## Information About Drouth

THE DROUTH SITUATION: Congressman Mark of Wichita Falls, Congressman Mahon, of Lubbock, and myself called upon the Secretary of Agriculture, Ezra A. Benson, this afternoon to discuss with him the possibility of early action in meeting the requirements of the farmers and ranchers in the drouth stricken areas of the Southwest. On June 1st, the entire Panhandle of Texas was shown in the U. S. Department of Agriculture Crop Report as being an area of near failure insofar as crop prospects were concerned and in the same category insofar as pasture-fed conditions are concerned.

disaster intended by the law creating this fund. He seemed to feel that there were some things to be effected that the disaster intended was an immediate and temporary type of occurrence. We quickly briefed him on the fact that a drouth is not an immediate or temporary disaster, and that "drouth" was listed in the major disaster definitions contained in Public Law 875 of the 81st Congress, which is the law creating this fund. I wrote the President that I could not be too strongly urge early action as the situation is extremely bad and growing worse. Only recently I was discussing the problem with a newspaper friend of mine from the Panhandle who was in Washington. I asked him to tell me in exact terms just exactly how bad the situation was. He replied that if it was any place except the Panhandle of Texas, a lot of people would have already moved out. He said that one of the highest compliments that could be paid to the people there who have fought the elements of drought the years and have built one of the finest states of America in the United States today. Just the other day I expressed to the Congress my thoughts on the subject and gave them the positions that have been forwarded to my office concerning this tragedy. I told the Congress that the people in our section were asking only for fair treatment, to which they are justly entitled, and they had fought the elements for generations and had not been defeated yet, and that they could continue to win their daily battles unless their weapons were rendered important by man-made economic measures. I stated further that they could not be expected to meet the economic measures of purchasing trucks, materials, equipment and their other needs on protected markets and have to sell their products on an open market that has been ruined by drouth situation over which they had no control.

Cut Turkey Production Costs With Good Range

No phase of turkey production offers greater opportunities for cutting costs, increasing profits and growing better birds than does the proper use of range and succulent feeds. That word comes from W. J. Moore, poultry husbandman for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and he adds, the points should be moved to the range area when they are 8 to 12 weeks of age.

Contaminated water sometimes is the source of diseases which can cause mortality among the birds. Elevating the waterers on stands covered with wire is a good sanitation practice, and frequent cleaning is a must, says Moore.

High quality hay can be produced from many crops if the crops are properly fertilized, managed and harvested at the right time.

Weather, such as prevails now over the state, tests the management skills of the home gardener. Properly cultivated, irrigation and mulching are garden practices which will pay-off during dry, hot weather.

## Your Senator Reports BY Lyndon B. Johnson

**FARM BILL:** Senate last week passed the agriculture appropriations bill, voting \$716,779,000 for the Agriculture Department for the 1954 fiscal year. That's about \$20,500,000 below appropriations for the current year. The bill provides \$195,000,000 for payments to farmers carrying out soil conservation practices. The Administration had asked \$110,000,000 for this purpose.

We were able to get the lending authority of the REA for the year 1954 increased from 26 million dollars—as provided in the House bill—to 45 million. Lending authority for rural tele-

phone was raised to 67 million from the 50 million provided in the House measure. These sums will be used only for loans, not for the 1954 fiscal year. That's an excellent record of repayment.

**WHEAT PRICES:** Wheat led a sharp downturn in commodities last week. Prices tumbled to some of the lowest levels in three years.

## Hints On Pasture Management

Once a good pasture is established, management largely determines its productivity. Attention given the pasture should be equal to that given other cash crops of the farm, says E. M. Trew, pasture specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. For pastures are a cash crop.

The objective of a good pasture management program should include the use of practices that will lead to the production of good quality grazing; maintain high production and efficient use of the forage produced, says Trew.

Rotation grazing is of prime importance. Continuous grazing is often not efficient grazing for studies have been shown that frequently up to 50 percent of the forage produced is lost from trampling or is wasted because of excess production at peak periods. Grazing animals may be limited to small areas through a rotation grazing system. This will force the animals to take all the forage produced. Rotation grazing, explains the specialist,

## Summer Flowers For Winter Pleasure

You can plant annual flowers this summer for fall blooms to be dried for winter arrangements. Madia Hattfeld, home-extension specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says many adapt themselves to this treatment, but certain annuals give more color and distinctive form.

For instance, the specialist says celosia, also known as cockscomb, comes in several varieties and colors. The deep red retains much of its color after drying. Pale varieties may be tinted or sprayed to obtain brighter colors if they appear drab after drying.

Another popular flower for hot summer months is the compass or purple bachelor button or sometimes called globe amaranth. Colors range from white to orange and from pink to deep purple. You can dye the light colored plants to use in the same way strawflowers are used.

Helichrysum is another popular flower for drying. Often called strawflower because the petals seem dry and straw-like, the flower comes in many colors ranging from white to deep colors. Cut the material stem and wire to help make corsages or flower arrangements when the flower is dried. They are best picked before the blossom fully opens.

Several varieties of blue sage or salvia are native to Texas. These plants can take the hot dry summer weather and are easily dried to last for many months. Ornamental grasses such as fountain grass can be included in the landscape planting for later use.

Strawflowers, though not so well adapted to drying for winter use, will thrive in the hot sun on a minimum of water. The flowers vary from light yellow to mahogany brown. Tibbonia, sometimes known as attic daisy, is also

also permits use of the plants when they are most palatable and make regrowth between grazings and permits the plants to maintain their vigor both above and below the ground. Excess production, and there should be some during the early growing season, can be utilized for either hay or silage, says Trew.

The fencing problem can be handled, explained the specialist, by using portable electric fences if permanent ones are not feasible.

Another important phase of the pasture management program is mowing. This practice will give weed and small brush control and will keep the plants growing. If pasture plants are not mowed, says Trew, they become woody and less palatable as they approach maturity. Mowing plants during their growing season, on the other hand, causes new vegetative growth, keeps the plants tender, palatable and with a higher protein content.

Temporary or supplemental pastures have a definite place in the management program. Small

grains and legumes are excellent for fall, winter and spring. Sudan and cowpeas are tops for the summer and fall grazing seasons. Temporary pastures will provide grazing when the permanent ones are short and also makes possible rest periods for the permanent pastures. Some producers, explains Trew, use temporary pastures the year-round instead of the permanent type and actually produce more beef and milk per acre.

Finally, says Trew, the pasture management program is made easier when only the best adapted plants are used in the pasture; when adapted supplies of fertilizers—based on soil tests—are used on the pasture; and when dry hay is made available to livestock grazing on

### C. A. Gibner Chairman Of Korea Aid

C. A. Gibner has been appointed by Governor Allan Shivers to serve Hansford County as Chairman of the "Aid to Korea Week" campaign, which will be held June 25-July 2. That week has been designated as "Aid to Korea Week" in Texas, and is part of a nation-wide observance to raise \$5,000,000 in an emergency campaign to provide immediate aid to millions of displaced, sick and injured persons and orphans in Korea. All funds raised will meet immediate requirements for food, clothing, medical assistance and emergency shelter.

The national drive is sponsored by the National Korea Aid Foundation, which is headed by Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, James

A. Farley is national campaign manager. Governor Shivers asked T. E. Brainin, head of Brainin International Airways, Dallas, a director of the Foundation, to serve as organizing chairman for Texas.

In accepting the local county's chairmanship, Mr. Gibner, pointed out the great need of Korean civilians, and expressed the hope that all citizens of the county would respond generously. "There are 15,000 men, women and children in Korea who have lost an arm or leg in the years of constant warfare. There are 300,000 war widows, more than 1,000,000 orphans, and 5,000,000 displaced persons in Korea. And one person in twenty in that stricken country has tuberculosis. Yet there are only 100 beds in the entire country for treatment of patients with tuberculosis. We in this country can share something with these folk who have so little, and whose need is so great," he said.

The local county committee is being organized to conduct its part of the "Aid to Korea Week" campaign.

### Buchanan Is Speaker At Lion Club

Wilson Buchanan, Manager of the Spearman Reporter of Commerce was guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Lion Club, held Tuesday noon at the H. D. Club Rooms.

Mr. Buchanan gave a comprehensive analysis of the irrigation situation as it exists in Hansford County. He revealed that there were 68 irrigation wells in the county, and the prospects were good for more wells. Buchanan reviewed the errors made by owners, and the fact that it takes some two or three years to learn the art of proper irrigation.

The speaker urged all business men to cooperate in an effort to secure natural gas as fuel for present and prospective irrigation wells. He said the difference in cost of operation might mean the difference in breaking even and making a real profit.

### Things You Should Know About Your Local Draft Board

On a local draft board is placed the responsibility, under applicable laws and regulations, of deciding which men should be deferred because of their civilian activities.

The three categories of men considered are: (1) farmers or farm workers, (2) college or university students, and (3) men in industrial and all other civilian activity.

In the case of students, deferment until end of the school year is ordered by law. If the student is mailed an order to report for induction while he is in school satisfactorily taking a full-time course of instruction, provided he has never received such a statutory deferment before.

If the student has previously received such a deferment, then further deferment is up to the local board. The board can consider information outside the scholastic as well as scholastic information. The widely-publicized draft test for college students can be ignored by local boards under draft regulations if the board so desires. Scores on the draft test and class standing of the student are provided as information for the board.

Here are three things the board considers when it is looking at a case of possible deferment for farming or other civilian activity: (1) Is the man engaged, except for a seasonal or temporary interruption, in the activity? (2) Can he be replaced by persons with his qualifications or skills? (3) Would his removal cause a material loss of effectiveness in the activity?

In the case of farmers or farm workers, the chief question asked is: Is he employed in the production for market of a substantial quantity of agricultural commodities necessary to maintenance of national health, safety or interest?

All such deferments are for limited periods.

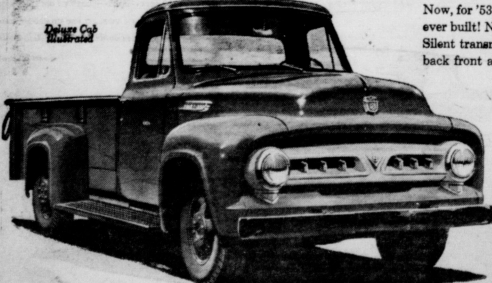

 In seeking the injunction the Attorney General contended that the furriers' union is dominated by Communists, and that Texas workers should be protected from such influences.  
 Colonel Homer Garrison Jr. denies that Texas police are not cooperating fully with Federal narcotics agents.  
 Garrison said that the Federal Narcotics Commissioner indicated that there was a lack of cooperation from state and local officers in Texas in assisting his agents in enforcement of the narcotics law.  
 Admitting that Texas officers are handicapped by lack of man-

power, materials, legislation, and money, Garrison told police convening in San Antonio that Texas officers are proud to work as a team with each other and with Federal agents. The cooperation of Texas police is excellent, Garrison concluded.  
 Also at the policeman's convention, Inspector G. C. Connor of the Texas Department of Public Safety said that three cars he saved on the highway through better driver education, enforcement of traffic laws, highway engineering, and public support of the safety principle.  
 "If we are to clear our highways of congestion, loss of life, injury to persons, and destruction of property, the program must be carried out," said Connor.  
 The Texas Supreme Court has blocked the road to justice in loan shark cases, charges Leop Green, a University of Texas law professor.  
 Green cited the case of a man and his wife who brought suit charging that certain loan companies harassed and intimidated them and threatened to get the man's job.  
 The case finally went to the supreme court, which denied the plaintiffs a cause of action, listing half a dozen legal points to support the decision.  
 Referring to this decision, Green said, "Loan sharks are now given the green light to pursue their victims with all the ruthlessness and every stratagem which they can devise."  
 Texas farmers and ranchers—as well as the State Treasury and the oil producers—stand to benefit from the 25c average increase in the well price of crude oil, says Charles E. Simons, executive vice-president of Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.  
 At the present rate of production the higher posted price for oil will mean an additional \$37,500,000 a year paid to royalty holders, farmers, ranchers and land owners.  
 This, the first price advance since 1947, will add \$250 million a year to Texas' oil income, Simons pointed out—and stimulate the research for more oil.

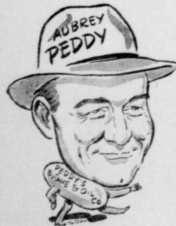

# Washington News Letter by Congressman Walter Rogers

Washington, D. C. June 12, 1953

The Racial Segregation Question. The recent decision of the Supreme Court upholding the provisions of District of Columbia laws adopted in 1872 and 1873 banning segregation in restaurants, bars, and other eating places is being hailed in many quarters as a victory over the South equal to the surrender of Lee at Appomattox Court-house at the end of the Civil War. These laws have been referred to as "District host" laws, because they were passed by the District of Columbia during a short period subsequent to the Civil War when the District had law making powers. The decision has also furnished much encouragement to the proponents of "home rule" advocates forces has increased daily since the Supreme Court released that decision. Needless to say, the Washington hotel and restaurant operators are deeply disturbed as to how to cope with this new problem. The law applies only to the District of Columbia and not to Virginia, which is just across the Potomac, nor to Maryland, which joins the District of Columbia on all other sides. One of the best hotel dining rooms, which is in the shadow of the White House, has closed its doors. The story is going around Washington that immediately af-

ter the announcement of the Supreme Court decision, a large group of negroes requested reservations to be served in that dining room. The Supreme Court postponed the case involving the question of segregation in the public school in Washington. Many people not familiar with Washington think that the public schools here are non-segregated. Such is not the case; the schools are segregated and ample facilities are provided for the negroes. Those who are seeking to abolish all forms of segregation have no doubt concluded that this recent decision of the Supreme Court is the beginning of a quick end to segregation on a nationwide basis. In other words, they anticipate that the issue will be handled as a federal matter and that any state laws, rules or regulations will be subservient to and must bow to a federal proclamation. This is centralized government, undiluted. It could well mean the end of states' rights for all purposes. It will mean the adoption of FEPC legislation and substantially all of the so-called civil rights program proposed by the Truman administration, and so resoundingly fought by the South. On June 3rd, Congressman Adam Clayton Powell, Jr., who refers to himself as the senior congressman of all parties from Manhat-

town, was elected in modern times from the Eastern Seaboard, wired the President of the United States, in which he secured two members of the President's cabinet and Admiral Boone, Chief Medical Officer of the Veterans Administration. He demanded a decision by the President concerning a rumor that Secretary of the Navy Bob Anderson intended to maintain segregation in the Charleston, South Carolina and Norfolk, Virginia Naval shipyards; that Overta Culp Hobby, Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, had issued a memorandum to the Secretary of Defense telling Mr. Wilson not to follow a presidential directive abolishing segregated schools on Army posts; that Admiral Boone had advised the Congressman that he would not change practices in veterans' hospitals but would maintain them on a "local custom" basis. Congressman Powell requested a personal reply from the President. On June 8th, the Congressman received a letter from the President in compliance with his request, in which the President stated, and I quote: "I will carry out every pledge I have made with regard to segregation", and "I have made inquiries of the officials to whom you refer and learn that they are pursuing the purpose of eliminating segregation in federally controlled and supported institutions", and "To achieve our purpose we must plan with vigor together and with the victories I by I, and not to be content until we have gained our goal." On June 11th, the Congressman replied to the President in most complimentary terms for the reassurances contained in the president's letter. The Congressman also called upon the President in this last communication for executive action without waiting for any action by the legislative or judicial branches on five items: (1) Continuation and implementation of the Fair Employment Practices Commission established by Executive Order 9880. (2) Continuation and strengthening of the Committee on Government Contracts Compliance. (3) A change in the naval policy of segregation in shore establishments. (4) Change of the policy of the Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency of giving aid to segregated housing. (5) That the State Department make changes in its foreign service employment policy, where in the Congressman charges that of 6,000 employees only 50 are negroes, and the first negro con-

## Defrosting Data

When, how and why to defrost differs considerably with the refrigerator and the home freezer. Home management specialists for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service say according to Dr. Earl McCracken, physicist for the U. S. Department of Agriculture, frost is one of the homemaker's concerns in summer.

Frost on the evaporator of the refrigerator should never become more than one fourth inch thick. The thicker the frost, the more it insulates or "blankets" the evaporator and reduces its cooling effect on the interior of the refrigerator, no matter how much the motor runs. Thus, thick frost lets the inside of the refrigerator warm up so that foods don't keep well. Most home refrigerators need defrosting at least once a week—or oftener in summer when hot weather plus more use of the refrigerator for chilled foods and beverages cause frost to form faster.

Dr. McCracken advises following the directions in the booklet that comes with the refrigerator for defrosting. Some manufacturers advise quick defrosting with hot water in the ice trays while others warn against it. Some refrigerators should need defrosting only once or twice a year. Best management calls for removing

## 80 Per Cent For Wheat On Ground

Emergency loans on wheat stored on the ground will be at 80 per cent of the regular price support rates, the Agriculture Department announced Friday. The Emergency loans will be available in distress areas of Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Texas and Nebraska. State Production and Marketing Administration committees will determine who is eligible for the loans.

The farmer will be responsible for any loss in quantity or quality during the loan period. Under a distress program in 1949 the loans were made at 75 per cent of the regular rates and the government assumed responsibility for loss in quality.

## Cows Feed Selves In This Hay Barn

Many hours of valuable farm labor are saved when cows feed themselves from a building where hay is dried and stored. Dairy operations in which cows feed themselves from a building where it has been stored and then cured offer a means of saving many valuable hours of farm labor, says S. B. Cleland, University of Minnesota Extension Service farm management specialist. Cleland, writing in the Quonset Farmstead News June issue, reports that such a system is operating successfully at the State Reformatory farm at St. Cloud and that a similar arrangement has just been built on the Washington County farm of Joseph Kargel and Son. The hay feeding, storage and curing building is one unit of a loose-housing system that uses two other Quonsets, one for bedding area and another for the milking parlor and milk room. "The hay building is 40' wide, 100' long," Cleland says. "It has a concrete floor and open ends. A fan and motor housed on the side of the building forces air through drying tunnels which rest on the floor with hay on top of them. The hay is cut at its top quality period, partially dried in the sun, chopped and handled by a field forage harrow and now-dried in an unheated air after it's put in the building." Movable racks through which the cattle feed are placed at each end of the barn. Cleland writes that the cows do the rest. "They eat and push, and as they push toward more hay the racks slide and move toward the center of the barn. The cows eat their way through the bar, providing more and more shelter for themselves as winter wears on."

4 slices white bread  
4 slices ham or tongue  
4 slices Swiss or American cheese  
4 small carrots, scraped  
4 ripe olives  
Blend together butter (or margarine) and horseradish. Remove crusts from bread and spread each slice on one side with butter mixture. Form triple-decker sandwiches using two slices whole wheat bread, one slice of white bread and a slice of both ham and cheese for each sandwich. For top garnish, cut carrots lengthwise in quarters and arrange petal-fashion on top of each sandwich with a ripe olive in the center of each olive and mayonnaise and mustard.

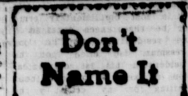

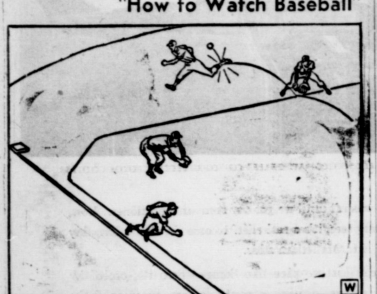

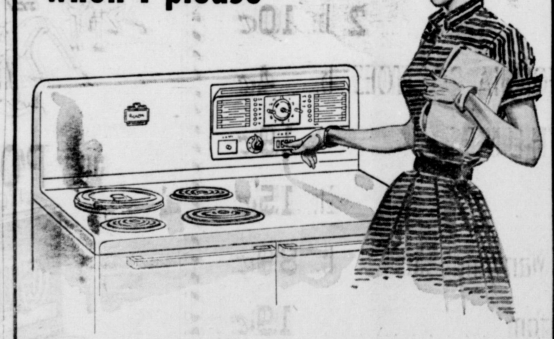
