March Of Dimes Report Good

Spearman Raised: \$1,962.69
Gruver Raised: 788.91
Morse Raised: 174.29
The co-expense totaled 70.68
Net raised in the county was \$2855.71.

Hansford county gets to retain half of this sum, which is \$1428.80 kept, and the same amount sent to the National March of Dimes headquarters.

Texas Tech Study Atomic Energy Radiation

LUBBOCK, Mar. 10 Texas Tech has received an Atomic Energy Commission grant to study the effect of radiation on unborn babies, Dr. Sylvan J. Kaplan, head of Tech's department of psycho-

logy, announced this week. This is the second major grant for radiation research received by Tech this year. Tech psychologists began work this past week on a U. S. Public Health-financed project to help establish the effect of radiation on the human mind.

Pregnant albino rats, and later, their offspring, will serve as subjects for the AEC study which will continue over several years, Dr. Kaplan said. Approximately \$15,000 has been granted by the AEC for the first year's operation.

The project, which is two-pronged, will be conducted jointly by the departments of psychology and foods and nutrition.

After measuring the damage done to the learning ability of babies radiated while in utero, the Tech researchers will attempt to halt that damage or reduce it by means of special food supplementations. It is Dr. Kaplan's hypothesis that this damage is a result of the nervous system degenerating from lack of food.

The research will be conducted by Dr. Kaplan, Dr. Keith J. Hayes, a former research associate with the Yerkes Laboratories of Orange Park, Fla., who joins the Tech psychology staff this month, and Dr. Mina Lamb, professor of foods and nutrition.

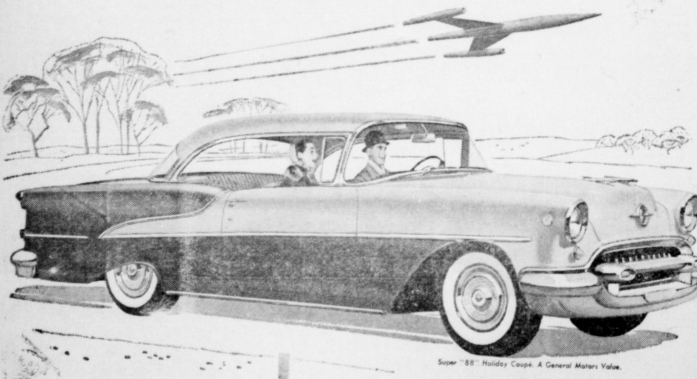

College Station, Feb. — All items on the USDA's March plentiful foods list are in good supply in the Southwest, reports Mae Belle Smith, consumer education specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Stocks of canned sweet corn and canned snap beans as well as rice are so large that USDA is featuring them during the windy month.

Other plentifuls include such meats as beef, turkey, beef, pork, frozen haddock and halibut, shrimp and canned tuna.

Also, such high protein content foods as eggs, milk, cheese and other dairy products are in abundant supply.

Only three fruits made the official March list—raisins, fresh and processed oranges and grapefruit.

Pinto beans, lard, vegetable fats and oils round out the USDA's monthly listing for March.

Stranded in 17 Below Zero Storm

The following is a portion of a letter written to Mr. and Mrs. John Buschman, from their daughter, Mrs. Richard Neely. Mr. and Mrs. Richard Neely and two small children are employed with a construction company, and were traveling through the state of Nebraska last week when they were stranded in a blizzard:

"We were traveling between Gordon and Lincoln when suddenly we were blinded by a flurry of snow. Richard started to stop just as we plowed into a snow drift. It was about one o'clock p. m. The snow was blowing till we couldn't see anything. Richard tried to get the chains on, but his hands would get so stiff he couldn't work them. His coveralls were wet up to the thighs and he had to get back in the car and warm up. We let the car run till about 4, then we decided to shut it off and save gas. We were all lightly clothed and had no blankets and my coat was the only really warm thing in the car. I took it off and we all huddled under it until about 6:00 p. m. Richard tried to start the car, but the starter was frozen. We had over a half a tank of gas, but it was no good to us now. It was already so cold that I didn't want to move or stir. Richard said we had to do something. He wanted to get out and try to walk back to a little town we had passed, but I was afraid he could never make it. Later we found out the temperature was 17 below zero. The back seat was full of blue-print tubes which Richard had intended to mail, about 4 doz. of them. Richard punched holes in a coffee pot we had and began tearing up one

of the tubes. He built a fire in the coffee pot and after a few minutes we began to warm up some. We began trying to dry Richard's clothes out, which were frozen around his legs. His boots had snow and ice in them when he took them off. In a couple hours his clothes were dried out. One tube would burn about 45 minutes. How the hours dragged. Richard and I kept trying to think of some one who would know we were out there. We finally decided that nobody but God knew where we were and he was the only one we could look to for help. I kept the children under my coat and Richard kept the fire. He had to work with it constantly to keep it burning. All Saturday afternoon little Wayne kept asking for something to eat, just anything. About midnight Richard's eyes were getting sore from the smoke, so I watched the fire awhile.

We had decided if the wind would lay, the snow plow would be out in the morning even if it were Sunday. Richard took over the fire again and I wrapped the children under my coat with me and tucked my feet under Richard's coat. After what seemed an eternity, daylight finally came, and new hope came with it. It soon waned through, as we cleared a spot on the window to look out and all we could see was white, now and then a telephone pole or a spot of the road. Ice was frozen on the inside of the windows quarter of an inch thick. Snow kept blowing in through the defroster and heater and around the doors and we had pretty good drifts inside the car. On the south side the snow was piled against the car, just as high as the car. On the north side, the wind whipped around the car and

kept the snow back a few feet. Beyond that, the snow drifted high. By 10:00 a. m. I had given up the snow plow coming. Wayne kept waking up and began to cry. It was more than I could stand, and I began to cry too. Then suddenly, for just a moment it seemed as though there were guardian angels all around us. The children were very good and hardly fussed at all. Nina Lou kept begging for snow. I hated to give it to her, but couldn't refuse, for it was all I had from the snow that piled up in our car. Sunday afternoon Richard got out and looked around. He

looked under the hood and the motor was packed in snow. Again he wanted to try walking somewhere, but I protested. Snow drifting in on the tubes had gotten them damp and each one we burned smoked a little worse. By Sunday evening Nina Lou lay limp in my arms. She would wake up, open her eyes, and fall back to sleep. I was afraid the smoke was getting to be too much for the children. We were also running low on tubes. We began letting the fire go out until we couldn't stand the cold any longer. Everything we touched in the car was coated with snot. Our

hands were black and our clothes were grey with smoke. The Lord was our strength and our help. He gave us the will to keep trying when it seemed we could try no more. The wind had finally died down. At 1:00 a. m. I told Richard I was ready for some more fire. We had two tubes left. He said he didn't know if he could stand any more smoke or not and began preparing to light the fire. Suddenly we heard the chugging of a motor and the clatter of chains on the highway.

I pulled on the lights. That sound of chains I had heard, I guess, a hundred times in 36 hours we had been there. The men began scraping back the snow to open the door. Boy were we glad to see those men. But no words can express how we felt inside. They wrapped both sleeping children up and loaded us into cars, and we began to feed the children. They ate so much. I went to sleep immediately, and when I awoke, little Wayne was standing up and looked out the window singing, "Jesus loves me this I know."

When we got to a warm room, shelter and food, we did nothing but eat and rest for one day.

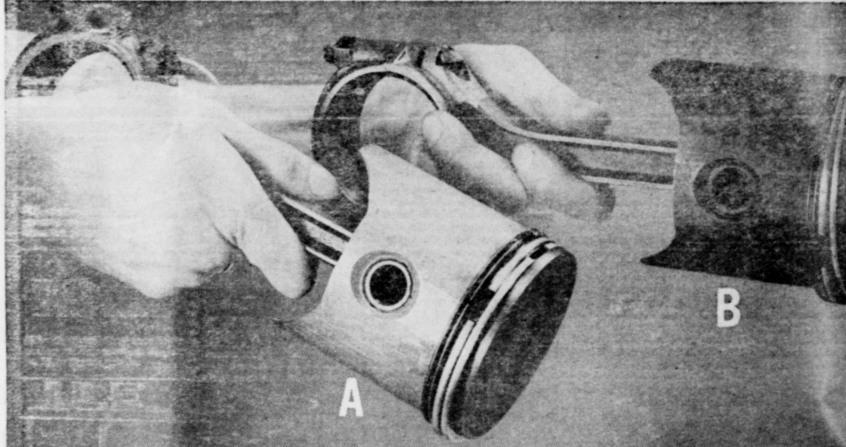

Amino Triazole Show Exceptional Promise As Cotton Defoliant

College Station, Feb.-Amino Triazole (AT), a new cotton defoliant, may prove as revolutionary as DDT to the field of insect control, says Dr. Wayne C. Hall, professor of plant physiology and pathology at Texas A. & M. College.

And, Texas cotton growers will be among the first to test it.

At is the first defoliant with true systemic action. It works through the plant sap stream to reach the leaves. All other defoliants are the contact-type.

Hall says AT will be available commercially this year only to growers in Texas, the Delta region of Mississippi and irrigated areas of Arizona. The promising new defoliant should make its initial Texas appearance in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

In greenhouse studies, Hall sprayed potted cotton plants with AT and obtained 90.4 percent defoliation and no regrowth after a period of 35 days.

In field tests, he reports 90.6 percent defoliation and regrowth of 20 per cent upon application of one pound AT an acre. At rates of 1.5 pounds per acre AT gave 80 percent defoliation and 10 percent regrowth. (Most standard defoliation give about 80 percent leaf drops.)

This new, absorption chemical and growth inhibitor also is effective as a weed killer. At Westlake, Johnsonsgrove sprayed in July now shows no sign of life. At first exhibition defoliating properties during 1952 cotton tests conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

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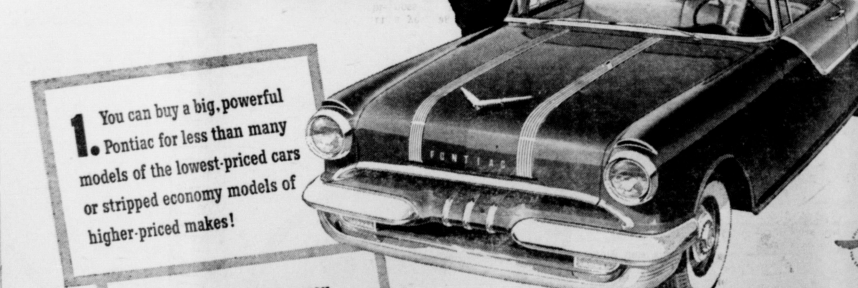
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
