## Mrs. Smith Hosts To Delphinium Club

The Delphinium Club met Oct. 10th in the home of Mrs. C. W. Smith, with Mrs. Vester Hill, President, presiding over the meeting. Members answered Roll Call with their own personal experience with Acid and Alkaline Soil.

Mrs. Walter Wilmet's special polyantha won the specimen vote for the meeting. Awards were made for the year with Mrs. E. N. Richardson winning the Beacon Vase for Arrangements and Mrs. Walter Wilmet winning the Blue Bottle Vase for Specimens.

Mrs. C. A. Gibson gave a very instructive lesson on the topic "Plants for Acid and Alkaline Soils." She explained PH means the degree of Acid and Alkaline condition of the soil, with 7.0 PH being neutral. A test of below 7.0 means an acid soil, while a test above means alkaline.

Scor plants means water clogged with poor drainage and sweet soil means alkaline. Acid clover food elements to make it absorbed by the plants. Members were advised to either purchase soil testing kits or to take samples of their soil to the County agent for testing. To alkalize the soil and raise the PH one point, 2 to 3 pounds of Calcium Hydroxide was suggested per 100 feet. Sandy soil does not need as much neutralizer as a clay soil. Test again after 2 to 3 weeks.

To make an alkaline soil acid, use 1 to 2 pounds of Sulphur to 100 square feet. Test soil again after 6 to 8 weeks. Always work the Sulphur into the soil instead of washing it into the soil. Iron Sulphate is not as permanent as the Sulphur but will renew the color of plants and can be washed into the soil. To color a plant's blossoms blue, use Alum Sulphate following the instructions for amounts to be used. Mrs. Gibson listed the following Acid loving plants: Azalea, Rhododendron, Dogwood and Winterberry. Plants preferring Alkaline soil were listed as Red Bud, Hydrangea, Beauty Bush, Golden Rain Tree, Honeysuckle, Philadelphus, and Spring.

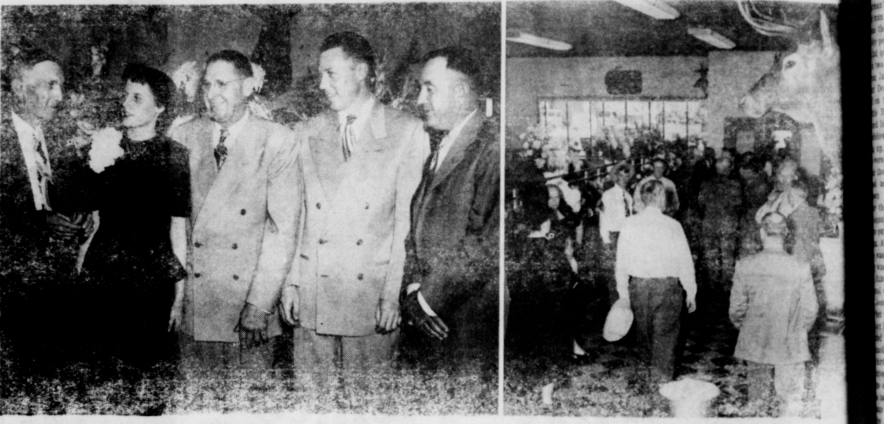

**Cross-Eyes**  
A cross-eyed condition is not always easily recognized. If neglected, it may cause loss of vision in the out-of-line eye. For this eye is likely to be used less and less until, in many cases, it becomes blind. Then it may require its normal position.

**Canton**  
Canton was a focus of action in the Opium war. Afterward it was one of the first "Treaty Ports," where the extra-territorial privileges granted then to British and other western powers were maintained until after World War II.

**Birds' Eyelids**  
Birds have two sets of eyelids—one opaque and the other transparent. The transparent set helps prevent collisions, as it allows them to blink while flying without blinking out their vision.

**Precipitation**  
Average annual precipitation in Illinois varies from 30.77 inches at Morris to 47.43 inches at Anna. In 1948 Carbondale had 74.5 inches, and in 1887 Pontiac had only 16.5 inches. These are the greatest and the least annual amounts on record in the state.

**Tender Steaks**  
Broiling is the best method of preparing the tender steaks. The meat should be placed in the broiler on the surface of one-inch steaks at about two inches from the heat and two-inch steaks about three inches from the heat.

**Poet Standards**  
Ten years ago we accepted three-pound chickens at 12 weeks of age with 12 pounds of feed as good performance. Today, four pounds at 12 pounds of feed is standard for many poultry growers.

**Peanut Oil**

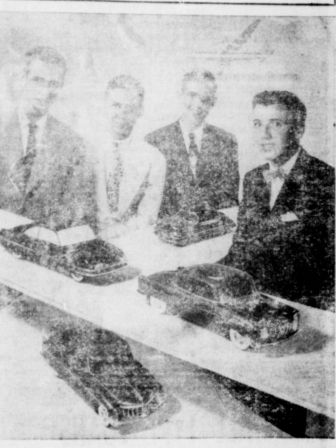
