm Bureau should take the lead in an all-out effort to achieve this important objective.

Resolution No. 3 had to do with the taking of Agricultural

land and the group favored the adoption of a provision in the Texas Constitution which specifies that agricultural land shall be assessed for taxing purpose according to its productive value, leaving to the Legislature the responsibility and authority for enacting implementing statutes.

Resolution No. 4 had to do with foreign aid and it was resolved that the FB favor the phasing out of foreign aid by limiting each year's amount to 50 percent of the preceding years amount. No. 5 had to do with the Highway and the group was in favor of any future acquisition of right-of-way property be limited to what the State or County will properly maintain.

No. 6 concerned the State Highway Department and it was resolved that the Highway Department should return borrow pits to present land owners after completion of Highway and in no event longer than 3 years from time of securing consent.

No. 7 pertained to Petroleum Taxes thus, that any increase in petroleum taxes be exempt when used for farm production.

The group agreed in Resolution No. 8 that it should be unlawful for the President, Congress, or any other person or governmental group to give away any property or thing that the tax payers paid for, without their voting approval.

Resolution No. 9 had to do with Estate Inheritance Taxes and the group believed that identifiable inherited property, which is inherited for the second time within five years, should have some tax credit from the previous taxes paid.

Bureau will be attending their 44th annual convention in Houston November 28th at which time they will act on many of the resolutions which have been put forth in the local units. Policies to guide the TFB and recommendations on national policies will be adopted during the convention at which the current president Carroll Chapouka of Dalhart, will preside. New officers will be elected at this meeting to which more than 1,000 state farmers are expected.

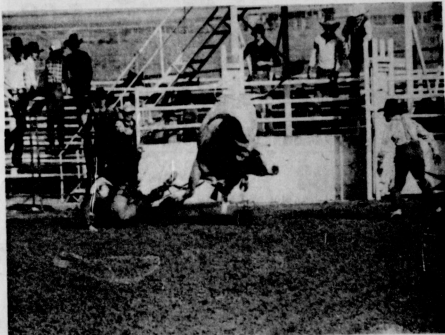
