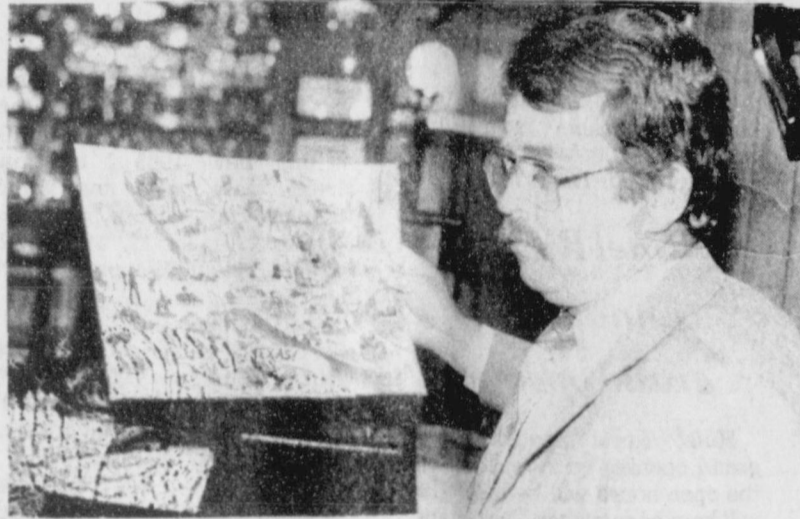

Albert Graves along with three members of the Sesquicentennial Committee gave the program at Rotary Monday, July 22. Helen Boyd, Janie Kunselman and Ruby Jo Wilbanks discussed all the plans for the 1986 Sesquicentennial celebration planned for Hansford County.

Albert Graves released the following agenda beginning in 1986.

January 11, 1986: Spearman, Stationmaster's House Museum Tour. 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. - review the History of Hansford County.

February 15, 1986: Spearman, Sesquicentennial Old Fiddler's and Musical Contest. County wide Old Fiddler's and Musical contest involving old and young.

March 5, 1986: Spearman, Spearman Reporter Tour. To view the Hansford, Spearman and Gruver newspapers that have been published each decade on March 3.

March 22, 1986: Hansford County, tour of our states most important resource: WATER. Tour of hand dug wells, wind mills, irrigation wells, and the new Palo Duro Dam (under construction).

Deana will be showing her mare,

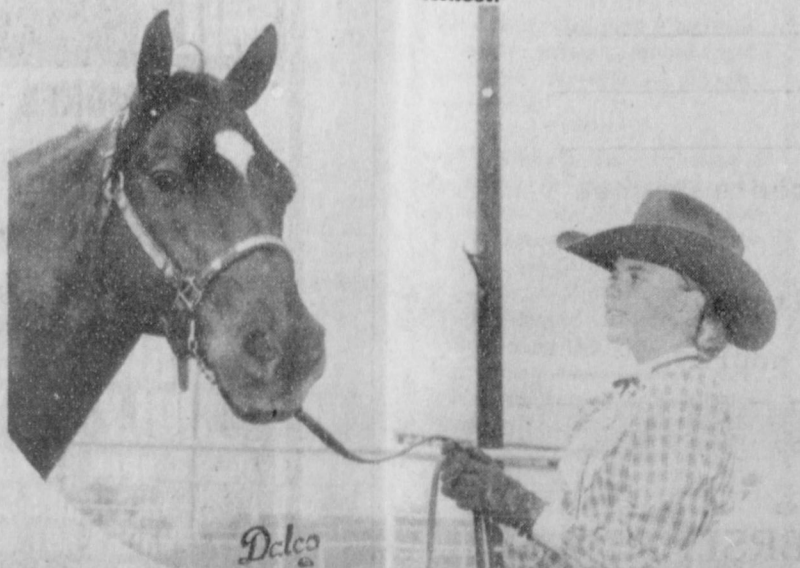
Jack Ginger Glow in showmanship and halter, western pleasure, western horsemanship, western riding and hunter-under-saddle.

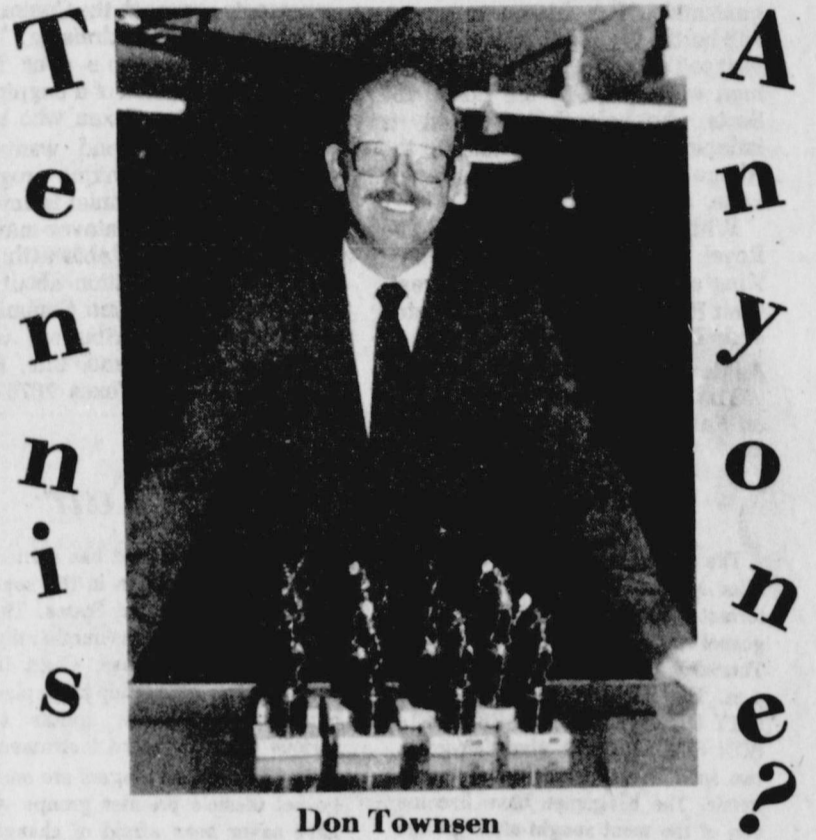
well, qualified for nationals in cutting competition because of a top-four finish in the New Mexico state rodeo.

Scottish Division to be at Alamo

AUSTIN - With banners waving and bagpipes piping, 86 members of the Scottish Division of the Royal Army of England will join thousands of Texans at the Alamo on March 6, 1986 to pay a stirring Sesquicentennial-anniversary tribute to heroes who died there on that day in 1836.

The pipers, representing three regiments of the British Army, will be sponsored by the Scotland to the Alamo Committee, an officially-sanctioned Sesquicentennial organization. The Alamo ceremony will be the highlight of a two-week visit to Texas in which the infantrymen will recognize the honor the Scots who helped Texas win its independence, said Scotland to the Alamo Committee Chairman Joe Lane.

With such colorful names as The Royal Highland Fusiliers, The King's Own Scottish Borderers, First Battalion of the Black Watch and The Argyll and Sutherland Aggie War Hymn, said Lane.

The pipers will arrive in Austin on February 28, 1986, and partici-

pate in a number of special events in the Austin area including Austin's Texas Independence Day Parade on March 2. Between March 2 and the March 6 festivities in San Antonio, they will be available to towns in the Austin-San Antonio area to enhance other local Sesquicentennial celebrations.

As large expenses are involved in bringing the bands to Texas, the Scotland to the Alamo Committee is conducting several fundraising activities. Land emphasized the grassroots approach the Committee is taking in its fundraising. "We want everyone who's ever been thrilled at the sound of a bagpipe to take part. Every Texan who loves his or her state and wants to participate in this unique program for the Sesquicentennial is invited to contribute, in whatever manner that he feels comfortable with."

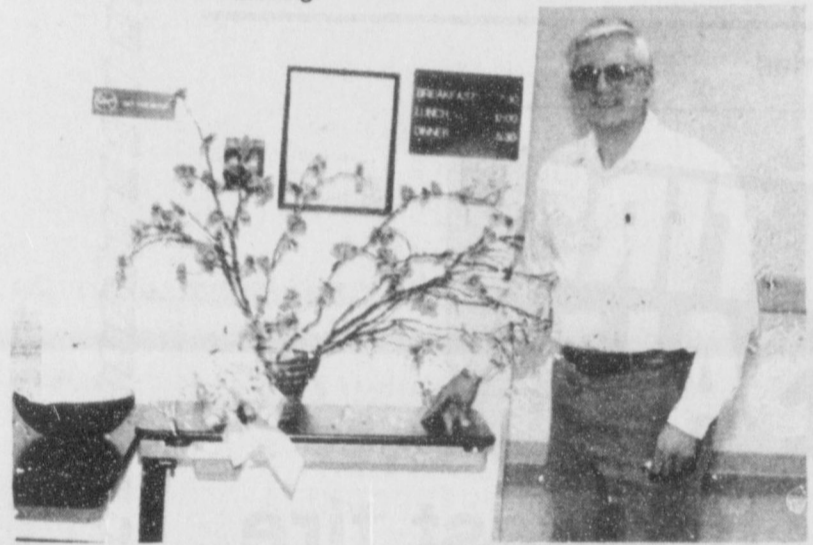

Connie Steger Attends Clinic

Connie Steger, of First United Methodist Church, Spearman, recently returned from Madison, Wisconsin, where she attended a Bethel Series Teacher Clinic.

The Bethel Series is a tool or an instrument designed to aid church members in gaining a deeper understanding of the biblical message.

Its primary objective is to aid adults in securing a knowledgeable overview of the Scriptures which would serve as a base or a springboard for an in-depth study of God's Word.

Neither a survey course nor an in-depth study, the Bethel Series simply attempts to acquaint the student with a basic understanding of both Old and New Testament narratives. It seeks to present these motifs in the clearest, most systematic manner possible so that the student begins to see the interrelationship of events and ideas within the Scriptures, and hence, gains an appreciation for the part as it relates to the whole and the whole as it relates to the part.

Along with its attempt to provide an overview of the biblical message, the Bethel Series also seeks to give the student an appreciation for interpretive principles which must be honored if the Bible is to convey a relevant message:

---It gives substantial attention to defining the radical difference between Hebrew-thought form and Western thought form, lest the student impose Greek questions upon the Bible and expect answers from the Scriptures which it is neither designed for nor prepared to give.

---It accents the necessity of seeing the various parts of the biblical message in their direct relationship to the historical context in which that message was given.

---It seeks to let Scripture interpret Scripture in those segments where there seems, at first sight, to be conflict in concept; and it demands that the part never be interpreted in isolation but always in its relationship to the whole of God's revelation in history.

The Bethel Series deliberately attempts to avoid theological jargon that belongs in the minister's study or to learned seminars. This is a course designed for lay people, taught by lay people, and geared to speak to lay people. It does not presuppose a strong theological background or understanding on the part of the student.

In classroom presentation, the Bethel Series leans toward the lecture method but does not discourage discussion. The teachers are encouraged to make judgements about the understanding and comprehension levels of their students and to permit or encourage discussion when they feel that such discussion will be meaningful and relevant to the majority of the members of the class.

To aid in the retention of what the student has learned in the study of the Bible itself, the Bethel Series makes use of a series of 40 visual aids. The aids are not "art pieces." They were neither designed nor intended to be so. They are illustrations or posters which serve to summarize a body of knowledge and which carry specific meanings that have been imposed upon them. They have no meaning apart from the purpose which they fulfill in the classrooms where they are used. Merely tools to help the student remember and retain what has been learned, they become secondary to the primary objective, which is to acquaint church members with the message of the Scriptures; and they fall further and further into the background as the study progresses.

The Yahara Center, outside of Madison, Wisconsin, was the setting for Connie's clinic. Seventy-five people from 15 states and Canada attended, representing numerous denominations.

Training lectures were led by Rev. Harley Swiggam, author and founder of the Bethel Series. Other staff assisted throughout the week with

devotionals, question and answer time, and inspirational music.

Upon her return, Mrs. Steger reported in the Sunday Morning Worship Service that she enjoyed the experience: "It was a real joy to train at the Yahara Center. I gained some new insights about the Bible and the Bethel Series. Now I feel better prepared to teach the Bible here in my church."

The intensive training phase at the local church lasts approximately two years and will be completed by six students this fall at First United Methodist Church, Spearman.

The much less intensive congregational phase will begin in October, 1985, and will be taught by local graduates of the intensive phase.

Rev. Lane Boyd, pastor, has been teaching the intensive phase locally.

Bridge construction underway

AMARILLO-- Construction work is underway on the southbound State Highway 136 Canadian River bridge three miles north of Borger. The southbound bridge deck will be reconstructed and widened under a \$1,958,722 contract awarded in April by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission to Heavy-Highway Constructors, Inc., of Amarillo and Washburn. While the widening and reconstruction work is progressing, SH 136 traffic will be carried on the northbound bridge only one lane in each direction separated by a concrete median barrier. Jay L. Hawley, Jr. of Borger, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation Resident Engineer, said the detour will be in effect until the work is completed

about mid or late summer of 1986. Hawley said the deck, or riding surface, of the southbound bridge was built in 1950 and has deteriorated because of winter freeze-thaw cycles, the use of deicing chemicals during winter storms and because of heavy truck traffic from area oil and agricultural business. The existing deck will be removed. A new and wider concrete bridge deck will be poured supported by an additional row of columns. The existing deck is narrower than the approach roadways and the new and wider riding surface will then better align with the highway approach to the bridge. Hawley is asking for the patience and cooperation of Borger area motorists while the reconstruction work is underway.

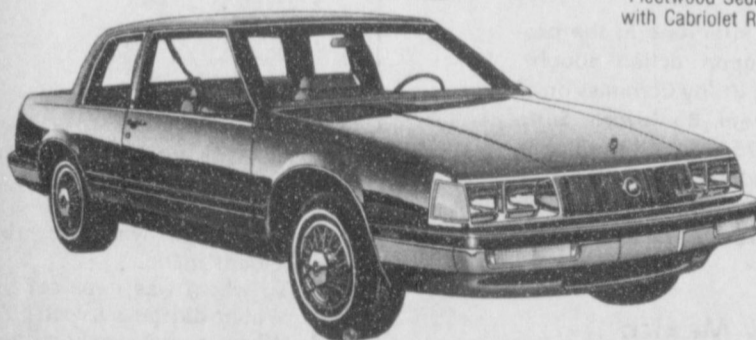

Toll free line for referendum

Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board has provided a toll-free phone line for the benefit of sorghum farmers who have questions about the forthcoming grain sorghum checkoff referendum. The number, 1-800-692-4169, will be in operation from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, July 17 to August 15.

Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board (TGSPPB) is conducting a statewide referendum on the proposition that grain sorghum may be assessed up to one cent per hundredweight to finance grain sorghum promotion and market development. The program is voluntary. Producers who do not wish to participate will request and promptly receive a refund.

A grain sorghum checkoff program already exists in twenty-nine counties of the Texas High Plains. Sorghum farmers in those counties established TGSPPB in a 1969 referendum which approved an automatic assessment of a nickel per ton (one-fourth cent per hundredweight). Farmers in the 29-county area already included in TGSPPB, will vote on a referendum allowing the farmer-elected board to set the assessment at any amount up to, but not over, one cent per cwt. to make their assessment consistent with that being considered by the rest of the state.

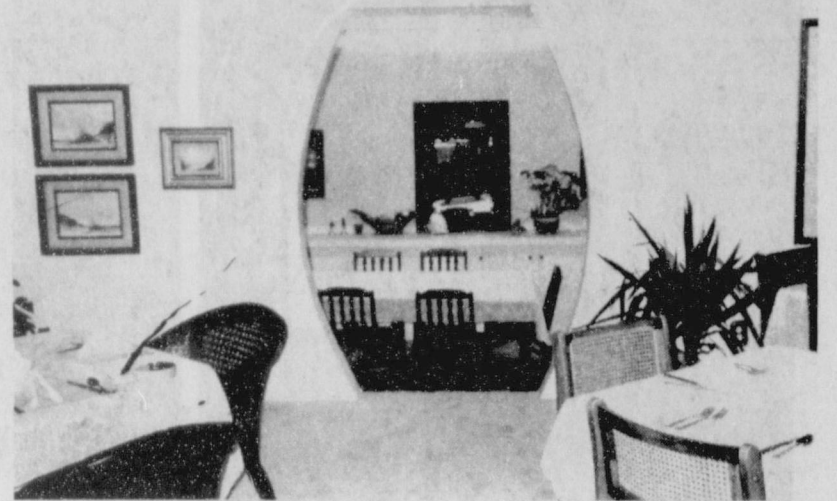
