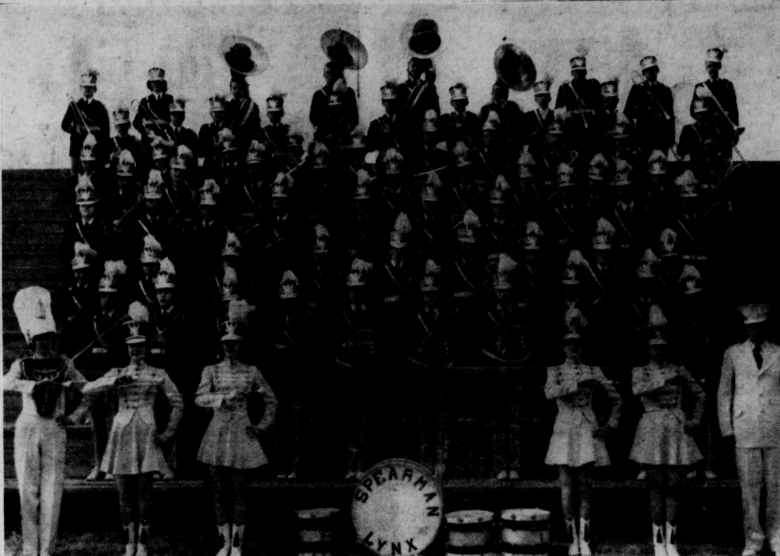
During the last semester of our school year, many members of the band personnel have, by invitation performed for many church and civic affairs. Such invitations were a great honor and each member was proud to perform.

### Gruver Baptist Will Attend Convention

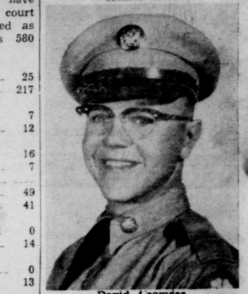
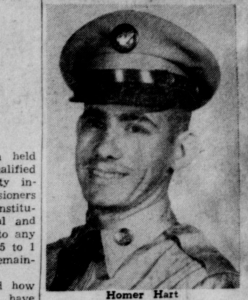

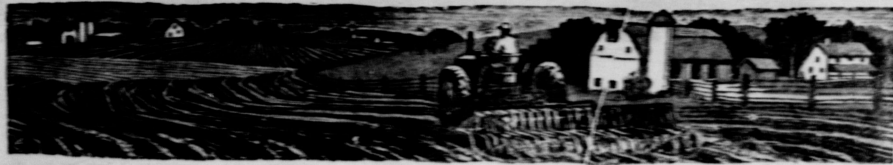

# George Emery Oaks, Long Time Justice Of The Peace Is The Ideal Man For Job Which He Still Holds

Squire G. E. Oaks is the only man in the United States who ever stepped into a Justice of the Peace office and did not know it, until he was called upon to perform his first marriage ceremony. He has held this office for more than twenty years without an opponent. I ask him how he did it without an opponent? He replied, "The people did not know there was such an office." Judge Oaks as he is familiarly known around the court house, has distinguished himself on keeping one of the cleanest courthouses in the state. I must add, that in the deepest in the United States. He is working when the rest of the force around the court-house is asleep in their homes. He is also a champion saw-filer. Regarding the saw-filer, Squire Oaks does, he takes pride in doing it. He believes if anything is worth doing, it is worth doing right. He is a pastmaster on repairing broken saws. He is like a handle that will fit any tool. He can adjust himself to any kind of work that needs to be done. He is 72-years-old and still going in. He doesn't only know what to do around the court-house, during his quarter of a century, of looking after the health of the public, in keeping a house sanitary, but he is willing to do it. Mr. Oaks came from the farm where there was a large family. They were brought up to work and best of all, they had that energy and vim it took to do any kind of work to make a living. He spent many years as a cotton picker. The bollweevils put him out of the cotton gin. He spoke of the place where he worked, ginning over three thousand bales of cotton one year one hundred bales the final year when they closed down the business. In that town where there were three gins where he worked, today there is not a gin in town. The bollweevils forced the farmers to raise something instead of cotton. That left the ginner without a job, that was when G. E. Oaks came to Spearman. He has held his present job every since the new courthouse was built. He has always been on the job.

He has some very thrilling experience as Justice of the Peace. Law violators naturally would not be pleased with his decision. Those who want to uphold the law admire him for his fairness and his firmness. He believes, if you don't mean to enforce the law, it should be repealed. He is never radical on anything that comes up when there is a decision to be made. In his court he makes the decision the way he thinks it should be, according to the way he interprets the law. 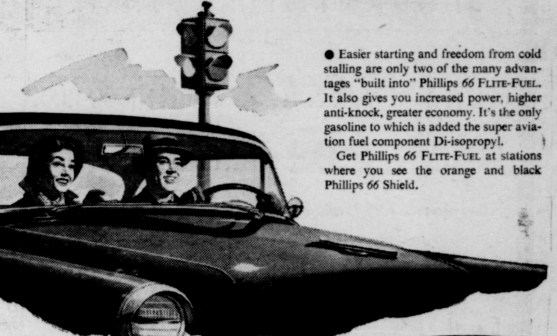

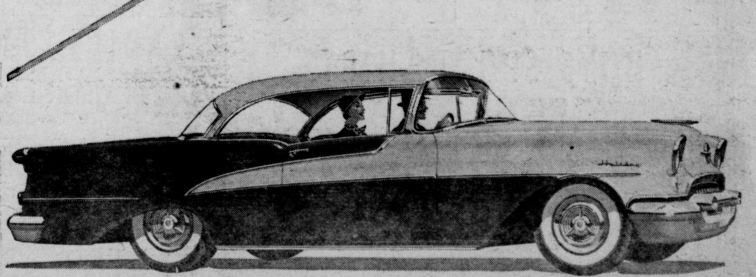
