Observes 55 Years Of Service

White House Properties, with seven lumber yards in the Panhandle including the one in Spearman, observes 55 years of service in the lumber and building business this year under the leadership of the founder, B. F. Tepe.

Tepe started the B. F. Tepe Lumber Co. in 1898 at Canadian. It was incorporated as the Tepe Hoover Lumber Co. in 1907 and became the White House Properties, Ed Hutton, the Spearman manager has been with the firm since 1942.

A Statistical Picture Of Hansford County's Population In 1952

A "statistical picture" of Hansford County's population, business and agriculture is presented in the recently published 1952 edition of the County and City Data Book, according to Supervisor James M. Hamilton of the office at Ft. Worth, Texas.

The frame of the picture consists of the "basic data" which show that Hansford County has 4,292 inhabitants (1950), 1,370 dwelling units (1950), 311 farms (1950), 92 retail stores (1948) and 3 manufacturing establishments (1947). In the frame are some detailed figures concerning each of these items, such as:

POPULATION: The median age of the county's 4,292 inhabitants was 26.4 years; citizens 21 years old and over numbered 2,505; families totalled 890; the median family income (1949) was \$3,643; the median school years completed of persons 25 years old and over was 10.8.

HOUSING: 1,371 of the county's 1,370 dwelling units were occupied in 1950; 39.2 percent of the occupied dwelling units were equipped with central heating, 88.7 percent had mechanical refrigerators, and 89.9 percent had radios. The median value of one-dwelling unit nonfarm structures occupied by owners was \$6,699.

AGRICULTURE: The average value of land and buildings per farm was \$116,152; 199 of the county's 311 farms were electrified; total value of farm products sold in 1949 was \$12,125,900.

RETAIL TRADE: The 92 retail stores had 359 paid employees and reported sales totaling \$4,875,000 in 1948.

MANUFACTURING: The 3 manufacturing establishments employing 26 average-year production workers in 1947 and paid \$35,000 in wages; value added by manufactures in 1947 amounted to \$79,000.

Emergency Loans Under New Legislation Explained By Benson

Methods of making emergency livestock loans to farmers and cattlemen who need Federal credit to buy feed and pay operating expenses were outlined today by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson. The special loans were authorized by Congress in new disaster credit legislation approved by President Eisenhower today (July 14).

The credit will be extended only to established producers and feeders of cattle, sheep and goats, who have a reasonable chance for working out their difficulties but cannot obtain the funds they need from private or commercial loan operations. Loans will not be made to livestock business or to carry or commercial feed lot operations.

Heavy demand is expected from the drought-stricken Southwest, but loans to cattlemen are not limited to the disaster area. Application blanks will be available from the Farmers Home Administration offices within a few days. In areas of heaviest demand, banks, production credit associations, national farm loan associations, as well as the loan offices of the FIA will have the blanks. All applications will be passed on by special livestock loan committees to be appointed by Secretary Benson.

The farmer can get in touch with the loan committee servicing his area by contacting his local agricultural official, agent, the Farmers Home Administration supervisor, or any other local agricultural official. Loans will be made in amounts of \$2,500, or more, at 5 percent interest for periods up to 3 years for the purchase of feed and other operating expense. They can be renewed if renewal is found to be in the best interest of the farmer and the Government. The loan funds cannot be used to refinance debts the farmers already owe.

When a farmer applies for a livestock loan his creditor will not be asked to subordinate their claim to the Government. However, the creditor will be asked to give standby agreement for a long enough period to enable the farmer to have a reasonable chance of recovery.

Announcement is made this week that a Spearman GREENBACK day, featuring the giving away of one hundred dollars in Greenback money each Saturday afternoon, will begin Saturday August 9th. The new trades day program inaugurated by the Retail Merchants committee of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce has for its purpose the encouragement of the local merchants to make special attractive prices, and at the same time to make series of gifts to those customers of the stores who are listed in this issue of the newspaper as Sponsoring the Spearman Greenback day.

The normal difference from the normal Trades day drawing and gifts, in the coming program is that Spearman Greenback money will be awarded as prizes each Saturday beginning August 9th instead of regular currency. In view of the fact that not all the merchants are participating in the new program, it can be understood that the committee want the gift money spent with the merchants who are giving away the prizes. This Spearman Greenback money printed at the local printing office, will be the same as United States currency at the stores who are sponsoring the gift program. It simply means that you must spend this gift money at one of the some 100 stores of Spearman that are sponsoring the program. It means that these merchants are anxious to get you to spend money whether Spearman Greenback money or U. S. Money at their stores so they can prove to you that you can purchase merchandise at as low a price as can be found in the Panhandle of Texas. Thus, you customers profit not only from gift money, but from the savings you will realize when you buy merchandise from the stores that are sponsoring the program. New loans will be made only during the period of the emergency. Lending will be handled by the Farmers Home Administration offices. Credit will be available at rates and terms to be established by the Secretary.

The new legislation also provides that in the future whatever expense the Government bears in supplying feed and seed in disaster areas will be borne by a disaster loan revolving fund under the jurisdiction of the Secretary of Agriculture. In the past this expense had been covered by the President's emergency fund. The other two new programs will also be financed out of the disaster revolving fund. About \$12 million is available at the present time. A request for additional funds is being made.

Instead of handing out numbered tickets to customers, the present plan calls for a small slip to be handed each customer who spends as much as one dollar at the stores sponsoring the new Trades Day program. This ticket will read: "This ticket good for one chance at \$100.00 worth of prizes to be given away Greenback Day, each Saturday at Spearman. Name of each customer will be required to sign their name) printed at the bottom of the ticket."

The committee felt that the ration of opportunity to get these prizes would be just about the same, and would eliminate a lot of unnecessary waiting. Tickets will be in the hands of the participating merchants so they can be given to customers beginning Monday August 3, and the first drawing will be held Saturday August 15. Merchants participating will have cards in their windows.

Ted's Tips On Baseball

Not all the excitement at a baseball game is displayed on the field. This truism was brought home to us rather forcibly along about the middle of the nifty 4 hit shutout Stu Miller inflicted on the Milwaukee Braves the night of July 11th. Sitting behind us were a couple of rabid fans. Sitting between them was a docile spectator apparently unknown to both but we easily believe that had these guys been sitting together blows could have been struck. The argument concerned the comparative merits of Stan Musial and Ted Williams with particular reference to their value as team players. The Williams proponent claimed that Musial was for Musial and that he never had compiled a run batted in record worthy of his batting average, whereas Ted's base knocks were produced most often when most needed. The faithful record rooster put up a stout defense but allowed great restraint when intimated with the statement "Now let's don't be prejudiced." Fact is that an examination of the records shows that Williams is indeed the better RBI man. Over a period of nine seasons for each man Williams had 1251 runs batted in to Musial's 916 and one of the seasons played was the one in which Ted played in only 89 games due to injury in mid-season. However, the rooster went on to say that the St. Louis writers had always built up Musial whereas Ted's cool attitude toward the press had resulted in stories which brought him into disfavor with the fans.

Now that Ted is back from Korea with such a sterling record as a Navy flier it's pretty certain that he'll hear no more boos in Boston or elsewhere. Last reports indicated that he will be discharged about August 1st and one wonders if he might be able to get in shape to help the Red Sox in September. Here's hoping that he will make a wise decision and that if it seems better to wait until next spring to resume his career, he will wait and be able to show at his best.

Speaking of RBI records those who watch the progress of Bill Sorensen who was so well liked at Lubbock and Dallas will be astounded at his performance to date. Including games of Sunday the 19th Bill had gone to bat 175 times, had made 40 hits with 33 runs batted in. This is nothing less than sensational as even the leaders rarely have a ratio of more than two thirds RBIs to hits. As of the same date for instance Ferris Pain, last years American league batting champ had 45 RBIs and 90 hits with an average of 2.57. It seems almost uncanny that Sorensen cannot get that average up. He stood at .223 on the 20th. His fielding as usual is of standard character. thru July 16th in 24 games he had made only 3 errors on 155 chances standing fourth best in the N. L. among second basemen. Bridges of Cincinnati, the leader topped him by just 6 percentage points.

With prospects of peace, with the sultry wet weather over and enough air breathing, and most everyone plowing and sealing in the moisture ready for winter wheat pasture, there seems little for the average citizen to worry about.

Not so the country editor. My cotton picking brother, who has never been outside Grayson county for the past 15 years is here on a protracted extended visit. I have politely invited him to come up and visit with me about 3 times a year for the past 15 years, after I had enjoyed his hospitality while fishing and visiting in Grayson County. He has never been too busy to visit me, but up until Friday of last week he never has taken the opportunity to partake of the Western Hospitality of Hansford County. He's a retired school teacher, 74 years of age, and has spent the last few years fishing, hunting and playing dominoes. Really I was surprised beyond all measure when he accepted my invitation to visit with the Millers here.

He has been DDS at his home for many years, and he still regards me as being a little bigger than he, a retired school teacher, 74 years of age, and has spent the last few years fishing, hunting and playing dominoes. You folk who live out here in God's country will appreciate my problem when I tell you that Chall (that's my brother's name) was dead before it was dark Friday evening. Well, I'm a fanatic with the travel and all he was a bit tired, and when Billy and Sybil came up to visit alone about 9 p. m., I did not awaken Chall. I was kinda feeling big-hearted and realizing that I was playing the ideal host, until a few minutes after 4 a. m. the next morning Chall shook me and demanded in a fog horn voice "What's the sausage and eggs?" I jumped out of bed, feeling sure that my brother had lost his mind. I said in effect, "Chall you haven't been asleep more than ten minutes. It's not time for breakfast." He pulled out his big turnip watch and showed me that it was 6 minutes after 4 a. m. He informed me that he had been getting up at 4 a. m. for the past 37 years and always had his bacon and eggs at 4:30 a. m. each morning. I told him that we did not serve sausage and eggs, but I would go to toast him some bread, make the coffee and serve him some cereal. He allowed that dry cereal was all right for cows, but not good for people, Eddie Payne, identity knew more about my brother's habits than I did, cause she joined the conversation long enough to inform me that there was sausage and eggs in the bottom shelf of the refrigerator, and suggested that I would be acting the part of an ideal

host if I went into the kitchen and prepared breakfast for my brother. Well, by the time I had coffee and toast ready, I was kinda hungry myself so I laid out 4 big sausages, three eggs, intending to give two to my brother and eat one myself. (Chall got impatient and emptied the skillet into his plate and ate every morsel o' fite food, and I went back to toast and whatever.)

Well, I did not know what else to do between 15 minutes to five a. m. and eight a. m., so I just curled up in bed again. Along about 6:15 a. m., Chall come to my bed and shook me awake. He was very polite and apologized for awakening me again, but wanted me to tell him where the tea kettle was located so he could heat some water to shave. Can you imagine anyone with nothing to do but walk the streets and get the mail having enough ambition to want to shave at 6 a. m. and can you picture a brother of such a brilliant man as your country editor not realizing that the "hot" on the faucet would bring him enough hot water to shave? He said he always used a kettle to heat his shaving water at home, and he wasn't gonna risk blowing up the house while he was shaving.

I took Chall up to the domino parlor and got into a game with Dix Wilbanks and Tom Russell Saturday morning. I felt sure that my brother would clean up the game, and I suggested to Dix that Chall did not do anything but "hoe his garden and play dominoes, so he would understand when Chall beat us hand raising. Well, I'm a fanatic. If we didn't play 6 games and Chall did not win a single game. He first told me that it would be impolite for him to win, since he was visiting with me. I told him to forget his manners and win some games, since I had been bragging on him as a domino player. He said that coming up from 500 feet to 3500 feet altitude had got him dizzy and he guessed he would not be back to his full mental capacity until he got acclimated. However, he played 9 games of dominos with him, and won 7 of them, and I'm getting worried, cause he used to really beat me every time we played down in the cotton country.

Musical Festival To Be Held At Canyon, Texas. Soon

It'll be "Music, Music, Music," here at West Texas State College for two weeks, with concerts every night, strutting drum majors, choir singing, and bands playing, when the first West Texas Music Camp opens August 3.

High musicians and choir and band directors from over the Panhandle and Tri-State area coming to the camp will spend two exceedingly busy weeks in intensive training, led by some of the nation's top musicians, M. J. Newman, music department head at WT, has announced beyond his expectations, and the first camp "should be very successful."

Advance registration has already been recorded from 13 area cities, with from half a dozen to two dozen persons from each community. Persons from the following towns have registered: Canyon, Amarillo, Borger, Perryton, Tulla, Clotts, Dalhart, Hereford, Altam, Ocala, Carleton, Happy, Canadian, Kress, Dinamit, Memphis, Phillip, Childress, and Muskogee. Instructors for the camp, named by Newman, include Jack Lee, University of Arizona band director who formerly was with the University of Michigan; Charles Bryan Birmingham, Ala., composer, author, and folk-music artist; Ted Otto, drum major in the movie, "Stars and Stripes Forever," and one of the nation's top twirling experts; and Joe Berryman, nationally known percussion and band authority.

Bryan, who composed the score for the "Florida Atlantic" historical pageant, playing all summer in the Everglades, will direct choral work for the camp. Lee, the band program and Otto, the twirling classes. Berryman will assist during a portion of the camp. Newman said.

Dr. Houston Bright, Newman, and others of the music faculty of WT will assist during the camp, which will feature primarily band and chorus work. Classes will also be offered in ensemble theory, conducting, and a "squad leaders" class designed to help directors with marching band drills. Will also be offered. Students attending will have daily band and choir rehearsals, sectional instruction, drum majors classes, twirling classes, marching drills, conducting, theo-

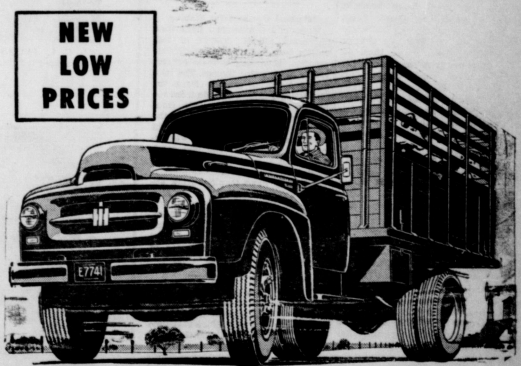

One-Time Messenger Is Now Head Of Large Lumber Chain

The "natural love" for anything made of wood led a one-time Western Union messenger boy to head for the tall timber and emerge years later as head of a thriving lumber yard chain on the High Plains of the Texas Panhandle.

Briefly that is the history of Ben Tepe, veteran of 55 years in the lumber and building business who now heads the sprawling White House Properties whose general offices have recently been moved from Canadian to Pampa, "where it should have been for several years."

Tepe "lived through the wild and woolly days" of Dodge City, Kans., mostly because he was smart enough to stay out of the way in the numerous sunfights he witnessed, watching many men digest lead for their last meal instead of meat.

Born in Kansas City, Kans. in September, 1873, Tepe, with his parents to bristling blading Dodge City, at the tender age of 8. Like all kids, young Ben made his way to the saloons of many a gun fight where he saw men killed — "an experience which never bothered me like it would today."

As a boy, Tepe always wanted to see what went on inside the saloons and gambling halls but couldn't seem to gain admission. "They were strict in those days," he recalled. No women or kids were allowed in those saloons or gambling halls. Then a run you out before you got through the door."

One day Tepe got on as a part-time messenger boy with Western Union and used that as an excuse to get into the gambling houses to satisfy his curiosity. On one instance he had to carry a message on a prize fight result to Bat Masterson, famous lawman and gambler, and received a \$1 tip from him while the gambling was in the midst of a big money seven up game.

He recalled, too, the apparent honesty of the people in those days as hatcher and worked in a dairy before hiring out to a sawmill. The sawmill helped turn the tide and in 1890 landed in Canadian, Texas, where he opened a carpentry shop.

"I never had any training in carpentry. It just came to me naturally," he said, recalling his years there. For eight years he worked at the trade and contracted to build houses, barns, and other buildings. When the owner of the Canadian Lumber Yard died, Judge Hoover went on his note to buy the yard from the estate at \$3,685 — "you couldn't buy it today at \$36,000" — and operated it until 1900. Then he spread out, buying an established yard at Miami in 1900, Tepe brought out an Amarillo lumber yard, but sold it two years later to open yards at Pampa, Glazier and White Deer. From that time the company grew to its present size of seven yards and an affiliate yard at Odessa.

But, being head of the partnership of White House Properties doesn't mean a thing to Tepe so far as doing any manual labor is concerned.

"I still do a lot of my own carpentry work I can get it done in the same time it would take me to think about getting someone to do it," Tepe said smilingly.

The veteran lumberman—he's been at it for 55 years — still uses some of his old tools he had 58 years ago which he keeps tuned up to the point where they are as good as when first bought.

Father of three children and grandfather three times, not to mention being great-grandfather three times over, Tepe decided some time ago to dispose of the Canadian lumber yard and move the home offices to Pampa.

"This is where it should have been several years ago. Pampa is growing and besides I now know more old timers here than I do in Canadian."

Tepe never finished high school and never underwent any scheduled type of training to get where he is today.

"It was I guess just a natural love for anything made of wood that made me decide to go into the carpentry business and later the lumber business," Tepe explained.

Family Security Plans Have Top Priority in Budgets
Every year for more than 20 years, families in the United States have set aside at least five cents out of every dollar left after taxes to pay for personal and family security programs. And as a result, these families now own more than 200 billion dollars of life insurance, have the largest investment in history in pensions and retirement plans, and have a system of sickness and accident insurance which protects at least 100 million people.

Studies going back to 1929 show that payments for family security plans enjoy one of the highest growth rates in the budgetary programs of American families. Families tend to increase their cash savings and investments in good times and decrease them in bad times; life insurance premiums and other kinds of long-term security payments continue through the years at a much more even pace.

In estimating how much Mr. and Mrs. America pays for family financial security, economists include life insurance premiums, payments into pension and retirement funds, accident and hospitalization insurance, and servicemen's, fraternal and savings bank life insurance. In 1950 the total paid by the public for all kinds of financial security amounted to some 16 billion dollars, including nearly three billion dollars which were paid as social security taxes.

The importance which Americans place upon life insurance is reflected in the fact that voluntarily they are putting some eight billion dollars every year into life insurance premiums. This represents the largest single item in the nation's "bill" for family security.

Combat Rotation Prevents Breakdowns Among Soldiers
The beneficial effects of combat rotation, initiated a year ago in Korea, have fulfilled favorable expectations by preventing breakdowns among soldiers. According to Dr. Albert J. Glass, psychiatrist at the Letterman General Hospital, San Francisco:

"As currently practiced in Korea, rotation is a powerful incentive to positive motivation by providing an obtainable goal of relief from battle." Dr. Glass says.

"It has also prevented the breakdown of the type produced by prolonged periods of combat, or the so-called 'old sergeant syndrome.' Adjustment of the new recruit to military service during the training period, likewise, has brought about considerably less hospitalization for minor emotional difficulties than occurred during World War II, he said.

Dr. Glass reported that effective forward psychiatric treatment of battle-affected soldiers was instituted in the Korean campaign and in six to eight weeks after the onset of hostilities, as against a delay of nearly two years in World War II.

Missouri Commercial Fishing Harvested 540,000 Pounds of Fish
The Missouri Commercial Fishing Commission reported that the 1952 harvest of fish and shellfish was 540,000 pounds, according to state conservation commission figures. The take included 298,200 pounds from the Mississippi, 227,800 pounds from the Missouri and 14,000 pounds from Arkansas boundary waters of the St. Francis river. The live-weight retail value of this harvest was estimated at \$130,000. The 1951 catch was about 51 per cent below that of 1950. The decline in the commercial catch may have resulted from adverse fishing conditions in the Missouri and Mississippi rivers, but also caused losses of tackle and fishing equipment.

Zoo in U.S.
The first zoological garden in the United States was established in Philadelphia in 1794. Since that time nearly every large city in the country has acquired a zoo. Among the large zoos are the celebrated Bronx Zoo and the Central Park Zoo in New York and those in St. Louis, Detroit, Kansas City, Chicago—one in Lincoln Park, another magnificent display at Brookfield—and San Diego. The United States National Zoological Park in Washington, in a beautiful setting of hills, woods and streams, was established in 1890 by an act of congress. Some of the U.S. zoos exhibit their collections in open-air barless pits; the Brookfield zoo in Chicago follows this pattern.

No Smoking
Six hundred delegates from 40 countries gathered in Amsterdam, Holland, for the World Tobacco Congress. They discussed the growing and curing of tobacco, the tastes of cigarette, cigar and pipe smokers all over the world. But not one wisp of smoke rose from the rows of delegates or the conference tables of their committees. It had become just happened to meet in the Dutch Royal Tropical Institute where, they were told, smoking is strictly forbidden.

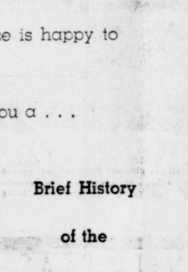

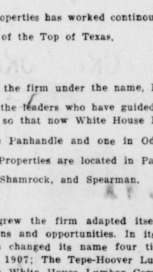

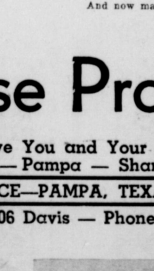

The journal said similar poisonings have been reported on other species of animals by veterinarians in other areas.

Economists Top Payroll

WASHINGTON—According to the House Appropriations Committee there are 2,488 economists on the Federal payroll. The committee reports this is approximately half of the economists in the country. The group reported it intends to cut the number to 200 and thus save the government approximately \$40,000,000 a year. The savings would take into account their rappers, office space, and everything else that goes with them.

Test Tubes May Help Cut Great Food Loss

LAFAYETTE, Ind.—Three scientists at Purdue University believe they are hot on the trail of a practical way to save farmers, grocers and housewives some of the millions of dollars they lose annually through spoilage of fruits and vegetables. The research team reports that rot and mold losses have been reduced as much as 75 per cent in peaches and strawberries exposed to the vapors of two volatile chemicals.

Driver Stores Auto After Tongue-Lashing

ST. LOUIS—Almost 20 years ago Francis E. Schwentler violated a traffic rule. As a result, a truck driver gave him a tongue-lashing and told him he should stop driving. Schwentler did just that. He took his 1934 Ford home, put it in the garage and jacked it up. When he died last year at the age of 90 that car was still there with only 58 miles showing on the speedometer. Inheritance-tax appraisers were astonished and inquired about the car.

Falls Take Greatest Toll

NEW YORK—A recent survey reveals that falls take a greater toll of adult life than any other type of home accident, although falls in bathrooms, popularly considered a leading menace to life and limb, actually are responsible for relatively few deaths. Nearly half of the fatal falls in the home take place on stairs, but a considerable number occur when the victim is merely walking about a room, or going from one room to another. In many instances a rug causes a fall and in others highly polished or wet floors.

Check On Nation's Gold Proves It's Still All There

WASHINGTON—During the campaign just fall there was much talk about the nation's gold—whether it was all there or not. The Treasury Department reports it is after an unprecedented check. The recent report stated that nearly \$23,000,000,000 worth of gold at Fort Knox is there, and elsewhere, \$2,000,000,000 worth of silver bullion and about \$300,000,000 worth of coin not in circulation. One shortage of \$100 that showed up on the books, however, the \$10 discrepancy turned up in the currency redemption division. Nobody knows just how it happened. Apparently somebody forgot to report the replacing of a beat-up old \$10 bill by a new one or something of the sort.

Reclaiming Process Saves Navy Money

WASHINGTON—The Navy has saved \$80,000 recently due to a new process for reclaiming used fuel drums. The drums, used to store and ship fuel, sometimes get dumped up in their travels. The new reclaiming process which takes about 30 minutes saves them from the scrap heap and restores them to usefulness. The battered drums first get kinks taken out of the tin cans and are "dedented" with high-pressure air. Rust on the inside is scraped away and a solution of caustic soda is put to work. Wire brushes clean scale and loose paint from the outside, then caustic is sprayed on the inside and the drums are sealed. They can be stored in the open as long as 18 months without further attention.

Highlights And Side Lights From Your State Capital

By Vern Sanford

Texas Press Association

Austin, Tex.—While Governor Allan Shivers was considering what the state could do to aid drought-beset farmers and ranchmen, he received a report saying that he can declare an emergency and get a \$5 million program going.

The report came from Attorney General John Ben Shepperd who, on the governor's request, had been digging into the legal aspects of the situation.

Shepperd, by the state civil protection act of 1951.

Much could be done without calling the Legislature into session, said the report, and there are other things that could be done only by legislative authority.

At least \$5 million could be raised, said the attorney general, by means of contributions from the cities, counties, and local government agencies, including water and sewer districts; by using the balance in the governor's deficiency appropriation and by calling upon the public to put in \$200,000.

"It is our opinion," said the report, "that you are authorized to mobilize and utilize the mainfold services, equipment, and facilities of existing state agencies and political subdivisions to assist in a drought relief program."

The federal government is speeding up the job of getting money to Southwestern farmers and ranchers.

President Eisenhower asked Congress for \$51 million to finance a lending program. The Department of Agriculture already had \$12 million available for the purpose.

It was expected that local committees would be ready to pass on loans by the end of the month.

Application blanks were being sent to Farmers Home Administration offices and, in some instances where the demand for loans will be heavy, to banks and Production Credit Administration offices.

Meanwhile, the United Livestock Producers Association, with members in five states, decided to send two association officers to Washington to ask for direct federal price support on cattle.

The representatives are S. E. (Eck) Brown, president of the association, and O. H. Finch Sr., a director, both of Dalhart.

Brown berated the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association for its "inability to work for the best interests of all livestock growers, big and little alike, to relieve price conditions."

The T&SRA is opposed to direct federal price support on cattle.

South Texas politics and the name George Parr, sometimes called boss of a big part of that area, came up in a Supreme Court hearing on whether District Judge C. Woodrow Latighlin of Alice should be ousted from his position.

Eleven lawyers who practice in Judge Latighlin's 7th district charged, among other things, that the judge had ordered ballot boxes and election material delivered to the sheriff of Duval County, Parr's nephew.

Clat C. Smith, representing Latighlin, told the court, "Apparently those who want Judge Latighlin removed were more interested in keeping George Parr from seeing the election returns than they were in prosecuting election irregularities."

It was the view of State Senator William H. Shireman, speaking for those who want to oust Judge Latighlin, that delivery of the election material to Parr was "in itself a corrupt proposition, making it possible for Parr to know how the voters voted."

The Supreme Court will study a case involving the entire procedure of the Texas Employment Commission in computing employers' taxes for unemployment compensation.

The court granted a writ of error to Todd Shipyard Corporation, which had sued for recovery of \$106,250 in unemployment taxes paid from 1948 to 1951.

I like to be in Texas, but this was no pleasure trip. The President plans to see how we reached the drought-stricken area. Multitudes thousands of acres of land below us were bare of vegetation. It was a depressing sight.

—one that would impress anybody with the sore need for immediate and adequate assistance to the people depending on this land.

AID—NOT ENOUGH: We passed, and the President signed, the bill making emergency loans and seed supplies available to the farmers and cattlemen in the drought area.

I voted for the bill of course. In fact, I co-sponsored it. The assistance it authorizes will help, but not enough.

The drought has made the cattlemen's situation worse. But the drought is not the only cause, because of low cattle prices and high feed prices.

Mention of price supports for cattle was vigorously applauded at the Amarillo meeting, where some 2,000 farmers and cattlemen gathered to give their ideas about what should be done.

WATER USE: Texas could be a million more acres of land under irrigation and have an ample supply of water for our expanding industry if our potential water resources were fully used.

That fact is brought out in the appraisal of the Texas water problem made by the Bureau of Reclamation at my request.

This recently issued study is a scathing report on the state of our water resources. It is a warning to the people of Texas.

The report puts forth a soundly conceived Federal-State water conservation program, with both levels of government accepting definite responsibilities and with the state maintaining rights over its own water.

This appraisal, in my opinion, is of the utmost importance to everybody in Texas. The problem with which it deals affects all of us.

STABILITY IN FRANCE? At the White House luncheon for

the visiting foreign ministers from France and England, French Minister Georges Bidault told me the new French Premier, Joseph Laniel, off to a good start. He said the Premier has been given unusual powers in an effort to bring stability to the French Government, which has been bobbing up and down like a cork on the Colorado River.

I hope Mr. Bidault is right. The free world has a large stake in a stable French Government.

MEDICAL MEN: It's a good thing when members of the medical profession and members of Congress sit down for an interchange of views and knowledge.

So I was glad of the opportunity to visit with the president and the board chairman of the American Medical Association.

Accompanying the two gentlemen to my office were my good Texas friends, Dr. A. C. Scott, Jr. of Temple and Dr. F. J. L. Haudenstone of Wharton. I have the privilege of being on the Board of the Scott and White Clinic, headed by Dr. Scott, one of Texas' great men of medicine.

I suggested to the doctors that members of the AMA all over the country meet with members of the Senate and the House of Representatives while Congress is out of session. If the doctors and the congressmen sit down together for some question-and-answer sessions, I know the results will be well worthwhile.

TEXAS PERSONALITIES: Hastings Harrison of Dallas, whose wonderful work with the National Conference of Christians and Jews is well known in Texas, was a welcome visitor.

Gavel From White House: Wood was glad to be able to get for Mrs. J. F. Boren of Abilene, President, Sixth District, Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, a gavel made of wood taken directly from the White House.

Jerry Perams, Special Assistant to the President, told me it was the very last one available.

Mr. and Mrs. Philip Walker, LaJon, whose father is pastor of the First Methodist Church in Denton, is here for the summer, doing social work as a member of the American Friends Service Committee. Drillstem Test Made At Oil Well Northeast City

A drillstem test taken at the Texas Company Blackmore No. 1, 4 miles Northeast of Spearman, Wednesday of this week proved a failure. The test was taken in a break in shale and no indication of oil production resulted.

He said that tests were made at any depth in shale or in any sand encountered.

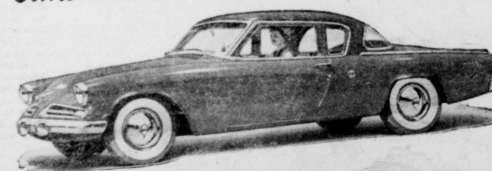

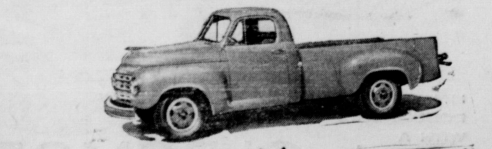

Dear Producer:
Wheat Quota Referendum

— This month on the 14th you will vote to settle the Wheat Marketing Referendum. Quotas will apply to all farms on which the 1954 acreage of wheat is more than 15 acres, and all wheat producers who will have 15 acres or more will be eligible to vote in the August 14th Wheat Quota Referendum.

Voting places are as follows:
A Community - Gruver Elevator; B community, T. C. Harvey, Sr. home; C community - Spearman High school; D community - Gruver High school.

These voting places will be open from 7:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m. on August 14th.

If two thirds of the voters vote in favor of the Wheat Marketing Quotas, here is what takes place.

1. Marketing quotas will be in effect for all farms planting more than 15 acres of wheat.
2. Marketing penalties will apply on all wheat produced on acres in the excess of the farm's allotment. This means that the non-cooperator would have to pay a fine or penalty on his excess wheat before he could be issued a marketing card. Then he could sell all of his wheat on the open market with no price support. The penalty on this excess wheat is set at 45 per cent of the Parity price for wheat as computed on May 1 of each year (About \$1.10 per bushel figured on May 1, 1953 Parity price.)

3. Price support at 90 per cent of Parity will be available for those who stay within their acreage allotment

4. Quotas can be expected to hold down production, helping to bring supplies more nearly in line with the effective market demand.

If more than one third of the people vote no, this is the situation.

1. There will be no marketing quotas with their penalty controls.

2. Acreage allotments, however, will continue in effect because controlling legislation provides that wheat acreage allotments are to be established every year unless suspended because of emergency situations.

3. Price supports will drop to 50 per cent of Parity for Cooperators. Non cooperators, any who exceed their acreage allotments, will not be entitled to price supports even at the 50 per cent level. However, these non cooperators will not have to pay the penalty on their excess wheat.

4. In the absence of quota controls, production can be expected to continue at high levels, possibly adding to the wheat surplus and in turn causing wheat prices to go even lower.

Locating TV antennas too close to power lines is DANGEROUS!

Someone may be killed or seriously injured or your set may be damaged if your antenna should fall into a power line. Follow these precautions and play safe:

1. Have your antenna installed by a qualified TV serviceman and see that it is located where it will clear power lines if it should fall in any direction.
2. Make sure the antenna mast is strongly constructed and supported to withstand the heaviest storms.
3. Do not run guy wires over or close to power lines.
4. If your antenna is already up, have it checked for safe location and support. And if you are asked to move it, remember the request is made only to protect you, your set and your electric service.

A final word of caution: If you are in the vicinity when an antenna does fall on a power line, don't touch the antenna, power lines or guy wires. Leave a guard at the hazard and call our office at once.
