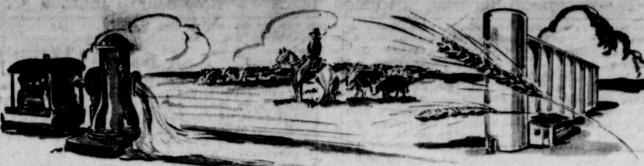

The visitors were headed by H. H. Haight, Water Facilities Specialist from Washington, D. C. Accompanying Mr. Haight were Chas M. Richter, Water Facilities expert from Dallas, Texas, and Wm. When the tour of inspection was completed Mr. Haight stated that loans would be approved or disapproved within a weeks time if the title of the land was clear. These loans would be under the classification of those approved by the Amarillo and Dallas offices. Other loans that would have to be cleared at Washington D. C., would require probably an additional weeks time.

Haight stated to a representative of this newspaper that the government officials had instructed his office to process loans as rapidly as possible, and if the present staff was not sufficient more help would be made available.

While no comment was made by the visitors, they were evidently astonished that Hansford county would seek approval of this class of government loans, and yet they find only one application for such a loan on file in the Perryton office. One of the officials did say that the government could not make loans without applications.

Roy Reed Gets MIG-15!

Fifth Air Force, Korea—Major Roy L. Reed of Spearman, Texas, a U. S. Marine Corps exchange pilot flying P-8 Sabers with the U. S. Air Force 51st. Fighter Interceptor Wing in Korea, shot down a MIG-15 Tuesday, April 7. It was the first time that Major Reed has scored against the Russian-built jet fighters and he made his "kill" on a day when Sabers jet pilots shot down two MIGs, probably destroyed one and damaged

seven others. Since the start of the Korean war Far East Air Forces aircraft have destroyed 618 of these sweep-wing enemy jets. Major Reed's wife lives at 814 E. Catalina, Santa Anna, Calif. His mother, Mrs. Pearl C. Reed lives in Spearman.

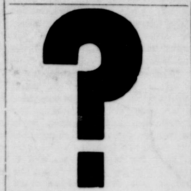

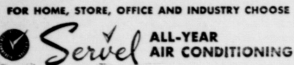

Board Members Polled On School Legislation

More than 540 local school board members in over a hundred local school districts throughout the state have recently expressed themselves on several major proposals relating to teachers' salaries, local taxrate ceiling, local share versus state share of the cost of the Minimum Foundation Program, teacher certification, and the economic index formula. James A. Redmond, President of the Texas Association of School Boards and President of the Beaumont Board of Education, released the results of the poll this week, following a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Texas Association of School Boards in Austin.

The poll was conducted by a committee of the state association of school boards. The entire membership of the association, which includes fifteen county boards of education and 322 of the state's 930 independent school district boards, were asked to indicate their reactions to the proposals summarized below. The reaction of the 543 board members who replied are indicated after each proposition.

1. The legislative proposal to increase the minimum salary for beginning teachers with Bachelor's Degrees to \$2000 per year, with corresponding (across-the-board) increases in each position on the state salary schedule for teachers.

Definitely favor \$3000 minimum	67%
Favor modified increase	28%
Definitely oppose	5%

When the above responses are classified according to the population of the districts represented by the board members, there is very little difference in the preference expressed by board members in districts having small, average, or large populations.

2. The legislative proposal to permit an increase in the local taxrate ceiling for school purposes to \$2.00, including a maximum of 75¢ for bond purposes.

Definitely favor ceiling increase	51%
Favor a modification	24%
Definitely oppose	24%

Again there is general agreement among the smaller and larger districts of the state, with 55% of the board members in the smaller districts favoring the higher ceiling and 55% of those in larger districts favoring the increase.

3. The legislative proposal that the local districts bear, collectively, 25% of the total cost of the Minimum Foundation Program, as opposed to the \$45,000,000 amount which the local districts have been providing and which amount is to about 21% of the current cost of the Foundation Program.

Definitely favor 25% basis	23%
Undecided	21%
Definitely oppose	57%

In terms of district population, it appears that the smaller districts are more strongly opposed (62% of them) than are the larger districts (39%) to increase the local fund assignment from \$45,000,000 to 25%.

4. The legislative proposal to require four years of college training for a provisional teachers certificate and five years for a permanent certificate.

Definitely favor	68%
Undecided	12%
Definitely oppose	20%

On this proposal the smaller and larger districts seem to agree 78% and 82% respectively favor it. However, only 52% of the medium-sized districts favor the proposal, 30% oppose it, and 18% are undecided.

5. The proposal to figure the Economic Index on a Three-year or four-year sliding average instead of on a single-year basis as at present.

Definitely favor	81%
Undecided	8%
Definitely oppose	11%

On this proposal there is very little difference of opinion as far as size of district is concerned. The Texas Association of School Boards releases these further facts pertaining to conditions confronting the schools of Texas:

a. 90% of all schools in the state have some personnel who are paid above the state minimum salary schedule.

b. Of the 2253 school districts in the state, fewer than 1000 are Independent School Districts; most of the remainder are Common School Districts.

c. Of the 1000 Independent School Districts, 50% pay all their personnel more than the state minimum schedule, using funds which could otherwise be used to enrich their school programs.

d. Five per cent of the 1000 Common School districts pay their personnel more than the state minimum schedule.

e. There are more than 5000 non-degree teachers who do not meet accreditation standards in the public schools of Texas today.

f. There are more than 3000 unutilized teaching positions in Texas schools today.

g. Certain areas of Texas find it especially difficult to attract a sufficient number of teachers.

h. As a result of higher basic scales and more rapid increments in other states, many Texas teachers are moving out of state.

i. As a result of normal rates of retirement, marriage, and death, 8000 vacancies will occur in Texas schools this year.

j. Texas colleges and universities will graduate only 3000 new teachers this year.

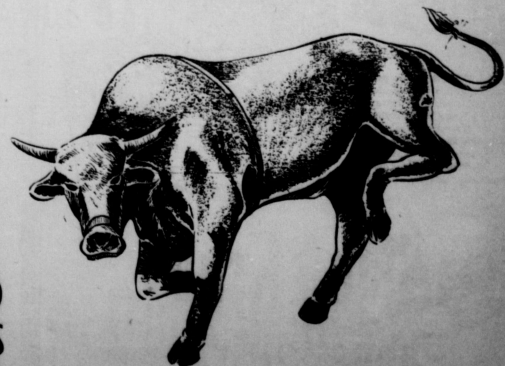

Your Senator Reports

(Senator B. Johnson, writing from Washington, gives a weekly report on happenings in the National Capital as they affect Texas and Texans.)

I am writing this before it happens, but I was scheduled to have the honor Tuesday of this week of being host at a luncheon for Carl Royal N. Baker of McKinney, who returned recently from Korea after shooting down more Communist MIG's than any other man in the world. Colonel Baker is a great Texan, a fine example of the men who stand ready to fight for our freedom.

Other guests who accepted invitations to the luncheon included

Senator Price Daniel and Texas members of the House of Representatives; our fellow-Texas Federal Security Administrator Oveta Culp Hobby and Navy Secretary Bob Anderson; Air Force Chief of Staff Hoyt Vandenberg, Senator Dick Russell of Georgia, and Senator W. Stuart Symington of Missouri.

Thirty representatives of the Brazos River Electric Co-Operative were here last Wednesday for a luncheon with Senator Daniel and me, members of the House from districts in the area served by the Co-op, and REA officials. These men, who have done so much hard work to bring the benefit of electric power to the farms and rural areas of Texas, are concerned about the future of the REA. They were disturbed by the recent forced resignation of Claude E.

Wickard, well and favorably known in Texas, as REA Administrator. They fear a crippling of the REA program.

Attended a luncheon Thursday at the White House that the President gave for French Government officials, here to discuss the Western European Army and other matters. Another Texan, Former Speaker Sam Rayburn, also was at the luncheon.

Best book on baby care I've seen is one published by the Department of Agriculture. I will be glad to send a copy free to anyone writing to my office and requesting it. . . . Secretary of State Dallas said Charles E. Bohlen is the best qualified man to be our Ambassador to Russia, and President Eisenhower said he wanted Mr. Bohlen in that position. All 15 Committee mem-

bers who heard the testimony voted to confirm his appointment and I approve.

Senator Price Daniel, known for his able leadership in the fight to get back our tidelands, decided last week that the most effective course of action would be to separate the tidelands legislation as such from the question of ownership of the continental shelf. He suggested I do what I could to help bring this about. I talked with Senator Taff, Senate majority leader, and Senator Knowland, chairman of the Republican Policy Committee, and they agreed to help get the Holland Bill out of the committee. This is the bill that would restore to Texas clear title to the submerged lands out 19 1/2 miles from the shoreline.

We Democrats did a good job in getting Senator Daniel on the Interior and Insular Affairs Committee, which is handling this legislation, and he is certainly doing a good job on the Committee.

Ernest Williams of San Angelo, secretary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, and R. W. Hodges, Del Rio, accompanied by officials of the National Sheepmen's Association, were in my office to discuss problems of the wool growers. I want to help them any way I can, as wool prices are an important matter to Texans.

Lyndon A. Keele, my first namesake, now a fine 23-year-old man living in San Angelo, was a welcome visitor at the office. He was named for me back in 1928 before I entered politics. His father and I went to school together.

Since then, a lot of Texas boys have been named for me. I am proud of every one of them and have the autographed pictures of a number hanging in my office. I feel that they are "my boys" and that I have a strong responsibility to conduct myself in such a way that they will never have cause to wish they hadn't been named for me.

Summer School For Parents Of Pre-School Deaf Children

A summer school will be held at the Texas School for the Deaf, Austin, Texas beginning May 27, and closing June 6, 1953. Actual instruction will not start until May 27, but parents and children will be expected to arrive sometime on May 26. Any parents and pre-school

deaf who are residents of the State will be potentially eligible to attend this school. Mothers who attend the same school last year, of course, will not be eligible this year, since it is assumed that they will carry on from their experience of last year. Any child who has a considerable degree of deafness is eligible to attend provided he is not over eight years of age. Preference will be given those children who will become six years of age by September of this year. However, any pre-school child is eligible. Difference in planning for age groups will make it impracticable to accept children of more than eight or nine years of age. Any seven, eight or nine year old child who may already have been in school, other than the School for the Deaf, will not be eligible.

The mother with their children will be provided room, board, and laundry, as guests of the Texas School for the Deaf during this ten day period. Each mother with her child will have a separate room in one of the dormitories during the session. Father of the boys' dormitories. The instruction and lectures will be primarily designed to aid parents in the care of their child before the child is eligible to attend school. No attempt will be made to train the parents as teachers, but to help them understand the problems and development of a young deaf child before entering school.

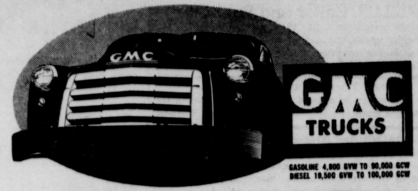
Mrs. Spencer Tracy, again, will be among those present for teaching the parents.

During the parents' stay at the school, people will be available to take care of the children while the parents are in classes. Recreation workers will be with the children to supervise their play. Attempts will be made to determine if the children attending do have any hearing present which could be utilized in the development of speech and language.

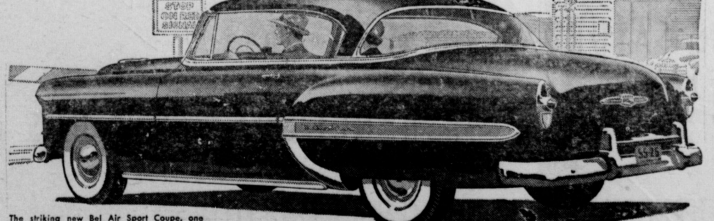

Fear Invasion Grasshoppers In Plains Area

The 4-County Agricultural Workers Council meeting at Borger Monday evening, March 23, learned from top authorities that the small native grasshopper that is often found in the range country probably will be present in great numbers this year.

John Landrum and Fred Reese of the Federal bureau of entomology division of grasshopper control, reported in a survey made last fall. They found 15 to 25 hoppers per square yard on many counts. It has been found that 17 grasshoppers to a square yard will eat 50 per cent of the grass in that area. On the same basis one could expect to lose all of his grass with a population of 25 grasshoppers per square yard.

When the rains come these pest will get busy. To avoid loss of grass in the grass country, ranchers have found the answer in aerial spraying.

State Library Convention

The Texas Library Association will hold its fortieth conference April 14-18 in Lubbock, the first state library convention ever to be held in District One.

Lamar B. Wallis, Librarian of Rosenberg Library, Galveston, and President of the Texas Library Association, states that representatives of the American Library Association, and of the Ford Foundation will be present to lend forums on the central theme of the convention—the role of the library in the community.

Representatives of the American Library Association featured on the program include David H. Clift, executive secretary of the national group, Miss Janice KKe, executive secretary of the public libraries division of the association, and Jack Spear, director of the American Heritage Project.

Robert J. Barkley, manager of the central region office of the Ford Foundation, will discuss the subject, "The Library in the Community," at the first general session.

Dr. Per G. Stensland, head of the Texas Technological College adult education program, allied with the Ford Foundation, will present a demonstration session in training leaders for group discussions.

Dr. Stensland gained recognition as an educator in both Sweden and the United States and is a trustee of the World Study Tours. He has served as a member of the program committee for the April convention. "These national leaders will study with us the problem of providing Texas with good libraries it needs. The problem is a serious one," declared Mr. Wallis. "Modern times demand that men stay informed to stay free, and the possibilities of a library as a public educator are almost limitless."

The program promises to be stimulating and informative to educators and laymen who are virtually concerned about the advancement of peace and democratic institutions.

Headquarters for the convention will be in the Hotel Lubbock.

Cotton producers are asked by Secretary of Agriculture Benson to reduce their plantings 18 percent below those of last year. A crop of from 12 to 12.5 million bales would meet the estimated domestic and export demands and leave enough surplus to take care of reserve needs.

Ammonium sulphate is in plentiful supply and readily available and is recommended as a replacement for the scarce and higher priced ammonium nitrate. A 150 pound application of ammonium sulphate will add as much nitrogen to the soil as will a 100 pound application of ammonium nitrate.

Summer growing perennial grasses went into the winter in a weakened condition and will be slow to start this spring. Give them a rest by using temporary pastures which can be planted now.

Plant at least one acre of temporary summer pasture for each animal unit on the farm.

The 14th annual meeting of the Texas Safety Association will be held at the Rice Hotel in Houston on March 20-21. The Farm and Ranch section meets at 2 p. m. on March 20.

The increased tempo of farm activities at this season also increases the chances for farm accidents. Don't let a crippling accident rob you and your family by cutting off your needed labor on the farm.

An easy reach is the nearest convenient distance between you and the items you use in certain household tasks. This distance minimizes stretching, far reaching, heavy lifting, stooping and taking unnecessary steps.

When we urge people to fight cancer, he said, "it is an appeal to actively do something about the disease that annually kills more than 220,000 Americans."

"When anyone is engaged in conflict, he strikes back and puts forth every effort to conquer the enemy. That is exactly what we are hoping everyone who reads this poster will do."

"The battle against cancer is a full-scale war with a constant need for new recruits, when hundreds of scientists seeking to learn the secrets of the disease, with thousands of doctors ready to cooperate in detection and treatment and with hundreds of thousands of doctors, the volunteer workers, carrying the educational offensive into the homes of people everywhere."

"Mrs. Fred Wegner was looking through her family Bible the other day and found an old clipping describing a farm sale list from Phosphotown, Ky., dated April 25, 1849. Lots of items could hardly be placed on a sale bill today. Some of them were: all my ox teams except Buck and Ben, Tom and Jerry; 40 gallon soap kettle; 85 sugar troughs; 2 spinning wheels; 30 pounds mutton tallow; one one 32-gal. barrel of

Johnson Miller whiskey 7 years old; 30 gallons apple brandy; one Copper still; bullet molds and powder horns; 50 gallons soft soap; 40 gallons sorghum; hams, bacon, lard; 8 fox hounds, all soft mouthed but one; At the same time I will sell my six Negro slaves—two men 35 to 50 years old; 2 boys, 12 and 18 years old. Will sell all together to same party as will not separate them. Sale begins at 8 o'clock. Plenty of good liquor to drink and plenty to eat." The farmer was leaving for Oregon territory.
