Stanley Garnett Report On Recent Waft Conference

Ezra Taft Benson, Sec. of Agriculture, called in 40 men March 2 for a wheat conference Stanley Garnett, Farm Bureau Director of District One, represented Texas. He was also one of the men asked to meet with a special committee on the commission. After resolutions after further study of the wheat situation.
Representatives were selected to discuss the wheat industry with minimum government costs and controls.

Mrs. R. E. Lee, Chairman of Education of the Hansford ACS Unit, as plans for the 1953 cancer crusade here were made. "Approximately one-third of those now die of cancer could be saved," she declared.
"To accomplish the goal of education through every possible means of reaching the public, we must have money," Mrs. Lee said. "Millions of pamphlets are distributed annually throughout the nation. Educational material is designed especially for men or for women, some in foreign languages, some designed for physicians. All are distributed free of charge."
"Motion pictures are shown before club groups, and in local theatres. Exhibits of every type are set up in public places, at county fairs, in store windows, at large conventions. This is a tremendous job which takes expense of charge."
"Educational material is poured into radio stations and newspapers," Mrs. Lee said. "Trained volunteers carry on these activities, but production and organization cost money. The goal of this immense program is to reach every man and woman in the country, and in the state it's a challenging task."

the Star Spangled Banner—and
the idea is to make all the little
children—that is, the young
generation—and the rest of us
feel that while people speak dif-
ferent languages and live in dif-
ferent parts of the world, we are
all really alike—in fact, they
speak of the "like-minded" peo-
ple.

Now this just is not so. We
are of course all human beings
with human souls equally valu-
able in the sight of the Creator.
But there are tremendous dif-
ferences amongst us and one of
the most profound of these dif-
ferences arises out of the fact
that while we are all human
beings, the rate at which we
have progressed is very, very
different. Our own people, for in-
stance—I mean the people who in-
vaded Western Europe to
America several hundred years
ago—were pretty crude and
pretty rude 2,000 years ago com-
pared with the more advanced
Greek and Italian people. They
were barbarians. When Julius
Caesar invaded England he found
the people half naked, their
bodies painted purple, living in
a very rude state of civilization.

The Celts, who went in later,
were barbarians. When Julius
of them the earlier British peo-
ple were living in an even cruder
state of civilization. It took
much more than 1,000 years—
2,000 years in fact—of long,
slow struggles upward to create
that high moral, political and
social civilization which was ul-
timately built in England.

Now if you go to Asia, you
will find people who are still
living in a very rudimentary
form of civilization—1,000 years
behind in the race. And when
you go to Africa you find a still
more primitive form of civiliza-
tion—indeed no civilization at
all in places—no even barba-
ans but savages of varying de-
grees. A lot of the trouble in
the world today comes from the
fact that very foolish people—
good people, perhaps, but foolish
people—seem to think that this
primitive and rude people can
be picked up and carried across

on the United Nations doing it.
I sincerely hope that the new
administration will get around to
dealing with this global trouble-
making before long.

Since the new administration
has come into power, we have
had a rush of plans to make
changes in the Constitution. I
think probably changes in the
method of electing presidents
seems to lead the list. All of
them ignore one of the basic
characteristics of this country.
We speak of it as the American
Republic, but actually this is a
collection or a union of 48 Ameri-
can republics. Every state in this
Union is a republic. That is the
clearly defined intention of the
Constitution. The authority to
make laws, to tax, to preserve
order in almost every phase of
life is in the state—not the
federal government. The federal
government was supposed to deal
only with our international af-
fairs and with those subjects
of local concern. The federal
government was supposed to be
made up of states—interstate
matters. The President of the
United States is supposed to be
elected not by the people, but by
the governments of the states. Each
state, in proportion to its popula-
tion, expresses its choice of who
will be President of the Union.
There is no reason in this world
—no good reason—why this prin-
ciple should be abandoned. We
need lots of reforms, but this is
not one of them, through of
course there ought to be some
reform to make party conven-
tions more civilized.

the age and transformed sud-
denly into that kind of civiliza-
tion which we know in the West.
I'm led to these observations
by a piece of news which a New
York Times correspondent pick-
ed up in Africa—in French
West Africa. French West Africa
is a vast territory conquered by
the French. A part of that ter-
ritory is known as the Ivory
Coast and the natives of the
Ivory Coast are entitled to send
representatives to the French
Parliament in Paris. Some of
these representatives is Monsieur Biaka-
Boda, a Negro native. Two years
ago this gentleman came back
to the Ivory Coast to make some
speeches to his constituents, but
has not been heard of since. And
there is some fear that he is
suspected of being home of his
constituents. No trace of his
body has been found except
some very clean bones which are
suspected of being bones of the
former senator. It seems, how-
ever, that until this is estab-
lished as a fact, it is not possible
to name another senator to suc-
ceed him, so that his constituents
are without a representative in
the French Senate. And as the
Times' correspondent wisely ob-
serves "you cannot have your
senator and eat him too." Cani-
balism is not common among
the tribes any more, but it was
only a short time ago. However,
they do still have occasional
cases of ritual murder, although it
is frowned on. And in these rit-
ual murders, the victim is killed
and portions of the flesh de-
voured.
Now in various parts of Africa,
Communists and various revo-
lutionary groups are stirring
up a great deal of trouble for
the European governments in
these places. They are trying
to force men who belong to the
20th century to live on terms of
equality with men who belong
some of them even to the 18th
century before Christ. Some of
these people are sincere in this
effort, most of them are trouble
makers. As a matter of fact, the
greatest friend these primitive
races have had in Africa is the
government of the Union of South
Africa. All you have to do is to
look at the pictures of these
primitive people as they were
50 years ago and look at them
today—their living standards,
their freedom from the cruel
customs and rules of the chiefs.
It is not too much to say that
they traversed across centuries,
but they have not traveled the
whole road yet. And until they
are not too much to say that
they are unreasonable for out-
siders, outside troublemakers
from America and the United
Nations, to meddle in this prob-
lem.
However, wherever there is a
spot in the world in which trou-
ble can be stirred up for the



Hansford County Council

The Hansford County Council of Parent-Teachers Associations was organized in Spearman on March 21, 1931. Mrs. J. M. Bull, Mrs. W. B. Lomaster, Perryton; Mrs. A. F. Barkley, Mrs. J. H. Buchanan, Mrs. Sid Clark; Spearman; Mrs. Roy Womble, Mrs. A. J. Womble, Morse; and Miss Ottilie Beck, Gruber were among the organizing officers: Mrs. Buchanan was District Extension Chairman at this time, and together with Mrs. Clark and Mrs. L. F. Nos had helped in the organization of the Oshittree County Council in January, 1931. The first officers were: President Mrs. Elmo McCellian, Gruber; Vice-president Mrs. A. F. Barkley, Spearman; Secretary Mrs. W. S. Durham, Morse; treasurer Mrs. Ida Marable, Morse. The local units making up the organization consisted of the Parent-Teachers Associations of Spearman, Gruber and Morse. This first year a school nurse was secured with the co-operation of the Red Cross. Miss Cockrell, the nurse, was assisted by Mrs. Lee Perry, a registered nurse of Spearman. The first County Council year book was used in the 1932-1933 year under the direction of Mrs. W. R. Finley, Spearman; Mrs. Durham and Mrs. Buchanan went sent as delegates to the District Conference at Panhandle. The project this year was to sponsor the Red Cross drive and the Interscholastic League in the schools. Mrs. P. A. Lyon reported the Red Cross Membership drive exceeded the drive membership program by four in 1933. Mrs. J. E. Grezes of Amarillo visited the Council this year and did much toward stimulating interest in it. Mrs. McClay, District Chairman of Standards held a school of instruction this year. Spearman started the hot lunch project and later it was taken over by the school. All unit sponsored Red Cross drive.

The programs were planned by the unit where the council met each quarter. In 1934, the Council sponsored a drive to give every child diphtheria shots. In May, 1934, Miss Yoder, Red Cross nurse, gave a statistical report on her work in the county. At the October, 1934 meeting, Mrs. J. M. Crain, 4th Vice-president of the 8th district conducted a round table discussion. This year the Council sponsored a home talent lyceum course, and continued their support of the Interscholastic League meets. In the spring 1935 meeting each unit reported on various projects including the hot lunch for children. From 190 to 140 children were fed daily at a price, per plate, of 10c. Gruber reported feeding children at 8¢ price per day per plate of 6¢ for 150 children. Mrs. W. B. Lanaster, Perryton, held the school of instructions in Mar, 1935. In the May, 1935 meeting the council voted to sponsor a move to get a home demonstration agent for Hansford County. In the October, 1935 meeting the Council decided to initiate a county wide health program. Mrs. W. M. McCloy reported the Council at the State Convention this year. In the March 1937 meeting, Mrs. Sid Clark, a district vice-president, was elected as a delegate to the district convention held in Perryton. An all day school of instruction was held at Gruber on October 4, 1938. Members from

Lipscomb and Oshittree county were there. Mrs. Hunkapillar of Pampa, district vice-president, presided. A study of undulant fever was made by the Council this year. On January 3, 1939, Judge Barkley attended the Council in connection with its efforts to secure a Red Cross nurse and announced that she would be available in March. Mrs. Sid Clark made a report on the convention held at Lubbock which she attended. The Deputy State Superintendent of Schools addressed the County Council in March, 1939. A Committee was appointed to work with the agricultural committee to stamp out undulant fever. In January, 1941 the Council contacted the State Department of Health with reference to the traveling dental clinic coming to Hansford County. Mrs. C. E. Campbell was the district delegate at the state convention at Austin this year, and in 1942 Mrs. Ralph Bort was the delegate to the district convention. In Jan. 1944, 1945 and until May 1946, the rationing of tires and gasoline prevented the Council from convening, however the dues were paid and membership sustained. Mrs. W. M. McCloy, of Morse, was elected district vice-president of the 8th district in 1947. In January, 1948, the Council held an all day school of instruction in Spearman with Mrs. J. C. Alexander, district president, from Amarillo, presiding. In January, 1949 the Council obtained a mobil unit for T. B. tests for the county, and start

ed a program of compulsory immunization for school beginners. Mrs. Ralph Randel, of Panhandle district vice-president conducted a school of instruction in Spearman on January 5, 1951. The history of the Hansford County Council is not a history of spectacular achievement, but rather of initiating movements of starting projects, then working through local units to their completion. Many of the movements started by the County Council have long since been taken over by other agencies and are now an accepted part of community activity. School Lunches, home demonstration agents, county health programs are among these. The Council ties the local units together and enables them to accomplish more by their union than they could as individual units.

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Washington News Letter by Congressman Walter Rogers

Washington, D. C. February 27, 1953

HAWAIIAN STATEHOOD: Although there has been very little progress in the Congress as a whole toward completing final action on the legislative backlog, the committee have been in almost continuous session for the past several weeks. One of the subcommittees of which I am a member has been holding the hearings on the bill that would admit Hawaii as a sister state. These committee meetings have all been open to the public and many people from various walks of life have shown a great deal of interest in this legislation. There was one group at the meeting the other day that were not primarily interested in the Hawaiian statehood, but were more interested in the mechanics of the United States Congress. These men came from Germany. The delegation was from the active body of Western Germany. The delegation consisted of Mr. Hans Trossman, Director of the Bundestag (Lower House), Mr. Albert A. Pfizner, Director of the Bundestag (Upper House), and Mr. Frederick K. O. Schramm, Assistant to the Speaker of the House. They found the proceedings most interesting and informative. At the time of their visit there was extended debates in the subcommittee concerning proposed amendments to the bill concerning the constitution that should Hawaii be admitted to statehood. One point that was discussed at length was the possibility of a tidelands controversy should Hawaii be admitted to statehood. Incidentally, I warned the representatives of Hawaii to nail down their boundaries so that there could be no question should they be admitted as a state. I called to their attention that Texas thought she had her boundaries fixed until some Federal bureaucrats decided they wanted the tidelands. During this discussion the former Attorney General of Hawaii, A. M. Taves, pointed out that there is practically no possibility of oil and gas along the shores of the Hawaii Islands because of the fact that the islands consist of volcanic ash and coral deposits. He pointed out that in the islands television beams go through the mountains, which of course indicates the lack of mineral deposits there. It also was pointed out in the hearings that should the water area between the islands be used as a constituent part of the islands, Texas might lose her place as the biggest state in the Union. The former Attorney General assured us that Hawaii would yield that position to the State of Texas.

THE TIDELANDS: You of course realize that nothing yet has been done on the tidelands bills. This legislation is presently before the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives and the Interior and Insular Affairs Committee of the Senate. Frankly, I think that these committee hearings are wasted time because this is an issue that has been more thoroughly scrutinized than perhaps any other issue in the past two decades. Lengthy committee hearings have been had in both House of Congress and the reports are available for new Members. The present administration is committed to tidelands legislation, and I personally feel that no

delay should be occasioned in returning the products that attempted legalized theft to their respective states who rightfully own them. The new Secretary of Interior stated before my committee in the House that he was for returning these tidelands to the States. He has recently been quoted in the newspapers to the effect that these tidelands should be returned to the States, but that all properties outside thereof should be decreed to be in the Federal Government, indicating that the states bordering on the ocean should have no interest in the continental shelf. I believe that Secretary McKay was in some degree misled in this statement as it is my understanding that he favored the bill that passed the House of Representatives last year. This bill not only relinquishes the tidelands strips to the states, but goes into great detail to fix interests of these states in the continental shelf. This issue has caused quite a bit of comment here and has prompted some of the news columnists to say that Texas and some of the other states now want to extend their boundaries several miles farther to the seaward. This certainly is not the case. Texas has always asked for what was rightfully hers and is not trying to encroach upon anybody. She is trying to keep from being encroached upon. Incidentally, one of the leading newspapers in the East, the Washington Post, has carried several editorials underwriting Federal ownership. Further delay in considering the matter could serve no good purpose and the bills should be brought to the floor for an immediate vote.

THE VOICE OF AMERICA: There are many people here in official Washington who have never been satisfied with the progress made by this arm of the State Department. In fact, many have constantly condemned it. The hearings in this Congress seem to be confirming a suspicion that I have long harbored, namely, that the voice is not that of Americanism, or is not. This is certainly brought in the discovery that certain passages from Edna Ferber's book, "The Giant", were used in this broadcast. The excerpts reported to have been used on the voice were to the effect that male Texans drink Bourbon by the gallon and that the women are all nitwits. Any book containing such a statement is a disgrace to America, and the broadcasting of such a statement on the Voice of America is ample ground for abolishing the Voice altogether. My objection is that many people in this world could do themselves and their country a great service if they would follow the examples that have been set by Texas, especially those of our fine women.

VISITORS: When I stepped out of the committee room the other day, I thought that Amarillo had moved to Washington, D. C. It is a pleasure to see Weldon Howell, William Q. Boyce, and Lee Bivins were all standing there to greet me. You know, they can also dissipate fog and cloud with their rain-making equipment. This comes in handy for air-craft that is fog-bound, and wants to make a landing. They simply turn on the de-fogging stuff, and it clears up long enough for them to land. Make a note of this to Mr. Krick, and tell him to check this mixture in Hansford county!

Irrigation wells are running like mad in the county. This will be the first true test of irrigation in the county, meaning that the boys will do most of their watering during the winter, and it will certainly show up in the crops this summer!

This is Girl Scout Anniversary month. Gertrude Jones is President of the Girl Scout council for Spearman, board members Vivian Rogers, Helen Fisher, Virginia Latham, and a whole host of women of Spearman and Granger. The two who deserve the most credit for girls scouting Mr. and Mrs. Bob Vaughn. They started the girl scouts in Spearman and have both worked hard in scouting work. They are fine people and showed a great deal of good common sense when they moved from south of the Canadian river, to Spearman. Our congratulations to them for starting the fine Girl Scout troop in Spearman.

I am getting the fishing fever, but since Eagle Nest dried up, have lost my zeal for the rod and reel. But then, Eagle Nest will never be the same. Understand the state has taken it over, and when the state takes something away from private ownership and control, it goes down the river. When this was a private controlled lake, the fishing was good, but, it will never be the same.

This is a good example of something or other. I guess, the state vs. private enterprise. But, let me tell you the story. Salty and many of you know him, had

all of the oppositions at Eagle Nest, and would not allow anyone to put a boat on the lake, as he had boats for hire. Many people were griped about this, but, when you went out in one

of Salty's boats, you could catch your limit of big fish. However, the state supplied the fish for the lake, so the people were allowed to bank fish all they wanted to. But, constant yammering

from the sheep herders, the bank wardens, etc., finally got the lake into the states hands, and it is a mess. Whereas, when Salty controlled the waters, there was an abundance of fishing

from his boats, or from the bank either. This same story goes on to the federal government

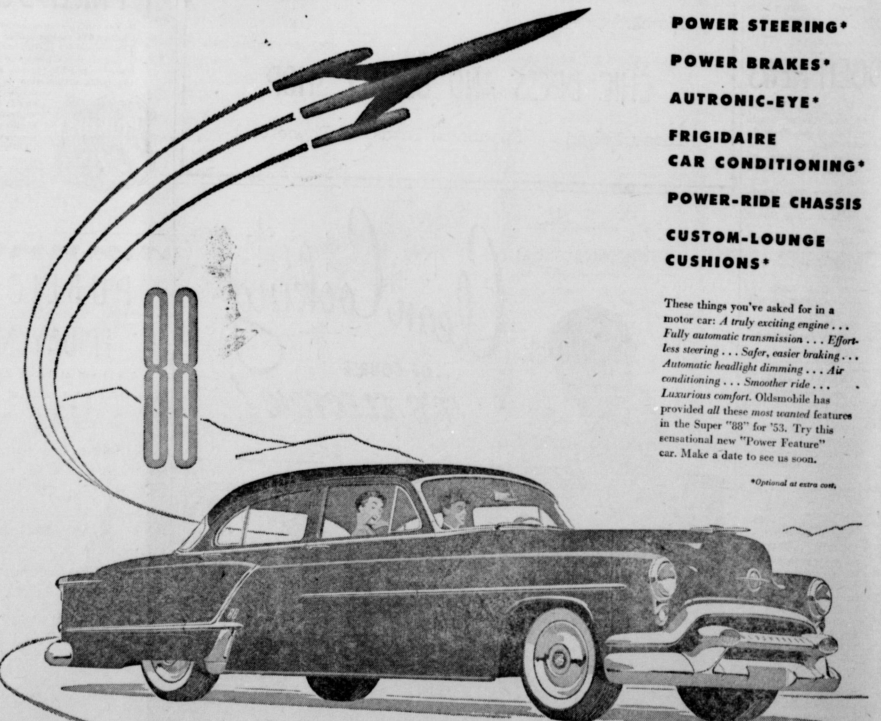

ST. PATRICK'S PIE
(Makes single crust 9" pie)

Crust:
2 cups crushed graham crackers
1/2 cup melted butter
2 tablespoons sugar

Filling:
1 package lime flavored gelatin dessert
1/2 cup hot water
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup lemon juice
1 cup undiluted Carnation, chilled for whipping
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind

Mix graham crackers, butter and sugar together. Line sides and bottom of 9-inch pie plate, saving 1/4 cup crumbs for topping. Mix gelatin, hot water, sugar and 2 tablespoons lemon juice. Stir until dissolved. Cool. Whip chilled Carnation with remaining lemon juice about 1 minute. Add cooled gelatin mixture and whip until fluffy (about 2 minutes). Fold in lemon rind. Pour into crust, and chill about one hour, or until firm. Garnish as desired.
