County Sets New Salary Schedule

Hightower To Be Here

Hansford County Commissioners meeting in regular session Jan. 9 at the courthouse in Spearman set salary schedules for some 36 employees and authorized attorneys for the county to appeal Cause No. 8820 styled Ruth Guntfory vs Hansford County Commissioners Court involving commissioners precincts during consideration of agenda items.

A salary schedule of a 10 per cent increase for employees making up to \$800 per month and eight per cent for those making over \$800 per month plus a slight upward adjustment in the flat mileage rate per month paid to certain employees and members of the board of commissioners was approved.

A resolution was passed putting a wind erosion law in force in the county.

A grievance board for 1978 was approved and members are in the process of being notified of their selection.

A delinquent tax roll, dating from 1939 through 1975 and containing some 2,334 items including real estate and mineral interests in Hansford County, was approved and Helen Dry, tax assessor-collector, reported that in the near future the roll will be turned over to a legal firm for collection purposes. In the meantime, if inquiry at the tax office reveals a listing on the tax rolls which can be cleared before it is turned over for collection, the office in the courthouse will advise.

In other action, minutes of the last meeting were read and accepted, the treasurer's report





Sheriff Makes 1977 Report

Hansford County Sheriff R. L. McFarlin Monday, Jan. 9, filed his report of activities for calendar year 1977 with Hansford County Commissioners in which he reported the recovery of \$7,624.65 in property and cash and taking into custody a total of 253 persons with 114 of those booked into the county jail.

Of the property and cash recovered, \$7,263.25 was returned to merchants and some \$2,795.64 went to the county for fees, fines and court costs paid by the check writers.

All told, the county received approximately \$30,000 during the year from criminal and civil fines and fees and other court related expenses incurred in the course of the judicial proceedings.

FB Will Grapple With Price Depressioen

HOUSTON — The American Farm Bureau Federation will grapple with problems associated with current farm price depression at its annual convention in the Houston Vivic Center Jan. 8-12.

Texas will be well represented with 15 voting delegates and input in several convention activities. Some 15,000 persons representing 2.8 million farm families in all states except Alaska and including 214,000 Texas families, are expected to attend.

Tentative resolutions prepared by a committee consisting of state presidents from recommendations coming out of state annual meetings held recently indicate the organization will take an aggressive attitude in order to compete with other industries and still make a fair profit.

Emphasis is expected to be on expanding export markets and keeping trade channels open. A strong stand can be expected on cutting costs of production and limiting government interference in farming operations.

Attention will also likely be given to the new farm bill with a view to keeping it from being administered in ways that would make farmers dependent on government payments on a continuing basis or establish a government-controlled stockpile

of agricultural commodities. In addition to being hosted by the Lone Star State, the national meeting will be heavily Texas-oriented.

The vesper service which traditionally opens the convention will feature Dr. John C. Stephens, president of Abilene Christian University, as speaker and the ACU A Capella Chorus. Gov. Dolph Briscoe will extend greetings from the state at the opening general session.

Baylor University Head Football Coach Grant Teaff will speak at the Organization Conference, one of several special conferences to be held Jan. 9. The Organization Conference will be chaired by TFB President Carrol Chaloupka.

TFB Executive Director Warren Newberry will speak at the Swine Conference.

Texas Farm Bureau will have representatives in several youth activities. They include Bob Gruner of Canyon who will participate in the Discussion Meet, Elizabeth LePort of Gonzales in the Talent Find, and Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Lford of Albert (Gillespie County) in the Outstanding Young Farmer Awards Program. Miss Judy Edmondson of Mathis, the new TFB queen, will be presented along with other state queens and beauties during some con-


vention activity. Several A&M University and Extension specialists will participate in special conferences, as will Dr. Charles W. Jarvis of San Marcos.

Our Heritage of Faith

notes from Faith Lutheran Church

After the letdown of the enthusiasm of Christmas, in the midst of the cold of winter, with no end presently in sight for the farmer's strike, and so facing an uncertain future, the Larry Jones Crusade is a good time for us to hear a message proclaimed to us that life does not consist of only our daily concerns, but that true peace, joy, and hope is found in Jesus Christ and in knowing what He has done for us.

But a word needs to be said here concerning the reason that Faith has not been actively supporting the Larry Jones Crusade before this time. This Crusade will indeed do some good for Spearman and especially for some individuals. But such a Crusade and revivals in general do not agree with our Lutheran Theology and with our understanding of evangelism.

Salvation is God's act which He won for us through the death and resurrection of Jesus. The Holy Spirit works in a variety of ways to make this act of Jesus a reality in individual lives. We cannot control the working of the Spirit. We cannot turn the Spirit on or off, nor can we know just how He works. This means that not everyone can know just when or how they came to faith. The time or place is not important. What is important is that we do have faith.

The Lutheran Church believes that altar calls are an inappropriate and improper way to express our faith. We do not come to God, nor do we make a decision for God. The uniqueness of the Christian faith is that it is God who makes a decision for us, and it is God who comes to us. He makes us His children. Salvation does not rest on our last decision for Christ or anything which we have done, but salvation rests on God and what He has done for us, the death and resurrection of Christ and the Holy Spirit creating new life and understanding within us.

Our Christian life then needs to be lived in the context of a church. We need the support of others, to worship with them, and through the Word and Sacraments to be strengthened in our faith and life. The Church then is to reach out to others, ministering to them and announcing the Word of God that others too may become followers of Jesus, children of God. Such evangelism needs to come out of the life of the church and not from crusades specialized in helping people make a decision for Jesus.

We at Faith Lutheran do not wish to discourage anyone from attending the Larry Jones Crusade or from making use of this opportunity we have to hear God's Word proclaimed. But we want to emphasize the point that this crusade or any revival cannot be the sole content of anyone's faith or Christian life. Salvation is God's act so we need to be in constant contact with God's Word and the sacraments through regular attendance at church. Everyone is always welcomed at Faith. Our regular morning worship is at 9:30, Sunday School follows at 10:30, and we have a Bible Study meeting now on Sunday night at 7:00.

She also pointed out that exemptions being claimed by veterans for 1978 should be brought to her office immediately upon receipt of VA Form 21-832-1 by the veteran. The forms are available from the VA office in Waco, Texas.


