## Top-notch animals to be exhibited at Jr. Livestock Show

Midst a kaleidoscope of Hansford County's youthful exhibitors, judges, officials, top notch stock, buyers, friends and relatives, and visitors to the 1978 edition of the two day Hansford County Junior Livestock Show and Sale will be at the arena scene at the Gruver County Barn beginning Friday, March 17th with the all-important auction and awards program slated for Saturday night.

With 152 youth from throughout the County exhibiting stock this year, the 1978 Show promises to be one of the biggest and best with representatives from the Gruver and Spearman FFA, and 4-H members from Gruver, Spearman and Morse listed as exhibitors.

The two program will include the Grand Opening of the show at 1:45 P.M. Friday with all Show Directors, Ag Teachers, Herman Boone and Bert Williams from Spearman, and Alan Oram and Burton from Gruver; County Agent Garland Stewart; Gruver FFA President Randie Reid, 4-H Club Chairman, Halce Reed, Gruver FFA Sweetheart, Kelly Hart and Spearman FFA Sweetheart, (both of whom will present the ribbons and trophies during the show), all present to set the stage for the 1978 Hansford County Junior Stock Show.

The Lamb Show will begin at 2:00 P.M. Friday with the Swine Show to follow completion of the Lamb Show. Kenneth Woodard of Goodwell, Oklahoma, will be the judge for the lambs and Robert Skages of Pampa will judge the Swine.

Practising for the Swine and Lambs will be from 8:00 A.M. to 10:00 A.M. Friday and from 10:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon Friday for the Steers.

Judging of the Steers will begin at 10:00 A.M. Saturday with registration of Livestock Judging Contestants starting at 1:30 P.M. to 2:00 P.M. The Livestock Judging contest with Ronald Goode of Clarendon serving as Steer Show Judge will be at 2:00 P.M.

The Auction will begin at 6:00 P.M. with the presentation of the Livestock Judging awards; Showmanship Trophies; and the Top Gaining Awards being made. Immediately following the presentation of awards the auction sale of lambs, swine, and steers will begin with the stock selling in the order of one lamb, one swine, one steer, etc.

## Eleven leave for Washington

Eleven farmers, including those wives, left for Washington at 8:40 p.m. Tuesday evening. Those going to Washington for a giant American Ag rally are: Hazel and Earl Taylor; Quinn and Roy Dale Underwood; Ted and Sonja Godfrey; Vernetta and T. O. Lesly; R. C. Porter, Burton Schubert, and Jerry Gee.

Purpose of the meeting is to keep pressure on our Washington people to get a farm bill that our local community can survive with.

Latest cost stated that irrigated wheat now figures costs \$4.72 per bushel to produce; and dryland wheat cost is \$3.39.

This will require new equipment to handle the paperwork.

The low bid was one of two submitted by local firms and the other bid was for \$24,405. Precinct 3 funds will be used to pay for the tractor, County Judge Johnnie C. Lee noted in making the announcement.

In other agenda item action, three members of the Hansford Hospital District Board was re-appointed: Wayman Edwards and Jimmie Vernon of Spearman and Richie Fletcher of Gruver were named to two-year terms.

Amelia Johnson, recently hired as an employee in the office of the County Clerk, was formally deputized at the session on Monday.

Commissioners read the minutes of the last meeting, approved and received them, received the Treasurer's report for last month and approved the payment of claims as presented.

## Nematodes Destructive

Nematodes, tiny microscopic creatures that look like worms, may be the unseen cause to those dying garden plants, says Garland Stewart, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

So, if you've had problems with nematodes in your garden, now is the time to take action—by chemical control and ordering seeds of resistant vegetable varieties.

The root knot nematode is the most common underground pest in the home garden. Signs of nematode infestation include yellowing leaves, or more commonly, hardened galls or knots in the root system. It is estimated that 40 percent of the gardens in Texas are

infected with nematodes. Tomatoes, beans, squash, okra, peas, peppers and cantaloupe are the primary victims of these pests, points out Stewart.

The nematode damages a plant when it inserts a hollow stylet, resembling a hypodermic syringe, into the plant and feeds off the cell sap.

Punctures may be repeated several thousand times while a nematode feeds. Galls formed along the root system result from enzymes secreted in the plant cell while nematodes feed. Planting resistant varieties of tomatoes and peas solves the problem for these vegetables. Nematode resistant tomatoes include Big Set, Bonus, Terrific, Small Fry and Better Boy.

Mississippi Silver is a nematode resistant southern pea variety.

However, the cure for most other vegetables relies on chemical controls. The liquid material, Yagum, effectively controls nematodes. But it must be used with sufficient amounts of water and should be

applied only when the soil temperature at the 6-inch depth rises above 55 degrees F. The soil should be treated at least a month before planting time so as to avoid damage to plants.

## Ken Medema Will Perform Here

Ken Medema, nationally-known Christian concert singer and recording artist will be performing at First Christian Church on March 19 (Palm Sunday) at 7:30 p.m. A nursery will be provided. Ken who has been blind since birth, has been writing and singing his own songs since 1970 when he began composing original material for his work as a music therapist. Since that time, his contemporary music has carried him to many churches, civic organizations and youth groups throughout the United States and Canada. His repertoire includes a wide range of musical styles from new arrangements of great American folk hymns to current popular music to traditional oratorios. Ken's original music incorporates folk, rock, and classical styles with Biblical, honest, straightforward, sometimes humorous lyrics. He says what we Christians need to hear without mincing words or side-stepping issues and yet with the love of Christ radiating through him toward everyone whom he admires. Much of Ken's music is derived directly from a particular passage of scripture. You will find yourself reading a Bible passage (for instance, the Pharisee and the publican) and humming Ken's corresponding song ("Mister Simon"). Ken received a solid religious background, both at home and through his church in Grand Rapids, Michigan but it was not until he was in college that he personally committed his life to Christ. There at Michigan State University he met Jane Ann Smith who led Ken to understand the meaning of Christian discipleship. After Ken's graduation and the completion of his clinical training (Jane was teaching), Ken and Jane were married and moved to Ft. Wayne, Indiana where they worked together as Activity Therapists with multi-handicapped patients. They spent two years at the Ft. Wayne State Hospital and Training Center. In 1967, they returned to Michigan State University for graduate study. Between the two of them they juggled three graduate assistantships, several part-time jobs, two class schedules, homework, and the responsibilities of caring for a new baby boy. Jane's master's degree is in Music Education. Ken's master's degree is in Music Therapy and applied voice. He then served as Director of Music and Creative Art Therapies at Essex County Hospital Center in Cedar Grove, New Jersey for three years. He is now involved in a fulltime singing career and Jane is attending Union Theological Seminary in New York.

### Rooney and Buttons Star Together for the First Time In "Pete's Dragon"

Mickey Rooney and Red Buttons appear together for the first time on the silver screen in Walt Disney Productions' "Pete's Dragon," a musical fantasy combining live action and animation.

"Pete's Dragon" opened Wednesday, March 15. The only time the veteran performers ever worked together before was in 1945 entering the armed forces in Europe.

"I took a long time to get back together," Buttons said on the backstage at Disney studio, where a western street had been reformed into a New England fishing village at the turn of the century. "Mickey and I were close friends, though. I was with him the night his first son was born. I never anyone get so drunk in my life. Not today. The baby."

### Social Security News

If you worked and earned \$3,000 in 1977 and also received some social security benefits for 1977, then you are required to report your earnings to the Social Security Administration before April 15, 1978 according to Howard Weatherly, manager of the Pampa Social Security Office.

Even if a person files an income tax return, he must still file a report of his earnings with Social Security before April 15, 1978 or he could be subject to a penalty up to one full month's benefit and in some cases even more.

This report is called the Annual Report and it is a report made to Social Security separate from any made to Internal Revenue.

Also it is very important for a person to estimate what his earnings will be for 1978 so we may withhold his benefits while he is working.

Social Security will withhold \$1.00 in benefits for every \$2.00 earned over \$3,240 in 1978 for people under age 65 in 1978. Congress has just recently increased the amount not subject to any deductions to \$4,000 in 1978 for people who are over 65 or will be age 65 in 1978.

Weatherly stated, "It is extremely important that a person report his exact earnings in 1977 before April 15, 1978 and also give an estimate of his earnings for 1978. Of course, if a person earned less than \$3,000 in 1977, no report is required."

LUBBOCK—Homemakers, students, and anyone who likes sew can take part in a new feature of the South Plains area of the Department of Clothing and Textiles, Texas Tech University; Kay Caddell, Textile Research Center, Texas Tech; and Catherine Crawford, Linda Pittman, Debra Salley, Georgia Doherty and Mildred Patterson, all of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University system.

Each complete ensemble must be made from fabrics which are at least 50 percent cotton, or 50 percent wool, or wool and mohair comprising 50 percent or more of the fabric. Accessories such as blouses, trims and inner construction fabrics are excluded from this requirement.

Each ensemble must be made and modeled by the contestant, Mrs. Culp noted. Contestants may enter only one ensemble, and it must be worn to be entered.

Ensembles entered in the competition must have been

made during the last six months preceding the contest.

The entries will be judged on construction as it affects the overall appearance, compatibility of fabric and design, quality of work, creativity, overall appearance, accessories, becomingness, fit, poise, and representation of current fashion trend.

A panel of judges will determine first, second and third place winners in each of the three divisions, Mrs. Culp said.

## Show Commentator, Judges Announced

**LUBBOCK**—Fashions created from natural fibers by sewing enthusiasts in Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico will be modeled for the public Thursday, March 30, on the opening day of the South Plains Farm Show in the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center.

The free exhibition March 30-April 1 will showcase the most modern farm equipment and implements in the world and will feature, in addition to the fashion revue, a public forum on the economic plight of the farmer and a championship micro-mini tractor pulling contest.

One of West Texas' most popular broadcasting personalities will describe the fashion

creations and a battery of experts will judge them, with hundreds of dollars in prizes going to winners in three divisions.

Jane Prince, co-anchor of the nightly "Eyewitness News" on KCBD-TV, Channel 11, and co-host of the morning "Jeff and Jane Show" on KSEL Radio in Lubbock, will be the commentator for the Natural Fibers Fashion Revue, said Becky Culp, clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and contest chairman. The revue will begin at 2 p.m.

The judges will include two former South Plains Maids of Cotton, homemaking teachers, buyers and managers from local

fashion houses, and another TV personality, reported committee member Patricia Horridge of the department of clothing and textiles at Texas Tech University.

The revue is designed to emphasize elements of good clothing construction, home sewing and fashion, as well as the use of natural fibers, Mrs. Culp said. Entries must be made from fabrics which are at least 50 percent cotton, or 50 percent wool, or wool and mohair comprising 50 percent or more of the fabric. Accessories such as blouses, trims and inner construction fabrics are excluded from this requirement.

The competition has three divisions: junior high, senior high, and adult.

Entry forms, available from homemaking teachers, county Extension agents and implement dealers, must be completed and returned to the contest office by March 10.

Miss Prince, who will provide the fashion commentary, was graduated from Texas Tech in 1973 with a bachelorette degree in theater arts. She received a master's degree from Tech in 1977.

She has had starring roles in 14 stage productions, portraying such diverse characters as Helen of Troy in the classic "Faustus" to a Venus fly trap in the comedy, "Oh Dad... Poor Dad..."

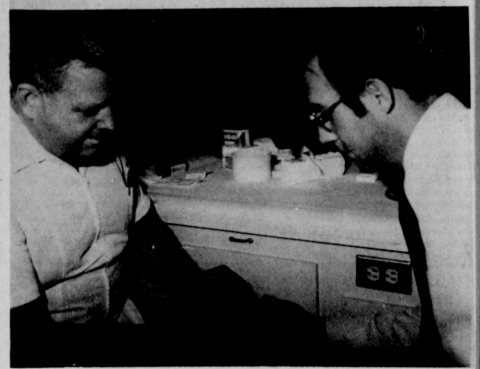

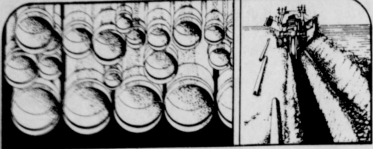

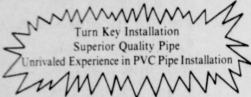

## Investment Credit Can Reduce Taxes

COLLEGE STATION—One of the most effective income management tools available to Texas farmers and ranchers is investment credit. The Tax Reform Act of 1976 extended investment credit at the 10 percent level for the years 1976 through 1980.

"If you acquired new or used depreciable property such as machinery, equipment or breeding livestock for use in your farming or ranching operation, you probably qualify for investment credit," explains Dr. Richard Trimble, economist in management with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Investment credit, like all other tax credits, reduces taxes owed dollar for dollar," says Trimble. "For example, if your tax liability is \$2,800 (line 37 of Form 1040) and the investment credit should amount to \$2,000 (line 41 of Form 1040), your tax liability will be reduced to \$800."

To qualify for investment credit, purchased property must have a useful life of at least three years, and be placed in service during the tax year. For the full purchase price to qualify for investment credit, the purchased property must have a useful life of seven or more years. If the useful life is five to seven years, only two-thirds of the purchase price to qualify for investment credit, the purchased property must have a useful life of seven or more years. If the useful life is five to seven years, only two-thirds of the purchase price is eligible for investment credit. For property with a useful life of three to five years, one-third is eligible. Property with a useful life of less than three years does not qualify for investment credit.

"In general, all tangible business property except buildings or structural components and horses will qualify for investment credit," notes Trimble. Examples of qualifying property include tractors, tractors, combines, automobiles (if used in business), power tools, fences, water wells for livestock and

poly, silos, grain bins, breeding and dairy livestock, income producing orchards and groves, and many other items.

The minimum allowable investment credit is \$25,000 plus 50 percent of your tax liability above \$25,000. The investment credit taken in any tax year may not be greater than the tax liability. However, investment credit not used the year of purchase may be carried back three years and then forward seven years. Form 3468 should be used for calculating investment credit.

"It is important to note that investment credit does not affect the amount of depreciation you can claim," explains the economist. "Any allowable depreciation method can be used, and you can use the 20 percent additional first-year depreciation if the useful life of the property is six years or more."

Trimble encourages producers with questions on this or any other phase of income taxes to call their local Internal Revenue Service office.

## PSU Freshmen Enrollment Set

High school seniors will have the first choice of summer and fall classes as Panhandle State University has its first freshman pre-enrollment April 1. Applications for pre-enrollment have already started coming in from the state area.

Students are encouraged to pre-enroll because they get a better selection of courses as well as the day and time the courses are offered. Pre-enrollment eliminates much confusion and standing in line during the regular fall enrollment.

University faculty will advise students during pre-enrollment. This allows students to be guided into courses needed for graduation. Individual attention and faculty-student relationship is strongly emphasized at Panhandle State University.

Other pre-enrollment dates scheduled this spring are April 14 and April 26. Summer pre-enrollment dates are June 8 and 19, July 8, 17, and 28, and August 24. All enrollment sessions will start at 9:30 a.m. at the Registrar's office except April 26 and it will start at 1:00 p.m.

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# Spearman Hosts Wins Annual Relays

The Spearman Lynx and Lynettes hosted the annual Lynx Relays in Spearman, Gunn, Keenan, March 10 and 11 and then proceeded to win the Boys Division, the Girls Division and the Seventh Grade competition in the Girls Junior High Division in the 1978 competition held under less than favorable weather conditions.

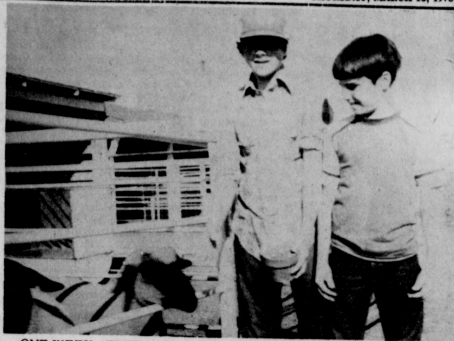
