**Rainfall Helps Maize Prospects**  
Rainfall that spelled out Maize production in big letters fell all over Hansford county and the trade territory this area Thursday evening of last week.  
The heavy rainfall was spotted with 1.50 inches being a fair sample of the smaller amounts of moisture, which was recorded at Spearman to the five inches of moisture that fell in the Morse area, and of course did considerable damage in erosion, since the rainfall fell in 45 minutes.  
In the Spearman area the rainfall varied quite a bit. Eck reported 3.00 inches on one of his farms South of Spearman and 1.60 inches on a farm less than 4 miles distance. Most of the rainfall south of Spearman was a bit heavier than the moisture inside the city limits of Spearman. An example of the difference in the rainfall can be checked by a report from Bill Hutton in the Valley, who recorded 2.50 inches of moisture. Less than a mile via airline, Archa Morse reported only 1.60 inches of moisture. It seems Hutton received an early one inch rainfall that was virtually a sprinkle on the Archa Morse farm.  
The rainfall assures production of maize, and if favorable weather should be encountered as the growing season continues, a maize production could be outstanding.

**Republicans Hold First Primary**  
The Republican party held their first primary in Hansford County, on Saturday of last week. As far as we can determine here at the Reporter office, this was their first primary support vote last week. CANYON, July, (WTNS)—Three Spearman high school musicians are among the more than 200 who have already made reservations for the Second Annual West Texas Music Camp, slated Aug. 1-12 at West State College.  
More than 300 students from the Tri-State area are expected to participate.  
Planning to attend the camp, which emphasizes training in band, choir, and twirling, are Carolyn Collard, Judy Davis, and Robert Darrell Greever of Spearman.  
Among faculty for the camp are M. J. Newton, WTSC music department head and camp director; Dr. Alvin Edgar, head of the music department at Iowa State College; Tod Otis, five-time national twirling champion; Jack Lee, band director at the University of Arizona; Hiram Henry, director at Oklahoma A & M College; Joe and Grace Berryman, nationally known percussion authorities; Dr. Houston Bright, WTSC A Cappella Choir director; Royal Branley and Miss Matilda Gagne, assistant professors of music at WTSC.  
Students will attend classes, band and choir rehearsals, practice sessions, drum majors and conducting classes, and twirling sessions with Otis throughout the day during the two-week period.  
Three bands and a choir will be formed, as well as ensembles and twirling groups. In the late afternoon and evenings special entertainment has been planned.  
A series of outdoor concerts on the campus will be held almost every night of the camp, and the public is invited. Among concerts already scheduled are the Amarillo Air Force Band, Aug. 2; a musical comedy trio from the University of Oklahoma, Aug. 3; a dance with Weldon Bright and his band of Amarillo, Aug. 4; a silent show, with camps students participating, Aug. 5; a big music camp band concert, featuring Twirler Ted Otis, Aug. 6; George Green's "Of These I Sing" produced by the Amarillo Starlight Theater, Aug. 9.
