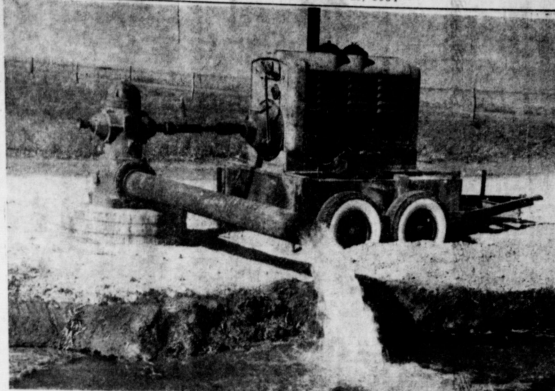
AFROTC cadets at A&M engage in an intensive drill period once a week, and are enrolled in classroom work that covers a wide variety of military and political subjects.

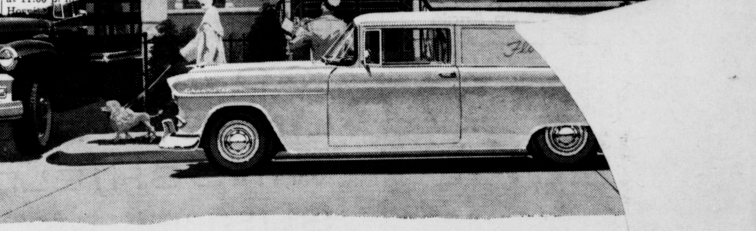

Questions Answered About Price Supports
College Station, Nov.—Will crop loans and purchase agreements still be available for 1955 production, even under the new adjustable price support plan?

The answer is "Yes" says Claude K. McCain, chairman of the state ASC committee, who said this and other questions about price supports under new farm legislation are being asked by farmers.

One common question, says Mc-

Can, is: "Do all basic crop price supports drop to 82 and one-half percent of parity for 1955?" In answer to that, he said U. S. Department of Agriculture spokesmen have emphasized that "There is no basis in fact to the charge that price supports would 'drop out from under' basic agricultural commodities" in 1955.

"Department spokesmen have said that 'necessary moderate adjustments will be made gradually, and in line with realities of the supply situation,'" he explains. Under existing law supports on basic commodities can be set at or anywhere between 82 and one-half and 90 percent of parity. Wheat—Supports have been set at 82 and one-half percent of parity, or a national average of \$2.06 per bushel.

Rice—under the present supply situation, 1955 price supports would be indicated at around 85 percent of parity, or possibly a little less. However, if marketing quotas are in effect next year, lower production in 1955 could reduce total supplies so that final price support might be in the upper 80's.

Corn—Supports are expected to be about 83 percent.

Peanuts—Supports are expected to be at or very close to 90 percent.

Cotton—Supports will remain

at 90 percent of parity.

Another recurring question, McCain says, has to do with price supports for 1955 small feed grains such as oats, barley and grain sorghums. He points out that Secretary of Agriculture Benson recently said no decision had yet been made in connection with small grains. Such a decision, he said, would be made only when final crop reports are in, and after further study of the current drought.

County Agent News

Water District

Mr. R. V. Converse, Secretary on the temporary Board of Directors for the Ground Water Conservation District No. 2, North of the Canadian River, informs us that our next step in getting a district set up is a hearing in Dumas on December 9 at 10:00 A. M. If the Board of Water Engineers find enough interest in the District at the next meeting, an election will be called to vote the District in or out.

The water under each Owner's place belongs to him. However, if we do not get local control by setting up our District, it is believed the controll will go elsewhere. This may not be good for the irrigation farmer. Local Industry and all the town's people who more or less depend on Agriculture.

Grubs are immature forms of Heel Flies. This single livestock pest causes millions of dollars worth of damage in Texas each year.

When you consider that the baby grub starts in the heel in late winter, works through the body to the neck, and then to the back, matures and bursts through the hide, it is no wonder that the infected animal becomes unthrifty. The grubby hide, which is one of the high priced cuts, takes a lot of trimming to make it salable. Also the good grade may be down to summer 3.

It is estimated that the Heel Fly, adult form of the grub, will not move over one-half mile from the community control can and good results.

The best time to control grubby heels is by spraying with DDT in late August or early September. This spraying is done every three to four weeks during this period. For spraying use 7 and one half pounds of 4 per cent DDT emulsion in 50 gallons of water. Sprayer should develop 200 pounds of pressure. For dusting use a powder containing 1.67 per cent DDT.

1955 Outlook For ACP
Earl Chapman, Local ASC Office Administrator, says: "Next year's ACP Agricultural Conservation Program will be the best that has been offered to Hansford County Farmer's."

There is a greater variety of practices for farmers to select from. There will be more conservation brought per dollar spent.

Several irrigation practices are included in the 1955 ACP program, which is in keeping with our growing irrigation farming. Hansford County has received an \$80,000 appropriation for 1955 ACP Program year as compared to approximately \$57,000.00 for 1954."

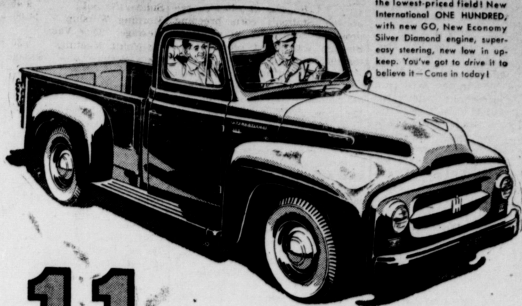

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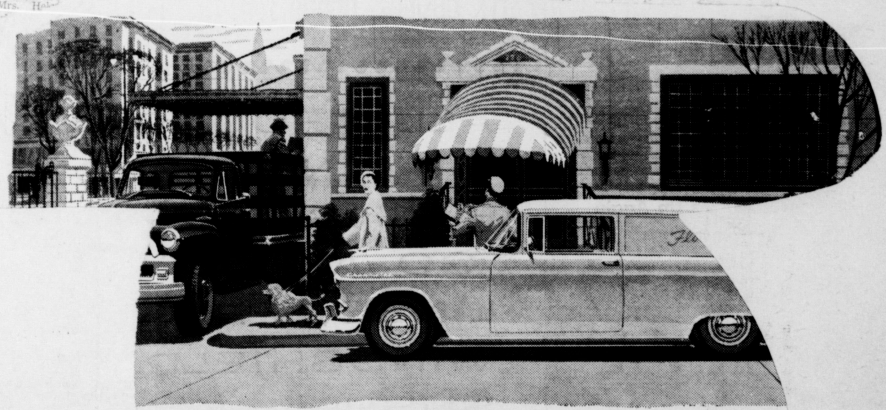

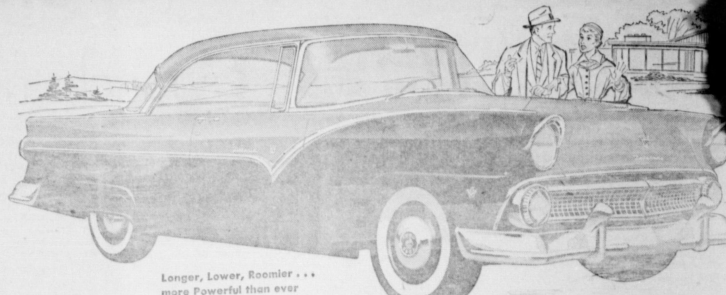
Plenty Of Holiday Turkey Tis Year

College Station, Nov.—An abundance of high quality turkeys at lower prices will be ready for holiday dinners this year. The supply is adequate to furnish turkeys for every table at Thanksgiving and Christmas, according to F. Z. Beensblom, extension poultry marketing specialist. The number of birds on the market will be even larger than last year. The specialist says with the abundant supply, families can afford to be selective when shopping for turkey of their choice. He suggests the shopper look for quality birds, well fleshed and finished and processed to give good flavor. "Don't waste money buying birds with too much fat," he advises. "Get a bird with enough fat to insure good flavor." If the turkey has been killed, bled and dressed properly, the meat will look white rather than pink in color and there will be no pin feathers and bruised marks on the flesh. "Ask to see the dressed bird in check for the signs," Beensblom says. The trend is to lighter birds—around eight pounds and up—making turkey a practical dish for small families at Thanksgiving and Christmas and for other occasions as well. Buy a larger bird if a home food freezer or other storage for extra meat is available. The turkey will come in heavy later meals, too. Shopping for high quality turkeys is not only efficient consumer buying, Beensblom concludes, but helpful to the poultry market in providing the kind of turkey most in demand.

Beef Cattle Need Roughage . . . And Plenty Of It

College Station, Nov.—Roughage—and a lot of it—will be needed to carry Texas beef cattle through the winter. Consider both the amount and quality of roughage you feed, says H. D. Thompson, extension animal husbandman. Roughage in some form should be available to livestock at all times. This doesn't necessarily mean it must be of the highest quality, but the higher the feeding value the better, Thompson says. Roughages very low in nutritive value can be fed with success if adequate supplements—about two pounds of cottonseed meal—be supplied each day. Cotton burrs, peanut hulls, corncobs and rice straw fall into this category. Thompson cites specific rations based on years of research and study which are recommended for feeding in Texas. Use about four pounds of legume hay with 14 pounds of cottonseed hulls or oat straw for each animal daily. If corn or sorghum silage is available, feed 40 to 50 pounds of either and one pound of cotton seed meal or cake daily. Eighteen pounds of Johnsongrass or Prairie hay supplemented with one to two pounds of cottonseed meal or cake makes a top-notch ration for dry cows. Where the hay is available, says Thompson, if Johnsongrass or sorghum hays were cut early and did not get rained on, he says producers may get by without any supplement.
