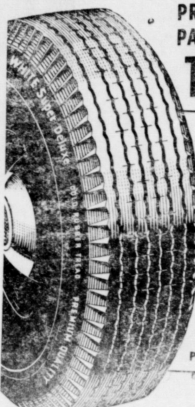

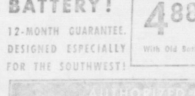

Doctor Distribution An official of the American Medical Association reported recently on the distribution of physicians in the United States. Frank G. Dickinson, A. M. A. Bureau of Medical Economic Research director, reported that physicians are practicing in ninety-six percent of the communities with a population of between 2,500 and 5,000.

He says doctors are practicing in eighty-eight per cent of the communities of 1,000 to 2,500 population and in only twenty-one per cent of communities with 100 to 1,000 population.

Dickinson's figures are based on the 1936 census, and therefore, the distribution of doctors to citizens could have changed slightly since that time. Dickinson divided the country into 575 medical service areas, and found that the number of doctors per 100 prospective patients varied from over 5,000 in a region in Utah to less than 500 in a Minnesota community. In these areas, Dickinson found that every community of 5,000 population, or more, had at least one physician, and usually more. He called this a good distribution.

Perhaps the weakest, or most discouraging part of the report is Dickinson's figures on obtaining to communities of 100 to 1,000 population. Only twenty-one per cent of them have resident physicians. To the person living in a town of 700 or 800 population, the fact that the community has no doctor is often a serious matter. It could be a matter of life or death in some cases.

As serious as this situation might be, it has been the same, or worse, since the beginning of the country. Moreover, there is no way to force a doctor to live in any community nor would the American people support such a proposal if it were advanced. Doctors, like other human beings, will generally go where they can make a decent living and where the surroundings are normally pleasant. They cannot be expected to move into communities where they can hardly make a living. And considering the adequacy of doctors in towns of a few thousand population is about as good as one might expect in an unorganized society.

News Letter From Spearman Walter Rogers

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COMPULSORY FEPC
In the opinion of many, the remarks of the Secretary of Labor, Mr. Mitchell, before a Senate committee, to the effect that he favored a compulsory FEPC law, were not accidental, extemporaneous, or a spur of the moment remark. Although these views expressed by the President, who has said that he favored a voluntary FEPC law, and the fact that the Mitchell remarks are a part of a softening-up process that has as its ultimate goal "compulsory FEPC" law, are for more comments on the subject in the near future. If compulsory FEPC comes into being, it will affect every business in the nation. Many small merchants think they should not worry about this because they are not engaged in interstate commerce and will not be subject to the law. Many small businesses that were actually not engaged in interstate commerce as we have known it during recent years, DEFINED into interstate commerce. Those not already taken in by this method may well realize that they are next in line. The adoption of a compulsory FEPC law would mean the early inclusion of all your business in the realm of interstate commerce. I might point out that almost every farmer is included in interstate commerce by definition. The only reason that the maximum hour and minimum wage provision of the Fair Labor Standards Act do not apply to the farmer, is because he is specifically exempt in the language of this act. A repeal of the exempting provisions of the act would immediately place the farmer under the minimum wage and maximum hour laws, whether he liked it or not. If the Administration proposal to include an additional ten million under the social security program is realized, there will be a race on to which covers the most Americans, social security or interstate commerce. And I thought we were going to DECENTRALIZE the government. When federal laws are passed imposing obligations on "small business", the term goes clear down to the smallest hamburger stand. It is only when money is to be loaned by the government that the term "small business" applies. This money business worth over half a million dollars, and excludes the small business establishments with whom we daily buy and sell.

For the first several years, no transportation was furnished, and schools were operated in the area of the Micon District, and a small building was built at old Hansford and a school was continued there to serve grade school students. These outlying schools were continued for some three or four years, or until transportation became available. In the summer of 1922, need-

ing additional room, the Community dug down in its pocket for the necessary money for material and labor was donated, and a third building was erected on the site in Spearman, a large frame building which was divided into four class rooms and which served the purpose for the moment.
Disaster struck, however, and on May 23, 1923, just at the close of the third school term in Spearman, fire destroyed all of the buildings and equipment with the exception of the 4 room building constructed in 1922, which was far enough removed from the fire which originated in the 2 story frame building, to escape damage.
Looking then to a more permanent plant, the present site was acquired, and with a \$75,000 bond issue voted by the District plus \$20,000 of insurance money which was collected on the old buildings, the present Grade school building was erected. J. C. Rittenberry was the architect

and the Fred Bone Construction Co. of Amarillo did the construction work. The building was completed in the early part of 1924 and occupied by the school during the latter part of the 1923-4 term.
Prior to the completion of this building the 1923 term started off by using the one 4 room building on the old school site, the various churches and lodge halls, and was scattered all over town. The fall of 1923 was exceptionally wet, believe it or not and the task of comming from one location to another without the benefit of sidewalks or paved streets was no little task for pupils and children alike.
Beginning about 1925 the District started transporting its pupils and the schools at old Hansford and Micon were discontinued. The first busses were quite crude as compared with our present day transportation facilities. The school continued to grow and the 4 room building from

the old site was moved to near where our present high school building is located, and the building from old Hansford was moved up to provide additional room. Again the school out-grew its quarters and in the year 1939 a \$100,000 bond issue was voted for the purpose of erecting the present high school building. This building was occupied about mid-term of the 1939-1 term of school.
Then came the depression and dust bowl years of the early thirties, and the school district was in dire financial distress. In order to continue operation of the school, for several years the District issued warrants for teacher's salaries, and these became legal tender around the community. Eventually all of these warrants were retired at their face value. In about the year 1936 the entire indebtedness of the District was consolidated into one issue, the bonds were re-issued and were purchased by the State School Fund; and the District

had the advantage of a lower interest rate and a longer term of re-payment.
The original territory embraced in the District has been added to from time to time, by taking in the Meelin School Dist. and District No. 18 in Hansford County, and also by annexing Black and Blodgett School District in Ochiltree County. And certain Districts or parts of Districts from Hutchinson County, so that now the area of the District is approximately 412 sections.
When the High school building was completed in 1931, the old frame building on the site was sold and removed the one originally moved up from old Hansford was sold to L. G. Andrews and remodeled into a dwelling which is now located just west of the school grounds on the corner. The old four room building was sold, and finally ended up as a community building or public hall in the town of Sunray.

**Brief History Of
Spearman Public
School**
This brief history of Spearman Public Schools was made as a part of the Public Schools Week, and also to commemorate 100 years of Public Schools in Texas. We are indebted to a local citizen for his time and effort taken to compile this article.
The Santa Fe railroad was completed into the townsite of Spearman in the month of October 1919, and thus assured the building of a new town, the majority of whose first citizens would come from the old town of Hansford, located in the valley 6 miles west of Spearman.
Since one of the first requirements of the new town would be adequate school facilities, the Spearman Independent School District came into being, and was created by a special act of the Legislature in the early part of 1920. The new district was composed of approximately 150 sections of 3 and, and was composed of the Common School District of Hansford, Micon and Happy Jack. Micon District was in the southern part of the County with a small school building on Sec. 146 Bk. 4T, which is the part of the Meek farm. Happy Jack district was in the east central part of the County with its school building 2 miles east of Spearman, and the school in the Hansford district was at the old town of Hansford.
The school building at old Hansford was a three story frame building, size about 50 x 50 ft. which had been constructed about the year 1909 in anticipation of the building of the Endicottree Western Railroad through the town, which railroad failed to materialize. The school building in the other frame building.
The building from old Hansford was moved to Spearman in the summer of 1929, and was located on Block 62, which is the block directly south of where the First Baptist Church is now

To this must be attributed part of the blame for the increasing toll of deaths on highways. President Eisenhower says the Administration would like to increase highway aid more than 20 percent.

Study groups which have investigated highway safety and the adequacy of America's highways, have reported expenditures of millions of dollars would be necessary to lift the standard of public roads to what they should be. Since Federal highway aid is matched by local and state contributions the extra funds in Federal dollars might well mean that another half billion dollars would be spent on highways.

Truly this would be a good pump-priming program if the Republicans care to take a leaf from the book of the Democrats.
